Illinois Credit Privacy Act

On Aug. 10, 2010, Illinois Governor Pat Quinn signed into law the Illinois Credit Privacy Act ("ICPA"). The ICPA significantly limits Illinois employers' ability to obtain any credit history information for employment applicants, as well as for current employees. Under the new Illinois law that takes effect Jan. 1, 2011, employers cannot use credit history to determine whether to hire, fire or promote someone. If an employer is caught accessing such information, they can face legal action including civil liability for damages and injunctive relief. The ICPA applies to virtually all Illinois employers however some industries and positions are exempt including banks and financial institutions, insurance companies, state law enforcement units, state and local government agencies and debt collection agencies. Exemptions include positions that allow unsupervised access to more than \$2,500; signatory power over businesses assets of more than \$100; management and control of the business; access to personal, financial or confidential information, trade secrets, or state or national security information. Also, employers will still be able to conduct background checks on potential employees or current employees provided it does not contain any credit information. The ICPA does not prevent an employer from obtaining a background report or investigatory report from a consumer re-

porting agency, as allowed under the Fair

Credit Reporting Act, as long as the report obtained does not include credit information. Further, if an employer is permitted to obtain credit information, no specific disclosures are required on any type of consent form.



Tooth Whitening

Without a doubt, the most frequently asked questions in a dental office concern tooth whitening. Patients want to look their best, but with the tremendous amounts of advertising that bombards them, they turn to us for answers.

How does it work? All tooth-whitening procedures accomplish one thing: they penetrate the enamel with oxygen. The oxygen changes the way the enamel reflects light. Instead of absorbing some colors and reflecting the yellow ones out, in... white light out! The tooth whitener's effectiveness is based on two things; concentration and duration.

Whitening toothpaste—with a low concentration of oxygen and a short duration, it is the least effective method for whitening. Rarely are the results reported as acceptable.

Over-the-counter whitening gelsbetter results than the toothpaste. Major problems in the past have been the ill-fitting mouth trays that can cause TMJ (bite/ jaw) problems or can cause gum irritation because they hold the whitening gel up against the gum tissue.

Whitening strips—Crest introduced these and they eliminated the TMJ and gum irritation issue associated with the over-the-counter gels. The patient places gel is touching the gums and the strip is so thin, it doesn't alter the bite enough to cause a TMJ problem. The drawback has been the inability for the strips to reach the entire surface of the tooth as it curves pointment.



This method is very effective because the custom fabrication allows the tray to keep the gel off of the tissue and will cause no TMJ problems. The trays can be worn at night. Most of the gels require two weeks to reach their full whitening potential. If your teeth start to stain again, you can reuse the trays and purchase additional gel to touch them up.

Laser tooth whitening—this method is just as effective as professional tooth whitening with custom trays but the advantage is time. In just about 90 minutes your whitening is completely finished. The gels that are used for this process are so powerful; the gums must be isolated with special barriers. Bright light help energize the gels and get the job done quickly. The cost is similar to that of the custom trays, the strips on their teeth so that minimal but you cannot touch up after your teeth



Chicago's Greatest Open-Air **Museums—Cemeteries**

The Barrington/Northwest Community Associates (B/NWCA) is sponsoring a wonderful fall excursion on Thursday, Oct. 28 entitled "Art and Death: Celebrated Cemeteries." This event is guaranteed to attract the attention of current members and those interested in joining an exceptional organization. Experienced and knowledgeable tour director Al Walavich will guide members through two of Chicago's most historic and unique cemeteries: Graceland and Bohemian National Cemetery. Both have been labeled "Chicago's greatest open-air museums" and both reflect Chicago's history beginning in the mid-19th century and continuing for the next 150 years.

Graceland was established in 1860 when successful Chicago lawyer Thomas Bryan purchased 80 acres for the purpose of building a private cemetery. H.W.S. Cleveland, a prominent landscape architect, was hired to create a parklike ambiance, which he did by designing uniformly sodded paths and plots and eliminating traditional boundaries. A second architect, Ossian Simonds, used native plants to create the cemetery's pastoral landscape. Graceland soon attracted the attention of Chicago's most elite and notable citizens and became a "high Victoria wonderland," noted for its elaborate monuments and works of art. Today, Graceland is still considered one of Chicago's most historic and beautiful places.

The Bohemian National Cemetery, founded in 1877, is also from the Victorian era, but its population came from mostly the working class. When a Catholic priest denied burial in the existing Bohemian-Polish Catholic cemetery to those he disliked, the Bohemian societies of Chicago proceeded to raise funds and obtain a suitable site for a new cemetery. Originally 50 acres were purchased but the size eventually expanded to 124 acres and over time monuments were constructed which often competed for honors with those of the millionaires in Graceland. One such example is the elaborate Cermak mausoleum in Section 21 which honors former stimulating opportunities available to B/ Chicago Mayor Anton Cermak, who was assassinated in 1933 when he rode in a season.



The typical treatment course is about six weeks long and involves application of medication in the doctor's office followed by nightly application of a prescription schedule an appointment with Dr. James medication at home. 


