#### Amendments to the Illinois Wage **Payment and Collection Act Increase Employer Liability**

On July 30, 2010, Governor Pat Quinn signed into law numerous amendments to the Illinois Wage Payment and Collection Act (The Act). The Act establishes how often wages must be paid and provides assistance to workers in the collection of earned compensation. Employees must receive their final wages, vacation pay, commissions and bonuses on their next regularly scheduled payday. 

#### **Common Misconceptions Regarding Hospice**

Myth: To be eligible for hospice, I have to be in the final stages of dying.

Fact: Hospice patients and families receive care for an unlimited amount of time, depending upon the course of the illness. There is no fixed limit on the amount of time a patient may continue to receive hospice services.

Myth: Quality care at the end of life is very expensive.

Fact: Medicare beneficiaries pay little or nothing for hospice. For those ineligible for Medicare, most insurance plans, HMOs, and managed care plans cover hospice care. Hospice & Palliative Care of Northeastern Illinois provides care to anyone regardless of their ability to pay.
