The Book Buddy program promotes good reading skills and provides positive mentoring relationships for the child residents. The program increases reading comprehension, sight words and reading vocabulary.

Protecting Your Legal Rights— **Retaliatory Discharge** by Joette S. Doran, J.D.

Terminating an employee because of a complaint of discrimination or an employer's violation of certain state or federal laws is known as "retaliatory discharge." For instance, if an employee is terminated for making a complaint for a hostile work environment under Title VII (race, gender, religion or national origin), the Age Discrimination in Employment Act (an employee over age 40) or the Americans with Disabilities Act, the company may be subject to liability. Also, if an employee complains of discriminatory conduct and then is demoted, terminated or otherwise adversely treated by the employer because of that complaint, than the employee would have a valid claim of retaliation. Damages for retaliation can subject an employer to a federal or state court action for damages including the employee's lost wages, benefits, attorneys' fees, costs, compensatory and punitive damages.

If you believe that you were terminated or adversely treated for making a complaint, you are well advised to promptly seek legal advice. In order to pursue a case for retaliatory discharge or retaliation, most often a Charge of Discrimination must be filed with a state or federal administrative agency. The banquet extends an opportunity for all members to learn about the society's agenda for the next year and to meet new members.



A.G. Edwards—The 12-Month **Financial Ideas Checklist**

and business commitments, it can also be helpful to keep a calendar of financial commitments we can implement throughout the year. So, along with the kids' artwork, here's a monthly checklist of financial ideas to tape to the refrigerator:

January-Complete a net worth statement, which can help you evaluate your total financial picture and see if/how you need to make financial adjustments for the new year.

vestment records for your 2002 tax returns. Important documents include your W-2s, 1099s and investment account state-

March-Invest more in your company's 401(k), 403(b) or 457 retirement plan, since you can now contribute up to \$12,000 for 2003, an overall increase of these plans' previous limits. If you're over age 50, you can make an additional \$2,000 "catchup" contribution to any of these

April-April 15 is your last chance to make any contributions to either your traditional or Roth IRA for 2002. And instead of waiting until the last minute, contribute now toward your IRA for 2003, especially since the limit has been raised from \$2,000 to \$3,000. Investors over age 50 can make an additional \$500 "catchup" contribution to either a Roth or traditional IRA for 2003.

May—Many municipal bond issues typically mature in June and July, so see if you have any municipal bonds that are set to mature and determine how you can reinvest those assets.

June—Are you getting a tax refund? You may want to consider directing the money toward funding your retirement. The compounding effect on even \$500 over the course of several years can potentially create a significant addition to your retirement nest egg.

July—Review your portfolio and make sure its contents still match your investment objectives. If an investment has greatly underperformed your expectations and no longer has compelling fundamentals, you may need to reinvest those

> August—Think estate planning. While the estate tax will be repealed in 2010, the current laws will expire in 2011, and an estate plan is still critical for transferring your assets efficiently and appropriately to the heirs you've designated. You may consider establishing a living trust, which also helps to make the transfer of assets as privately as possible for your loved ones.

September—With school starting, think February-Organize your tax and in- about saving for your children's college education. The new tax laws have further enhanced 529 savings plans and Coverdell Education Savings Accounts (formerly known as Education IRAs). The contribution limits on Coverdell Accounts have quadrupled from \$500 to \$2,000 and the 529 plans allow you to save even larger sums of money—usually \$100,000 or more -which is beneficial for both college savings and your taxable estate. Plus, qualified withdrawals from both of these investment vehicles are now free from federal income taxes.

> October—Review your life insurance policy to make sure your death benefits provide at least 75% of your total income to support your family's ongoing needs, should you or your spouse pass away.

November-Make sure you know the "wash sale" rule, which states you cannot take a tax loss in a security if you have acquired or plan to acquire the same or a substantially identical security within 30 calendar days before or after you sell a security. The last day you can "double up" on a security without violating the wash sale rule is Nov. 29.

December—Dec. 31 is your last chance to make a charitable contribution or sell securities for the purpose of claiming a tax loss







The group was formed to meet the needs in the Barrington area where WINGS has a home for women and children who are struggling with homelessness and domestic violence.

Dedicated to ending homelessness and domestic violence for women and children in the north and northwest suburbs of Chicago's Cook County, WINGS has been in operation since 1985. Long-term transitional housing, along with supportive services, including case management, therapeutic counseling, life-skills train-

counseling are designed to move women from desperate situations to self-sufficiency and financial independence. WINGS currently has 17 homes and apartments located in Des Plaines, Arlington Heights, Park Ridge, Schaumburg, Hoffman Estates, Mount Prospect and Barrington, with the ability to house up to 70 women and children each night.



How to Choose a Dance School for Your Child

Many parents of young children who desire to take dance lessons find themselves unsure as to how to choose a school. Frankly, a recommendation from a neighbor or friend is not enough. You should always visit the school in person. The following are some guidelines as to how to choose a school in order to insure your child's proper instruction and personal safety.

Facility—The dancers should have a large room with a special sprung floor. Dancing on concrete covered with tile or other hard surfaces is dangerous. There should be ample mirrors and well-constructed ballet barres for older students.

Observation of Classes—Before enrolling in any school, you should make an appointment to observe a class. Even if you are not knowledgeable, you will be able to judge certain critical things.

1) Is the teacher well organized and

2) Is be/she knowledgeable? (Check the school brochure for teachers' backgrounds.)

3) Are the teacher's corrections made clearly and in a positive way?

4) Are the students well behaved and attentive for their age?

Performing Opportunities—As dance is a performing art, it is imperative that the students get the chance to dance for an audience. However, a good school should stress education and not detract from that for the sake of performing. A fancy costume will never cover up poor dancing!

Tuition—Do some comparison shopping as to class rates. Classes should be competitively priced but one should not think that the cheapest class means more for your money. As with everything, quality costs more. Schools should have discounted tuition for multiple classes if your child is a serious student. Family discounts may also be available.

Even pre-schoolers taking lessons should have a fun, interesting and beneficial class. A little extra time will result in a decision that you and your child will be happy with for years to come!





An Uplifting New Year—Browlift

The signs of forehead aging are predictable and obvious: the eyebrows descend to a lower than normal position; the upper eyelids become puffy; a skin fold begins to form above the outer upper eyelids; and wrinkles along with creases appear on the forehead and between the eyebrow region.

The browlift or forehead lift procedure is designed to arrest and reverse signs of aging in the forehead region while providing a more complete and harmonious rejuvenation of the face.

An older method of browlifting, called the open or coronal browlift, was performed by cutting the scalp from ear to ear, physically peeling the scalp down off of the skull and removing portions of the scalp in an effort to raise the eyebrows. A less invasive procedure is now available.

the lower eyelid can also form but not such as a facelift or rhinoplasty. The eyeusually to the same degree as in the upper lid.

What Can Surgery Accomplish?

In the upper eyelid excess skin is removed to allow a smooth contour when the eye is gently closed. When the eye opens this results in a normal crease approximately 7mm above the lash line. Excess fat, if present, is removed with the skin to reduce the fullness of the upper eyelid. The incision line is closed precisely at the crease to hide it during the healing process. Eyelid skin heals very rapidly. Special techniques are used in Asian eyes and selected others to create a more prominent crease

In the lower eyelid an incision is made just beneath the lashes or in selected patients on the inside of the lower eyelid. The excess fat, which is contained in three separate compartments, is then removed. Any excess skin is removed taking care not to place too much tension on the

lids can also be improved in certain individuals with chemical peeling and/or brow lifting. The need for these are determined at the preoperative consultation.

Where is Surgery Performed? Eyelid surgery is most often performed in our office surgical suite, however if preferred, surgery can be performed at a number of different hospitals or ambulatory surgery centers in the area.

What is the Recovery Period?

Dissolving sutures are used in the lower eyelids and do not have to be removed. Nonabsorbing sutures are normally used in the upper eyelids and are removed on the fifth postoperative day. Makeup can be worn the day following suture removal and most people return to work at this time. There can be swelling of the eyes for one to two days following the operation which might interfere with vision so we recommend not driving until the swelling is down. After this most people can easily be out in public with sunglasses. Any bruising that occurs fades in be performed together or in combination the first 7 to 10 days. Makeup can conceal







Nasal and Airway Obstructions Can Affect Facial Form and Development

Nasal and airway obstructions are a contributing factor in the development of a malocclusion or "bad bite." Large tonsil and adenoid tissues may cause excessive mouth breathing, which can lead to development of a narrow palate. If the palate has been narrowed because of mouth breathing, crowding of the adult dentition is commonly found.

Facial form and development is directly affected in young children who have large tonsils and adenoids. Due to the lack of normal breathing, the vertical dimensions of the face are increased and, as a result, a longer facial type develops.

The American Dental Association recommends an orthodontic examination for children by age 7. At the initial exam, the orthodontist can evaluate the tonsils and facial development. If there are concerns that the tonsils and/or adenoids may be disrupting normal dental or facial development, than an evaluation by an ENT physician may be necessary. If it is deter-

mined that the tonsils and adenoids need to be removed for health reasons, it is common to see a positive effect on dental and facial development.

REMODELING 2003... STORY #1

When Tim and Gale Hennelly decided to remodel, they had some specific goals in mind. Their home, built in the 1970's, was typical of its era. It had a compact kitchen with a small eating area. The family room was down the hall. Their dream was a "Country French" kitchen adjacent to the new family room so Gale could keep an eye on her small son while preparing meals. 




Happy New Year 2003


