



# Himalayas: An Aesthetic Adventure

"Himalayas: An Aesthetic Adventure," the next major Art Institute exhibition, is the first to include works of art from the entire Himalayan region. Organized geographically, it begins with Nepal, followed by Jammu and Kashmir, the western Himalayas and West Tibet, and, finally, central and eastern Tibet and Bhutan.

The 187 works of mostly religious art from the fifth to 19th centuries are drawn from public and private collections. Over half have never been publicly exhibited.

On Friday, May 16, members of the Barrington Community Associates of the Art Institute of Chicago will attend the 17th Annual Joint Program of the Community Associates of The Art Institute of Chicago and the Women's Association of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

In Rubloff Auditorium, Dr. Pratapaditya Pal, visiting curator of Indian, Himalayan and Southeast Asian art, will speak on the exhibition. He will discuss the particular beauty and artistic achievements of the various cultures within the framework of the two great Asian religions, Hinduism and Buddhism.

Dr. Pal first visited the majestic Himalayas in 1946. This exhibition is the culmination of a 50-year engagement with Himalayan art.

At Symphony Center, Dr. Virginia Gorlinski, assistant professor of ethnomusicology at Northwestern University, will explore the interconnectedness of music and spirituality in the Himalayas and highlight ways in which western artists have incorporated these sonic and spiritual val- membership information.



Enter River Trading Post and you enter a world of other times and other cultures. Inside River Trading Post hand-woven Navajo rugs hang from exposed brick walls. Fine old Indian jewelry is carefully arranged in cases alongside clay pots that are 800 to 1,000 years old, and the museum-quality hand-coiled Pueblo pottery is among the finest to be found anywhere.

Framed photographs, including an extensive collection of rare Edward S. Curtis photogravures, are displayed in the carefully lit loft along with a short biography of the artist and a story about each of the







A legally enforceable contract is one in which each party to an agreement provides something of value to the other. To create an employment contract, the employer must make a specific offer, and there must be an acceptance of those terms by the employee. A written contract is the most easily recognized employment agreement and usually contains specific terms and conditions regarding the employment relationship such as salary, responsibilities and duration. Other written



documents may also be considered a con- manuals, letters of agreement or letters

# Why Americans Should Savor Cinco de Mayo

May 5 is not Mexican Independence Day, but it should be! And Cinco de Mayo is not an American holiday, but it should be!

Under Emperor Napoleon III, who detested the United States, the French came to Mexico to stay. Napoleon's army had not been defeated in 50 years, and they were not afraid of anyone, especially since the United States was embroiled in their own civil war. On May 5, 1862, in Pueblo, Mexico, under the command of Texas-born General Zaragosa and Colonel Diaz, 4,000 Mexican soldiers smashed the French and traitor Mexican army of 8,000. The Mexicans had won a great victory which kept Napoleon III from sup- plying the Confederate rebels for another year, allowing the United States to build

er such writings are deemed enforceable contracts, the facts and circumstances of a particular case must be examined. However, an employer may effectively prevent enforcement of such a writing as a contract if the document contains a disclaimer specifically stating that the document does not change the employment-at-will relationship.

As such, to limit an employer's right to terminate the employee at will, the document must contain language which shows the employer and employee did not intend an employment-at-will relationship, such as a termination for cause only provision. In addition to written agreements, promises made by an employee may also be enforceable under certain circumstances, such as where the employer made a promise to take some specific action which the employee reasonably relied on

It might be a historical stretch to credit the survival of the United States to those brave 4,000 Mexicans who faced an army twice as large in 1862. But who knows?

# **Daum Trunk Show April 5th**

The artists of **Daum** have always been inspired by nature. Playing on forms, joyful colors and harmonious materials, the collections reveal all their charms. ### Daum-from Crystal... to Pâte de Verre

Pâte de verre is a rare and ancient glassmaking technique, dating back to 5,000 BC (pieces have been found in the tombs of pharaohs). In 1900, Daum (pronounced "dome") rediscovered this technique that had been long forgotten, then further developed it in 1968. The process is extremely delicate to master, but the objects produced by melting fragments of colored crystal

within a mold have a texture, substance and softness of contour that can not be obtained with blown glass.

Pâte de verre is in fact a paste made of crystal with a 30 percent lead content and originates from specially produced batches of crystal melted in crucibles. The final color of a piece is contingent on several factors: the granule size of the crystal fragments, the proportions in the batch, the chemical reaction between certain minerals and metals, and the rate of increase and decrease n temperature within the kilns.

The process of melting glass coupled with the lost-wax technique that Daum has developed ensures a perfect reproduction of the original piece just as the artist imagined it. Today, Daum is the



### What is Microdermabrasion?

The Safety Town sessions are offered for June 16 to 27 and July 7 to 18. During the two-week sessions, children attend classes Monday through Friday for two hours each day at Health World in Barrington. ### Woodstock Early Learning Center Opens Second Daycare in Belvidere By Don Peasley

Woodstock Early Learning Center has assumed operation of an early learning center in Belvidere. Mona Arend, director of the Woodstock Early Learning Center, is now directing the center.

Arend plans to add infant and toddler care starting May 1 and will continue accepting children ages 3 through 5, including kindergarten.

Arend and other staff members met with parents of children in that program to discuss plans to expand the existing daycare center. Teachers will continue under her management.

The YMCA decided to close the center. which has 44 children, ages 2 through 6. It has been operated by the YMCA in Boone County for the past 30 years.

The facility is in the former Logan School. It has six rooms and is licensed by DCFS to care for up to 103 children. The available facilities include 11,000 square feet in six classrooms, a gymnasium and a 17,000-square-foot playground.

Since 1994, Arend has directed the Woodstock Early Learning Center. At that time, the center had 60 children. Today, it has 192, including full- and parttime students.

Woodstock Early Learning Center has expanded twice in the past eight years to meet the growing demand.

"We learned YMCA decided to the close the center and was looking for another Christian not-for-profit organization to take over operation," said Arend.

Arend was joined by other corporate staff members in late January to meet with Lynn Mortensen, Belvidere YMCA director, to learn more about the center and look over the facilities.

Arend said infant and toddler teachers will be trained with time spent at the Woodstock Early Learning Center before May 1. Arend will be the area director but will hire a full-time site director at the Belvidere facility.

The YMCA is agreeable to making available existing equipment. Arend said with an expenditure of less than \$30,000, she expects to update equipment and furnishings, accomplish some room decorations and add the infant room and toddler rooms

Evaluating the need for this early learning center, Arend cited these reasons for the center to assume management:

• Belvidere's working families, especially single-parent households, need choices in childcare near where they live and work. There is one other fully licensed daycare facility in Boone County, and it has no additional openings for children

• No facility in the area offers care for infants and very young toddlers.

• A licensed facility is accountable in meeting professional standards.

• A loving, safe environment for children helps them develop social skills. satisfy intellectual curiosity and learn valuable life disciplines.

Arend said the Boone County area is growing rapidly, up to five percent increase in population per year. Over 5 percent of the county's residents are under 5 years of age, making Boone County the sixth youngest among Illinois 102 counties.

"Despite the population increase, the number of licensed professional daycare facilities has not increased in the past 10 years," said Arend. "More large subdivisions are planned in the future."



# **REMODELING 2003**

"Our kitchen isn't that old but it's just not working for us. The island counter is too small and I absolutely hate seeing the side of our big refrigerator from the front hall." These were the thoughts Kathy Civik expressed to **Barrington Kitchen & Bath Studio's** designer Kaye Hathaway at their first meeting. The desk area in the original kitchen was much larger

than the family needed. Kaye suggested building a walk-in pantry with a curtained glass door to provide storage for bulky items. That left enough room for a smaller desk which was given a furniture look with a carved onlay and special moldings. The island, which had housed the cooktop and a raised seating area, has now become a baking and food prep center. Three specially designed carved posts support the eating bar, which was kept at counter height to provide maximum counter space.

The Civik's chose Crystal cabinets in Antique White with a brown highlight to provide the sophisticated look that Kathy craved. Dark green granite countertops provide contrast. Ken Civik, who is a tile contractor, installed a random-sized ceramic floor with a stone look and a tumbled marble back-

# Peterson Targets Unlicensed Drivers, Aims to Seize Vehicles

surance in Illinois could result in the loss censed drivers on the road. of your vehicle if legislation sponsored by Sen. Bill Peterson becomes law.

Senate Bill 1581 gained approval in the Senate Transportation Committee March 11. A constituent brought the idea to state Sen. Dick Klemm (R-McHenry County) after a local fatal accident involving a motorcyclist and a driver without a license or insurance. Peterson (R-Long Grove) became involved in the issue following Klemm's retirement from the Senate.

"The motorcyclist's widow questioned why Illinois law did not impose stiffer penalties on these drivers. I would have to agree with her. Illinois law does not do enough to keep these illegal drivers off the road," Peterson said. "A slap on the wrist clearly isn't enough. Senate Bill 1581 takes away their ability to drive."

The problem with unlicensed drivers continuing to drive is not specific to Illinois.

According to the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety, 20 percent of all fatal crashes involve at least one driver who did not have a valid license at the time of the crash. The AAA Foundation study also shows that solutions such as California's impoundment and forfeiture laws are full state Senate.

Driving without a license and without in- working to reduce the number of unli-

Senate Bill 1581 takes a similar approach to the California law and builds on current Illinois forfeiture law.

Approved last year, Public Act 92-688 seizes the vehicles of any driver who continues to drive after their license was suspended or revoked for DUI charges, leaving the scene of an accident that involves death or injury, reckless homicide, or refusal to take a DUI test. Current law also impounds the vehicle of any unlicensed driver who is driving uninsured but provides recourse to retrieve the vehicle.

Under Senate Bill 1581, an unlicensed driver would forfeit the vehicle if they drive without insurance and cause death or personal injury.

The vehicle could still be released to the family only if it is the sole source of transportation and loss of the vehicle would cause a hardship. Otherwise, the vehicle would be destroyed, delivered to law enforcement or sold at auction.

Newly-appointed Sen. Pamela Althoff (R-McHenry) is also a sponsor of the bill, which gained unanimous approval in the Senate Transportation Committee. Senate Bill 1581 now awaits consideration by the
