

Total awards at the May 2009 national exhibition in Santa Fe will approximate \$40,000 including a \$20,000 Best of Show.

OPA's national headquarters has been Crystal Lake since 2002. The majority of the board of directors are from the Chicago metropolitan area. The board has been responsible for developing a program that has increased their 1998 membership of 700 to 3,000 members in 2009.

Exhibiting OPA members at the Sage Gallery will include currently active OPA artists who have won many national

Another past president and Master Signature Member, Zhiwei Tu, won OPA's American National Award of Excellence. Illinois Enacts Law to Protect Biometric Information by Joette S. Doran, Esq.

In October 2008, Illinois enacted the Biometric Information Privacy Act, which seeks to protect individuals from possible identity theft. Biometric information includes retina or iris scans, fingerprints, voice prints, and the scan of hand or face geometry. Today, companies commonly use biometric information, such as using fingerprints as a means of payment such as at the grocery store or the gas station. Employers who collect and/or use biometric information for any reason may also be covered by the Act. rization. Moreover, if an outside agency performs the background check, an employer may be subject to the Act if it receives copies of biometric information as part of the hiring process. As such, employers should carefully review their procedures to determine whether they include the collection, use, or retention of fingerprints or other biometric data. In order to safeguard biometric information, the Act provides that an employer is to have a written policy which establishes guidelines for collection, use, storage, retention, disclosure and destruction of such information. A violation of the Act may result in actual or liquidated damages of \$1,000 for a negligent violation or \$5,000 for an intentional or reckless violation, in-



Leave No Child Inside Initiative for the Greater Barrington, Deer Park and Lake Zurich Area


Year round, children's physical, mental, by the Vehe Farm Foundation, involves a social and spiritual development is made healthier by regular outdoor, unstructured play in nature. This is the basic premise of Richard Louv's 2005 best-seller Last Child In the Woods: Saving Our Children From Nature Deficit Disorder. Louv's book has spurred an international Leave No Child Inside (LNCI) movement that works to get children outside and connected with nature. Chicago Wilderness brought this movement to the Chicago area and many area communities are beginning their own LNCI initiatives.

Locally, the LNCI Consortium, the members of which represent major sectors of the Greater Barrington, Deer Park and Lake Zurich area, is working to make getting kids outside and connected with nature a core value of the involved communities. This local initiative was started

number of area organizations and village governments, and is supported by a generous grant from the Barrington Area Community Foundation.

The local LNCI Consortium has created the Web site funoutside.org to encourage children and their parents to participate in local outdoor, nature-based activities and programs. Funoutside.org also provides information about regional and national LNCI initiatives, as well as research supporting the health benefits of getting children outside and into nature.

In support of the Consortium's efforts, the Vehe Farm Foundation is hosting two LNCI children's events at Vehe Farm in Deer Park. The foundation is a nonprofit volunteer organization created by the Village of Deer Park to provide stewardship services to Vehe Farm.

The February LNCI event is the "Great Big Backyard Bird Count. It takes place on Saturday, Feb. 14 from noon to 2 p.m. This event is part of a nationwide Audubon Society annual event and is being coordinated locally by the Prairie Woods Audubon Society. Aided by Audubon Society members, children will identify and count the birds they see at the farm and learn about Cornell University's use of the data to evaluate the health of bird habitats around the country. This event will take place rain, snow or shine.

Louis Vassmer, president of Prairie Woods Audubon, states "As a local chapter of the National Audubon Society, our mission is to conserve the environment, preserve wildlife and natural habitats, and provide opportunities for education, nature appreciation, and fellowship.'

The March LNCI event, "Owls for Children," is Saturday, March 7 from noon to 2 p.m. Children will see and learn about Screech Owls and Great Horned Owls and have the opportunity to dissect owl pellets to discover from tiny bones and hair filaments what owls eat. This event is being coordinated with Flint Creek Wildlife Rehabilitation in Barrington.


"Flint Creek Wildlife Rehabilitation is a state and federally licensed facility dedicated to the rehabilitation of injured and

orphaned wildlife with the goal of returning fully rehabilitated wildlife to its natural habitat. Flint Creek promotes respect for wildlife and wildlife habitats through public education programs and supports efforts to repopulate endangered and threatened wildlife species" states Dawn Keller, founder of Flint Creek Rehabilitation.

Art Educator to Interpret the Artwork of Edvard Munch

Plagued by morbid thoughts of death from an early age, Edvard Munch (1863-1944) turned to art in an attempt to explain to himself the meaning of life. Born in Adalsbruk in Loten, Norway, in 1863, Munch's pessimistic viewpoints were adopted early when his mother and favorite siblings died while Munch was still a young man. His childhood was further aggravated by constant bouts of illness during which he turned to painting to fulfill his creative talents, and for which he was chided by his father and even neighbors. Art was not a worthy career to pursue; but he pursued despite criticism and produced some of the most evocative works of the late 19th and early 20th cen-

On Friday, March 27, members of the Barrington/Northwest Community Associates (B/NWCA) will have the opportunity to learn more about Edvard Munch, the artist, and also about the age of expressionism represented in works of art and also in music composed during the same time period. Once a year, the Art Institute of Chicago (AIC) collaborates with the Chicago Symphony (CSO); this year's program is designed to correspond with an important exhibition at the Art Institute focusing on the work of Edvard Munch. Entitled "Dangerous Dreams: The Age of Anxiety" the collaboration between art and music will trace the dramatic changes in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The symbolist movement, the rise of nationalism, the dawn of psychoanalysis and the age of expressionism are reflected in

Munch's work and in works by his contemporaries-fellow artists, composers, poets and philosophers. Together their achievements reflected dramatically different perceptions, their subject matter and presentation often contradicting established axioms. Negative reactions were not uncommon. In 1892, Munch was invited to exhibit his paintings at a first one-man exhibition hosted by the Union of Berlin Artists. His paintings evoked such bitter controversy that the exhibition closed after one week. Munch's reaction-delight that "something as innocent as a painting should have created such a stir." Despite

Bisphosphonates: Actonel, Fossamax and More-What are the Risks?

Over the last decade, millions of patients have been prescribed bisphosphonates for bone-related disorders. Actonel and Fossamax are two widely used oral medications for osteoporosis. Aredia, Zometa and Bonefos are just a few of the IV bisphosphonates used in treating bone that has been compromised by cancer. Over the last three years, reports have come out showing that there may be a relationship between these drugs and osteonecrosis of the jaw bone.

shown to be with the IV forms of bisphosphonates. Some patients presented with lesions on their jaw following oral surgical procedures. Even ill-fitting, removable dentures or partials can cause the osteonecrosis. In some extremely rare cases, osteonecrosis started without any oral surgery. 





Are You Stressed?

We live in a fast-paced, competitive and often troubled society. The result can be chronic stress. Too much stress can cause serious problems. First, researchers have found that the people most likely to be stressed, those with a Type A personality, are two to three times more likely to die from coronary heart disease. Second, and related, stress can actually make you fat.

Stress has this effect on us because our bodies cannot tell the difference between stress caused by a physical threat, one we must physically fight or run away from, and the chronic, emotional stress we are most likely to face everyday. Since our bodies can't tell the difference, they react the same way to both. Our bodies react by providing maximum strength and energy to fight or run. This is done by releasing the hormones adrenaline, cortisol and insulin. The result is 5 to 10 minutes of quick energy due to the release of stored fuel in the body (fat and glucose). That's great if you must fight or run away from a physical threat, but when was the last time you did that?

Unfortunately, when we face our most common stressors, we are sitting at our desk or behind the wheel. So what happens to all that fat and glucose in our blood stream that was supposed to give us quick energy? Well, the job of the third hormone released by the body, insulin, is to get the fat and glucose out of the blood stream and store it for future use. The insulin often does this so well that we feel hungry. So the insulin stores the fat and

glucose as fat, most of it saved in the middle section of the body. We eat more because we are hungry, and that gets stored too. If we face prolonged or chronic stress, this cycle is repeated over and over, storing more and more fat on our midriffs and sometimes even leading to an additional problem from insulin resistance and type 2 diabetes.

Research has proven that the very best treatment for stress and its negative effects is NOT found at the drug store, but in the gym. Exercise is the cure. Physically, exercise burns fat and glucose, reduces cholesterol and triglycerides, improves all cardiovascular functions, and keeps hormones balanced. It helps our bodies work efficiently and well. Mentally, exercise calms our negative emotions and actually stimulates positive biochemical changes that improve mood and relieve pain. A fit person can deal with stress much better than people who are sedentary.





Rare Native Plants Free (to Good Homes)

Rare native plants will be given to volun- ful restoration of our prairies, savannas, teers willing to care for them in their own woodlands and wetlands. home gardens, according to a new initiative presented to potential volunteers at seed will be ready for distribution and the the Council of Barrington Garden Clubs on Jan. 14. All that's asked for in return is that home gardeners commit to nurturing these rare local plants and return the seeds their plants produce to the Native Seed Gardeners for use in restoring local conservation lands.

The Native Seed Gardeners (NSG) is a pilot program developed by Friends of Spring Creek Forest Preserves and Citizens for Conservation (CFC) with support from Audubon-Chicago Region, according to Sam Oliver, who made the presentation on behalf of both groups. Starter plants for the project are being grown this winter by the Chicago Botanic Garden. This program's purpose is to increase the amount of seed that is available to restore ecological health and diversity to the area's woodlands and prairies.

"We've been working for five years to restore hundreds of acres of beautiful forest preserve," said Friends' president Dave Cook of Barrington Hills. "We're making great progress. But it's clear that the main bottleneck is not having remotely enough seed from rare local plants."

"There is a severe shortage," Tom Vanderpoel of CFC explains. "Over the years we've learned that we cannot harvest from the wild enough seed from certain species crucial to the restoration projects." The native plants this project will supply to volunteers are essential to the success-

This spring, plants grown from local Native Seed Gardeners are now enrolling recruits to become home growers of beautiful and important woodland and prairie plants. Any interested person can find out more at www.nativeseedgardeners.org.

Gardening with rare native plants may be easier than you imagine. After the first year these plants typically need limited watering, no fertilizer, and just a little weeding.

Anyone willing to devote even a few square feet of lawn or garden can grow these rare wildowers and grasses. "You can put a small corner of any yard to work for nature. One plant can provide hundreds or thousands of seeds," said Kim Keper, a volunteer coordinator for NSG.

"This is a relaxing thing that people can do in 10 minutes of spare time every few days, and it's rewarding to have something like this at your house, that you can show to people and have sort of a personal relationship with. And it fits into my schedule," said John Dalen, a volunteer steward in the Spring Creek forest preserves.

Katherine Grover, an NSG volunteer coordinator said, "I see the gardeners as having varying degrees of skills, so we'll be sensitive to that. I want gardeners to have every opportunity to succeed." In fact, the NSG coordinators will help people determine which species and how many plants will grow best in their yard.

She continued, "Then the government would have to make investments that would earn a high enough rate of return to fund all of the promises that have been made."

"As the people of this country inaugurate their new president next week, and as the 111th Congress begins, it is imperative the truthful condition of our nation's finances be revealed," said Roger Nelson, chairman of IFTA's board of directors. He highlighted, "The truth is together with unfunded liabilities and promises to our retirees we're in the hole for over \$59 trillion. We need to understand this truth before we can move forward with any new proposals."

The Financial State of the Union, available at www.truthinaccounting.org, provides this accounting by outlining the financial situation of the nation, including unfunded liabilities for Social Security, Medicare and other retirement benefits. The report, which is available in a one-

page, downloadable PDF format, is designed to draw attention to our true financial situation at such a critical time as our president-elect's first address.

"Debt has become our country's drug of choice, personally and nationally, and until we are honest with ourselves about how much we really owe, we can't begin to solve this problem," warned Weinberg. "Treasury and the politicians say our nation's debt is only \$10.6 trillion, which assumes we owe no promises benefits to our seniors."






