

The HARPS Farm Festival Great Fun

On Sept. 27, the Hooved Animal Protection and Rescue Society (HARPS) opened the gates to its farm in Barrington Hills, ushering in fall and over 600 guests with the HARPS Farm Festival, an annual event of equine entertainment, great eats and allaround fun.

Arriving guests were greeted with the live music of Sheila Eiler and Matt McBride, whose eclectic sounds complemented the various activities spread around the lawn next to the horse barn. Face painting, carnival games and pony rides were a hit with the kids; the barbecue sizzling on several grills appealed to all. Vendors dotted the area, selling such wares as custom jewelry; and a sports-themed silent auction offered, among its items, an autographed photo of Arnold Palmer and signed Ernie Banks jersey.

The highlight of the festival, however, as much fun as the other activities provided, was of the equine sort. In a large pasture up the hill from the barn, a series of performances took place, each one a kind of magic in its own right, including and perhaps especially, the HARPS parade of horses. Led by HARPS volunteers and friends, these horses were tangible proof of the dedication and effort put forth by HARPS founder and director Donna Ewing, her daughter Ronda Ewing and all the volunteers: once victims of abuse and neglect, once terrified, sick and emaciated, they now marched past their audience with shiny coats and well-fed bellies, equine survivors all.

If the HARPS horse parade symbolized the compassion inherent to its rescue effort, other exhibitions showed the versatility, talents and training potential of the equine species. Not to mention how cute miniature horses are, particularly when they pull carts, as did the Double L. Miniature Horse Driving Drill Team, giving those Clydesdales favored by Budweiser beer ads a run for their money.

Not to be outdone in the "cute" department, Richard Bruner and his horse. Maverick, showed off their tricks, with Maverick lying down on command, then sitting up in an amusing imitation of any good dog, followed by a big smooch bestowed upon his beloved owner.

The deep bond of trust and love between horse and human was further displayed by Ronda Ewing and Elko Dann, a real life Wild West mustang and another HARPS rescue story. With flawless form and perfect symmetry, Ronda and Elko sailed over a course of heart stopping jumps, some of them nearly four feet high.

The highlight of the festival's equine extravaganza was the breathtaking dressage performances of seven incredible stallions, among them Andalusians, Lusitanos and Fresians. Ridden by top equestrians and headed by Mario Contreras, best known for his expert training of the Medieval Times horses, the stallions executed a choreographed routine of classical perfection. Horses and riders worked together in unspoken harmony, reminiscent of the Lippizan tradition.

The nobility and beauty of the equine performances at the HARPS Farm Festival made unequivocally clear the motivation for the hard work HARPS does every single day of the year. The festival was a culmination of that hard work-a day of celebration of the connection between horse and human

Fourth-Graders on the Prairie —A New Collaboration

"Wow! This is ambitious and exciting! "Whatever you need for me to do outdoors is fine... "I think this is important and am glad to help out if needed. "If you need to beef up the person-power, fill me in whenever necessary, and let me know. "Let me know what you need and I'll do it.'

What prompted this outpouring of offers to be involved? Thanks to a two-year grant from the Barrington District 220 Educational Foundation to the Barrington 220 elementary science program, all 770

fourth-graders in the district had a science unit on Prairie Preservation in their classrooms and a field trip to a prairie (Grigsby, Spring Creek or Flint Creek Savanna) nearest their school where they hiked, created drawings, took plant measurements and did the vital work of collecting seed for prairie preservation. All of this happened in September and early October.

This collaborative effort began in June with two half-days of introduction to the prairie and curriculum writing (Citizens for Conservation (CFC), a group of Barrington 220 teachers, and their science curriculum consultant). In early August, fourth-grade teachers studied the new curriculum and hiked Grigsby Prairie. This was followed by a similar session for the remaining fourth-grade teachers in September. Recruitment for the many volunteers that were needed to carry out the

project was time consuming but gratifying. Many CFC volunteers as well as Friends of Spring Creek Forest Preserve, the schools' volunteer Nature Ladies, and scores of parent volunteers helped with this expe-

As described by the foundation, this two-year project is "a collaborative effort between District 220 and Citizens for Conservation that provides an opportunity for children to engage in the authentic work of 'doing science' in Barrington's distinctive environment of prairie and marshland. Along with classroom curriculum, students will have the opportunity to be 'citizen scientists' and connect more with the natural world."

An advance team from Citizens for Conservation made pre-visits to all eight schools' fourth-graders to help them prepare for their roles as citizen scientists and

U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission Increases Enforcement

The U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) is the federal agency charged enforcing the federal laws against employment discrimination. Recently, the EEOC has taken a more aggressive approach in enforcing the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The ADA is the federal statute that prevents employment discrimination on the basis of disability. In 2008, the ADA was amended and greatly expanded the individuals who are protected under the ADA's definition of disability. Of particular concern to the EEOC are company medical leave of absence policies that place limits on the amount of medical leave.

Recently, the EEOC announced a \$6.2 million settlement in connection with class case involving a Sears, Roebuck and Co.'s alleged inflexible leave limit policy. That case arose from a charge of discrimination filed with the EEOC by a former Sears's service technician. According to the EEOC, the employee was injured on the job, took workers' compensation leave, and, although remaining disabled by the injuries, repeatedly attempted to return to work. According to the EEOC, Sears did not provide the employee with a reasonable acback to work and, instead, fired him when situation. his leave expired.

Recently, the EEOC has also filed a number of pattern and practice lawsuits on behalf of employees of large employers alleging that the employers violated the ADA by rejecting extensions of medical leave as a reasonable accommodation for employees with disabilities. The EEOC asserts that it is unlawful if any employer that maintains an inflexible maximum



leave policy, which it will not extend or otherwise modify in order to accommodate individuals with disabilities. As such, employers should review their medical leave of absence policies and processes to ensure that they provide appropriate flexibility to accommodate individuals with disabilities. This includes engaging in a good faith interactive process with employees whose leave may be ending to discuss potential reasonable accommodations which may include a reasonable extension of leave.

\$1 Million Donation Brings Hospice Close to Campaign Goal

Northeastern Illinois (HNI) provided endof-life care to an ailing woman, something its care teams do for many patients every day. Last week, that patient's grateful husband made a \$1 million gift in her memory to the agency's capital campaign to build a new inpatient facility in Barrington.

This donation has taken HNI to within \$900,000 of reaching its capital campaign goal to build the new Pepper Family Hospice Home and Center for Care.

"This generous gift came from an area resident in memory of his wife who passed away last year in our care," said Beth Raseman, vice president of development. "His generous gift now brings total donations to \$17.6 million, moving us considerably closer to reaching (or exceeding) our project cost of \$18.5 million. The donor, who wishes to remain anonymous, hopes his gift will inspire others to give and help Hospice and Palliative Care of Northeastern Illinois raise the remaining funds. We thank him for his generosity

According to Raseman, when making his pledge to the campaign, the donor spoke of the wonderful care his wife received from the HNI care team, and said he had been planning on making a gift to the project for some time.

"Each and every day our staff members go into patient's homes, nursing homes and hospitals and care for the dying and their families. The care teams do their best allow HPCNI staff to continue to care for

Last fall, Hospice and Palliative Care of to care for the patients, to relieve their pain and suffering and to assist them in any way possible," Raseman stated. "Often we never know exactly how that care will influence a family. We hope that they will have had their burden eased, that our grief support will support them in the months following their loss, and that they will refer others to our hospice. Sometimes the family directs memorials toward HNI, or organizes a fundraiser to support one of our programs, and sometimes that person hears about our hospice home project and wants to help. What happened today is the result of how one of those families chose to help give back to us.

> Officially accepting pledges and donations for nearly 18 months, the agency's "Building a Legacy of Care: The Time is Now" capital campaign will continue until its goal is met. Located on Lake Zurich Road, off Route 14, the new Pepper Family Hospice Home and Center for Care is a freestanding, LEED-certified (green) facility which will consist of 16 inpatient rooms, a family room, children's play area, dining room, clinical team space, staff and volunteer training/education rooms, quite/ meditation room, the Center for Loss and Hope (bereavement support), and administrative offices.

What Happens in College Doesn't Stay in College...as Far as Your **Mouth is Concerned!** by Angela Egedus RDH

A load of classes, tests, parties, dorm life, sports and ramen noodles... aah, it's the life of a college student. It can be exciting, fun, nerve wracking and stressful. The hectic lifestyle of college students discourages a normal oral hygiene routine and frequently causes the health of their mouth to go by the wayside.

The recommended two times per year hygiene visit and exam can quickly become once every few years and, of course, only when there's an obvious problem. Hygiene visits help prevent disease both in gums, teeth and the jaw. These maintenance visits catch problems when they are small and can be taken care of easily. Letting the mouth go unchecked for too long can lead to much more painful conditions, more expensive/time consuming treatment options, as well as damage that is beyond restoration. We see it happen! A student who left for college in good oral health sometimes comes back to us with multiple areas of decay, gum disease, STDs, jaw misalignment and other issues.

Busy schedules alter priorities. College life will pass but your mouth will remain with you forever. What happens in college doesn't stay in college, as far as your mouth is concerned. It is a choice whether your mouth will survive in a healthy condition or not. As your dental hygienist, I strongly encourage you to brush two times per day and floss daily. No time?

Make time! A suggestion I have is to gently brush your teeth for about 10 minutes when you're watching TV. Use a dry toothbrush without toothpaste. Just slowly work your way around your teeth. While you're at it, you might as well floss too.


Stress of college life, for example, can also exaggerate some underlying conditions such as jaw clicking, painful muscles of head/neck, headaches, and other disharmony between the jaw muscles, joint, and teeth. You should not assume that it is a normal part of life. It is difficult enough to get through an intense curriculum without these painful conditions to add to this challenging task. A dentist can

A combination of poor nutrition, poor oral hygiene habits, and lack of rest, can lead to ANUG. A low immune system, drinking and smoking can also contribute to the condition. You can prevent this condition by eating well, making healthy life choices, going to the dentist, maintaining proper oral hygiene habits, getting eight hours of sleep nightly, and eliminating stress as much as possible.



The Best Exercises by Patrick Durbin

Which exercise program is the best for burning the most calories in a day?

The two main programs to discuss are cardio programs and strength programs. Each program acts on your body in a different way, so they should be examined separately to determine which is best for promoting weight loss.

A cardio program usually consists of various forms of cardiovascular exercise performed three to

six days per week. Each 45-minute session of exercise at moderate intensity burns approximately 400 calories. More challenging types of cardio at higher intensities may burn up to 600 calories in a 45-

A strength program of equal duration will burn roughly half the calories of the cardio session. But, a strength training session will increase the amount of calories burned over a longer period of time. For every pound of lean muscle gained over the whole body, you will burn an extra 50 calories while at rest.

So, does this mean that a session of cardio causes greater energy expenditure than a strength training session of equal duration?

Yes, however there are other factors to consider which influence your caloric expenditure for the rest of the day after you have

Resting Metabolic Rate (RMR) is a term that is used often, but is not always understood. RMR is the minimum number of calories required to fuel the vital functions required for life. When you exercise, your RMR increases due to chemical and hormonal changes and it stays elevated for quite some time after you exercise.

After a cardio session your RMR remains elevated for two to three hours; however, the RMR has been reported to remain elevated for 10 to 15 hours after a strength training session. After following a strength training program for some time, your daily RMR may increase as you build more muscle. Muscle is more metabolically active than fat, so individuals with more muscle mass usually have higher resting metabolic rates.

While a cardio program provides an immediate higher caloric expenditure, a strength training program provides a caloric expenditure of the same magnitude, but spaced



over a longer period of time. 



From a Woman's Point of View

As parents, one of our primary obligations to our children is to do everything in our power to keep them safe. They don't always cooperate with us, especially when very young; anyone who has ever had to strap a kicking, screaming, back-arching toddler into a car seat can attest to that fact. I have found that as they get older, they can be very persuasive in making a case for not using a booster seat, and sometimes when you've got a full car it's tempting to let your fourth- or fifth-grader sit in the front seat for short trips. Recently, while we were waiting to pick our kids up after school, my friends and I debated over what the guidelines were for child safety restraints. Since we couldn't come to a consensus, I decided to do a little re-

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), there is a four-step process to child passenger safety. To summarize:

- 1. Rear-facing child safety seats should be used in the back seat until an infant reaches a minimum of 1 year of age and at least 20 pounds.
- 2. Forward-facing child safety seats should be used in the back seat until the child reaches the upper weight or height limit of the particular seat (usually around age 4 and 40 pounds).



- 3. Once children outgrow their forward-facing seats (usually at age 4 or 40 pounds), they should ride in booster seats in the back seat until the seat belt fits properly, usually at age 8 or when they are 4-feet-9-inches tall.
- 4. When children outgrow their booster seats, they can use the adult seat belt in the back seat, if it fits properly (lap belt lays across the upper thighs and the shoulder belt fits across the chest). All children under 13 should ride in the back






