The ayes and nayes were finally called for on the passage of the ordinance as originally read with the exception of the rate of speed, which had been raised to 12 miles an hour, and resulted as follows: Ayes-Hatje, Willmarth and Collen; nayes-Grunau, Robertson and Peters. This left the president to decide the matter, and he voted "aye."
