

"Hearts in Motion" Jan Broders' **Travels To Help Guatemalans**

My whole world changed after a 5 hour flight... A late evening arrival in Guatemala City and a 3 1/2 hour drive through the mountains to Zacapa, our headquarters...3:30 am...and a warm greeting from Karen, our dedicated leader. An early wake up call and a quick cold shower behind us, we left to pick up sandwiches and plastic milk bags to take to the dump. There over 200 people living in this dump. These are terrible conditions that these

people endure.

From the dump we went to the hospital where the first clinic was set up to screen the people that were possible candidates for surgery. Since we had 60 in our group there were lots of jobs for all of us. I spent my day sorting medications in the hall of the hospital, while others set up for surgery for the coming week. At day's end, 40 children were selected to have clef pallets repaired and given the news. Many were turned away. We visited 5 medical/dental clinics in the mountains. We traveled by old school buses and our trips were at least 2 hours each way. When we arrived there was always a crowd waiting for us. There were local people that helped us take them in the order they arrived. The medical problems were many with stomach problems or headaches. Many of these problems arise from the poor nutrition of the area. Vitamins were given to all who

The dental treatment is basically pulling of decayed teeth, fluoride painting of the children's teeth and teaching them proper dental care. Each clinic visitor was given a toothbrush and toothpaste. As we were leaving Zacapa we stopped at a Catholic nutrition center which houses 30 malnourished babies. I held a 20 month old little girl that did not weigh 10 pounds. The program here nourishes the child and teaches the parents how to continue to care for them when they return home. This was truly a heart touching experience and the whole trip has changed my life forever

Hearts In Motion from Highland, Indiana was the group that I traveled with to Guatemala. They have just been given 17 acres by one of the mayors to build a permanent facility that will become headquarters of this organization. Myself and another Jan from Advocate Good Shepherd Hospital came back with our task of trying to raise the money for their nutrition center. Our intention is to focus our fundraising on the community here in Northern Illinois.
