
# Catchpenny...The Little Store That Could..

#### About the Auxiliary of Advocate Good Shepherd Hospital:

The Auxiliary of Advocate Good Shepherd Hospital is comprised of more than 400 volunteers who assist the hospital in promoting the health and welfare of the community. The Auxiliary, comprised of both men and women of all ages, is a self-governing organization directly accountable to hospital administration. As such, the Auxiliary and the Department of Volunteer Services have separate, specific roles and responsibilities.

Through continuous communication and interaction, they offer each other mutual support and understanding.

The Auxiliary's responsibilities include serving as a liaison between the hospital and the community, fundraising, and taking part in activities, such as legislative advocacy and the promotion of good health, that strengthen and improve our health care delivery system. The Auxiliary operates the Pear Tree Gift Shop and the Pear Tree Café in the hospital, the Partridge Coffee Shop in the Outpatient Pavilion, and the Catchpenny Resale Shoppe in downtown Barrington. All proceeds directly benefit the hospital. Through fundraising events like the annual Art in the Barn and Chef Fest, the Auxiliary sponsors scholarships for healthcare students and provides financial support for hospital expansion projects. The Auxiliary also provides material for the "Luv Ewes", a group of dedicated women who provide patient enrichment through handcrafted items such as tray favors, pillows, toe warmers, hats/blankets for newborns, Kangaroo Blankets for underweight newborns, toys for younger patients, eyeglass cases and hats for patients experiencing hair loss due to chemotherapy.
