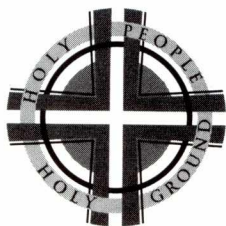

With Holy Week, Easter, Confirmations, and now First Communion, it's been a while since I've written a Stewardship article, and I know you must have missed them terribly (yea...sure). It's time for a quick update.

The Stewardship team has been focused on the gathering and compiling of information from the various parish ministries and organizations for our new "Directory". We are also in the process of putting together a Stewardship Web Site that will link to our new parish website, www.stannebarrington.org.

Both the new Directory and Website will serve the purpose of matching peoples personal skills, interests and talents with the needs of our various ministries and organizations. One might call it a "love connection", in which people who are willing to share themselves, their time, talent and treasure, will have an opportunity to discern where their personal gifts and efforts are best placed.

Maintaining and updating the Directory and Website will be a "Stewardship

Service Volunteer Coordinator" who among other things will also serve to assist the Stewardship Team in encouraging more service and volunteerism among our parish community members. Our personal time and talent are not just important resources, they are God-given gifts, skills and talents we are expected to share with others. This very basic premise is what we are expected to share with others. This very basic premise is what animates the goals and objectives of our Stewardship Ministry Team, in urging stewardship as the Christian life-style for all of us. As a way of life, it reflects Jesus' command "to love one another". It also reflects our gratefulness for gifts received from our Lord and Creator.

The two Leadership Day conferences that our Parish Council sponsored recently, affirms our work in encouraging increased participation by parish community members, as well as the importance of volunteer service coordination. Helping individuals discern where their personal skills, talents and gifts can best be utilized, and then encouraging them and supporting them to move ahead to share those

gifts, is an important role the Stewardship Team continues to develop. Helping our various ministries and parish organizations find the most talented people to assist them is another important part of that effort and role. Lastly, in conjunction with our REP Lenten project, the proceeds of the children's Sunday collections from the first quarter (\$892.95), have been combined with the children's Lenten almsgiving contributions and sent to the Heifer Foundation. That organization, as part of their 'Ark' program, provides animals around the world to needy communities and families who in turn are trained to raise the animals. The contributions of our children's stewardship thus maintains a "global" outreach and sensitivity to the needs of those in other countries of the world.

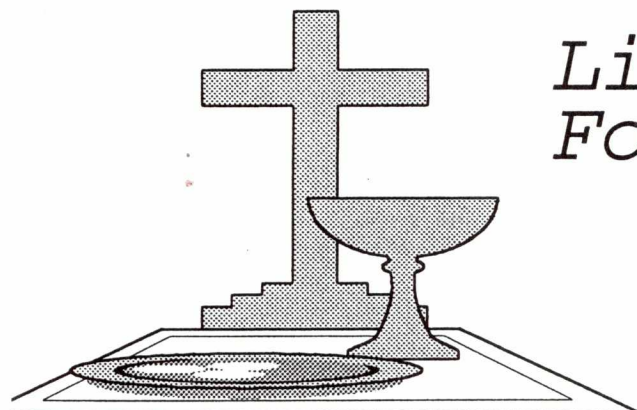

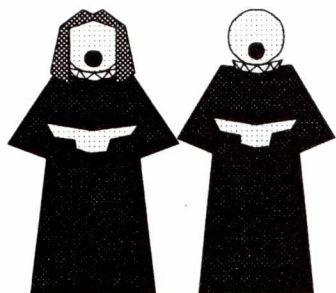
Liturgical Ministry Formation For Teens

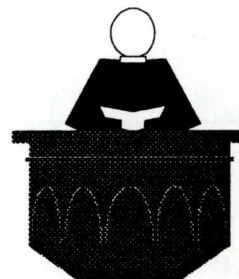

Radically Alive

At a seminar of the School Sisters of St. Francis, Sister Lucinda Hubing gave a presentation entitled "An Invitation to be Radically Alive." The material of this article is gleaned from her talk. She began with a story.

There was a left-handed boy who often felt "different" because of his condition. One day he came to his mother in all happiness to declare, "Mom, do you know that God created the whole world with his left hand--elephants, bugs, whales, goldfish, flowers?" His mother replied, "Who told you that?" "No one," he said, "I figured it out. I just learned that Jesus sits at the right hand of God the Father."

Sister believes the whole purpose of life is to speed along on our path to be fully alive, fully human, fully in sync with our universe, one with God in and through each other. We are not the same people today as we were yesterday or last year, physically or spiritually. We are never static, but always progressing or digressing, depending on what we feel, think,

create, teach, say, and do. We also affect everyone and all creation by our thoughts, because our thoughts create a ripple effect across the universe. To be able to think, feel, and speak at our highest level, we need to focus completely on God in the service of others; we need to keep creativity alive in our souls.

The little boy in the story is a lesson in creativity for us. Finley Eversole tells us that "In our society, at the age of five, 90% of the population measures high creativity. By the age of seven, the figure drops to 10%. The percentage of adults with high creativity rating is 2%." Why? We worry about all that will never happen and neglect to think of that which might or will happen. We create limits, parameters, and barriers for ourselves and others.

The process of learning is wanting to know. But we often discourage learning by being involved only in answers. Rather, we should encourage

the asking of questions. A situation that makes us ask questions is more valuable than one that seems to have all the answers. When we are absolutely convinced that we have the one and only right answer, we close the doors to a creative process. Made in God's image, we must not only have a tolerance for diversity, we must reverence it.

Matthew Fox suggests that we should all take a vow of creativity. We should vow to remain creative, to induce creativity in others, and to support one another in creativity. We would, then, usher in a whole new spiritual era and usher out pessimism. He suggests that we reimmerge ourselves in the universe of beauty and the beauty of the universe. This is another way of becoming fully human.

Spend some time in reflecting upon your invitation to be radically alive!

5th Sunday of Easter, 2001 (54C)

Acts 14: 21-27 (NCCB)

21 After Paul and Barnabas had proclaimed the good news to that city and made a considerable number of disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch.

22 They strengthened the spirits of the disciples and exhorted them to persevere in the faith, saying, "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God."

23 They appointed presbyters for them in each church and, with prayer and fasting, commended them to the Lord in whom they had put their faith.

24 Then they traveled through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia.

25 After proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia.

26 From there they sailed to Antioch, where they had been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now accomplished.

27 And when they arrived, they called the church together and reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles.

Revelation 21:1-5a (NCCB)

1 Then I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth.

The former heaven and the former earth had passed away, and the sea was no more.

2 I also saw the holy city, a new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband.

3 I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race. He will dwell with them and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them as their God.

4 He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, for the old order has passed away."

5 The One who sat on the throne said, "Behold, I make all things new."

John 13:1, 31-33a, 34-35 (CCCB)

1 Before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end.

31 During the supper, when Judas had gone out, Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him.

32 If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once.

33 "Little children, I am with you only a little longer.

34 I give you a new commandment, that you love one another.

Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another.

35 By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."



Cultural Perspective

Verse 1 serves to "introduce" this pericope from John's gospel and establish that it is from the so-called Final Discourse during which the disciples share in the final meal with Jesus and are shown graphically that foot washing is to be the hallmark of discipleship.

Verses 31-32 form a leave-taking. Verse 31b seems clear enough: . . . and God has been glorified in him (him = Jesus). Verse 32b means: . . . God will also glorify him (Jesus) in himself (God) and will glorify him at once (passion, death, resurrection and ascension are directly ahead). John had previously announced this at 12:23 - the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified . . . unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies it produces much fruit. (But see below under honor/shame.) Finally, in vv. 33a-35 John describes Jesus as giving a "new commandment." This seems to be related to a kind of covenant love that is nuanced differently from the covenant love in the Hebrew scripture. John describes Jesus as emphasizing in the Final Discourse a kind of love that has to do with intimacy, indwelling, and mutual knowledge (I know mine and mine know me!). This is the ultimate: Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. John is crystal clear to his community: the One whom we say we follow is asking that we love one another even to the point of laying down our lives for one another just as he has done for us; if we manifest this kind of love, everyone will understand that we are indeed his intimate friends. The witness of the community of Jesus friends is therefore to be THE way that the world will continue to encounter Jesus until he comes. It is sounded clearly in 17:22ff when Jesus prays for those who will come to believe in him through the witness of his friends: . . . so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may be brought to perfection as one, that the world may know that you sent me, and that you loved them even as you loved me. (But

see this whole prayer of Jesus at chapter 17; it is most beautiful).

Recall that honor/shame is the core value in Mediterranean culture, which requires that honor be a public claim to worth with the accompanying public acknowledgment of that claim. Here, John shows Jesus as claiming the honor of being an obedient son by willingly laying down his life in response to his Father (10:17, For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father. In turn note that that the Father is honored by the Son's obedience even unto death. John shows the Father's great claim to honor is in raising Jesus from the dead since this completely reverses the shame (loss of honor) of the ignoble death by crucifixion; God did not abandon his only begotten Son (a just person) to perpetual shame but instead, bestowed on him an honor that no one could counter or deny: God raised him from the dead. This is ultimate glory.

Western concepts of honor seem different. In business, we hear of corporate chiefs who are even extended "golden parachutes" despite their inept mishandling of their responsibility to care for the company and its shareholders. Recall Pete Rose who although disgraced by being banned from baseball for his alleged gambling activities nevertheless was later proposed for the Hall of Fame. Our culture accepts the adversarial concept in its courts to the extent that those shamed are expected to take their case there for judgement. Even a

Timothy McVeigh is allowed his day in court. In Mediterranean honor/shame terms, this is unacceptable; in fact, using an attorney and going to court is shameful and is an admission that the challenge to one's honor is very great and insurmountable.

So what? Questions: Does keeping in mind the Mediterranean concept of honor change our understanding of the scripture describing Jesus' glorification? In our own culture, how do we understand Jesus command to love one another as he had loved us? What, for example, do we make of the contention that there are those "poor" who deserve our attention and ministrations and there are those poor who do not deserve anything.

Look at the breadth of God's justice described in the verses of the psalm for today. The dominion of God's extends through time and space and the psalmist sings thus of God:

The LORD is gracious and merciful,
slow to anger and of great kindness.
The LORD is good to all
and compassionate toward all his works.
And we respond: I will praise your name
forever, my king and my God.

In the first of the series written on the Communion of Saints depicted in our new church a biography about Mary Magdalene was inadvertently published. The information gathered was based on legends that have been told throughout the history of the church regarding Mary Magdalene. In recent biblical scholarship the following information regarding Mary Magdalene's life is a more accurate account of who she was in the life of Jesus.

Mary Magdalene is known as the Apostle to the Apostles. Mary Magdalene is featured prominently whenever the evangelists mention the women who ministered to Jesus. Matthew, Mark, and John record she was present at Our Lord's passion, burial and that she was among the women who visited the tomb on Easter morning. Luke mentions only the Easter morning incident. What we can be reasonably sure about based on the gospels is that Mary was present with Jesus in his darkest hour and again in his most glorious hour. Her privileged position accorded to her by all the Gospel writers stresses her role as the bringer of good news, the herald of Christ's resurrection.

LOCATED TO THE LEFT OF THE

The statue of St. Patrick is placed on the West side of the church to signify his role as missionary to the people of the West. The two primary roles of the bishop are to be pastor and teacher. Patrick is garbed in simple shepherd cloths emphasizing his role as shepherd of the Irish people. St. Patrick has a special place in the hearts of many Chicago Area residents-for many of the early immigrants were of Irish descent.

There are many legends about St. Patrick and much of Patrick's life is shrouded in mystery. Historians disagree on many dates and places in his life story. Patrick was born sometime around 380 in Scotland or Wales. His parents were Calpurnius and Conchessa, who were Romans living in Britain in charge of the colonies. His real name was believed to be Maewyn Succat; he took the name Patrick (or Patricus) after he became a priest.

As a boy of about fifteen or sixteen, he was captured during a raiding party. He was taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep for an Irish chieftain named Milchu who lived on Slemish Mountain in County Antrim. Patrick's captivity lasted six years. He escaped after he had a dream from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast. After a journey of 200 miles, he found a ship which took him back to Britain, where he was reunited with his family.

After his return to Britain, he had another dream in which the people of Ireland were calling out to him "We beg you, holy youth, to come and walk among us once more." He recorded his call to his vocation (and other dreams from God) in the "Confessio," his spiritual autobiography. It is one of his few writings that have survived. He left the comfort of his family for France where he began his studies for the priesthood in continental monasteries. His only other writing to survive, "Epistola" pleads the case for the Christian Irish at the hands of their British conquerors. Both writings show him as a humble, gentle man of faith.

It is believed that Patrick was sent to Ireland as a bishop to replace Saint Palladius who died in 431. He arrived in Ireland in 432 or 433, at Slane. Despite constant threats to his life, Patrick traveled

widely through Ireland, baptizing, confirming, and preaching. He converted thousands and began building churches, monasteries, and schools all over the country. It is said that he and his disciples converted almost all the population of Ireland. He eventually made his headquarters in Armagh. After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461. He died at Saul, where he had built the first church and is reputedly buried at nearby Downpatrick.

The Death Penalty and Timothy McVeigh

"The 'tantalizing' manner in which [Timothy McVeigh's execution] is becoming a national media event compounds" the difficulty of "rational analysis," Archbishop Daniel Buechlein of Indianapolis, general chairman of the Indiana Catholic Conference, said in a statement April 2. Yet, Buechlein said, "the good of society requires that we rise to the challenge of a measured and larger vision." McVeigh is scheduled to be executed May 16 at the federal prison in Terre Haute, Ind. It would become the first federal execution in more than 38 years. McVeigh was convicted of conspiracy and murder for the April 1995 bombing that destroyed the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City and killed 168 people. "We can't imagine the full impact of the shocking loss of the families and friends whose loved ones, including small children, were victims of human madness," Buechlein said. "Even as our church opposes the death penalty in a case as awful as McVeigh's, we do not question in principle the state's right to impose the death penalty," the archbishop said. "Yet we must oppose the death penalty because the circumstances of our day do not warrant it." Buechlein said that "the state should not exercise its right if evil effects outweigh the good" and that "the death penalty does more harm than good because it feeds a frenzy for revenge." He said that we "must never forget the victims of crime and their bereaved loved ones." He added, "The truly honorable memorial is to choose life rather than death." His text follows.

It would be difficult to imagine a more heinous crime than the catastrophic explosion of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City in April 1995. We can't imagine the full impact of the shocking loss of the families and friends whose loved ones, including small children, were victims of human madness. We continue to pray for the victims and their families.

What twisted mind could perpetrate such a crime against innocent humanity? Not a foreign terrorist, but a citizen from America's heartland mas-termined this act of violence.

Timothy James McVeigh was tried and duly convicted of this sordid crime in a court of law. He has been sentenced to death, and there is little sentiment in favor of staying his execution, now less than a month away. As we approach the first federal execution

in our country in more than 38 years, many believe no criminal is more deserving of the death penalty.

Like no other, the McVeigh case tests the mettle of the emerging Catholic view about the inappropriateness of capital punishment. Rational analysis is difficult in the face of the emotion that this man's crime evokes. The "tantalizing" manner in which this is becoming a national media event compounds the task. Yet in matters such as this, the good of society requires that we rise to the challenge of a measured and larger vision.

Last October Jesuit theologian Cardinal Avery Dulles traced the history of religious teaching on the death penalty through the ages and demonstrated that the Catholic Church has consistently asserted that the state has the authority to exact capital punishment and, in principle, does so today.¹

"As we approach the first federal execution in our country in more than 38 years, many believe no criminal is more deserving of the death penalty. Like no other, the McVeigh case tests the mettle of the emerging Catholic view about the inappropriateness of capital punishment."

"It is agreed," Dulles said, "that crime deserves punishment in this life and not only in the next. In addition, it is agreed that the state has the authority to administer appropriate punishment to those judged guilty of crimes and that this punishment may, in serious cases, include the sentence of death."

But what is "appropriate"

punishment? This is the question raised for our day by Pope John Paul II. Dulles outlined the four purposes of criminal punishment in general:

1. Rehabilitation. The penalty should try to bring the criminal to repentance and to moral reform. (Under certain circumstances this could lead to a return to normal civil life.)

2. Defense against the criminal. The government is obliged to protect society by preventing the criminal from committing additional crimes. For heinous crimes, the church favors life imprisonment without parole rather than death.

3. Deterrence. Punishment should discourage further violence and crime. We believe life imprisonment without parole does so.

4. Retribution. Punishment should try to restore the right order violated by the crime. A criminal should pay a price for the offense committed. If possible, the victims of the crime should be compensated for the wrong suffered. This does not mean revenge.

Dulles also summarized four objections to capital punishment in our day:

1. Wrongful death. The possibility that the convict may be innocent is the more common reason for opposition to the death penalty. A significant number of wrongly accused criminals on death row have been proven innocent.

2. Revenge not justice. The death penalty seems to fan the flame of revenge (and violence) rather than foster a genuine sense of justice in society.

3. Devaluation of human life. Capital punishment contributes dramatically to the devaluation of human life in an escalating culture of death.

4. Incompatibility with Christian forgiveness. While pardon does not remove the obligation of justice, capital punishment seems incompatible with the teaching of Jesus about forgiveness.

Even as our church opposes the death penalty in a case as awful as McVeigh's, we do not question in principle the state's right to impose the death penalty. Yet we must oppose the death penalty because the circumstances of our day do not warrant it. Pope John Paul II wrote in his encyclical *Evangelium Vitae* ("The Gospel of Life"), "As a result of steady improvements in the organization of the penal system," cases in which the execution of the offender would be absolutely necessary "are very rare, if not practically nonexistent" (No. 56).

The church's teaching on the state's authority does not change, but the state should not exercise its right if the evil effects outweigh the good. In recent times the death penalty does more harm than good because it feeds a frenzy for revenge, while there is no demonstrable proof that capital punishment deters violence.

Revenge neither liberates the families of victims nor ennobles the victims of crime. Only forgiveness liberates.

To be sure, we as a society must never forget the victims of crime and their bereaved loved ones. The truly honorable memorial is to choose life rather than death. ♦

This command of Jesus recorded in John sounds so simple. And at times it is: when I see a new baby; when my toddler grandson comes running after I call; when my teenager comes home on time with a dent-free car; when my adult child calls just to talk; when my husband does a household chore that is usually mine; when I'm first in line at the grocery store. These are the times I find it easy to be loving and lovable.

But what about when the baby is crying inconsolably; when my grandson runs across the parking lot; when my teenager calls to say she won't be back on time because the police are coming to take an accident report; when my adult child is too busy to call; when the shared chores aren't done; when I'm fifth in line at the grocery. What a challenge it is for me to loving and lovable.

When I am empathetic, the person Jesus calls me to be and I want to be, then I know: the baby is communicating the best way it can; my grandson doesn't realize that the parking lot is a dangerous playground; my teenager changed lanes to avoid an accident; my adult child is trying a lot of new and exciting things; a clean neat home isn't always top priority.

We human beings are reactive. We easily echo what is around us. And when I'm tired, I'm impatient; when I'm hungry, I'm cranky; when I have not exercised, I'm tense; when I'm uninformed, I'm judgmental. But when I miss daily prayer, I am much more off center.

When I'm prayerful I am much more the loving, lovable, empathetic human being God created me to be. Many others see the power of prayer: David prayed; Jesus often went to pray alone; George Washington is quoted at prayer in Valley Forge; Cardinal Bernardin stated in *The Gift Of Peace* that he liked what he found at the beginning of each day with an hour of prayer.

As we move forward, I would like to see the board work to maintain the standards set above while continuing to focus on the emotional and spiritual growth of our children. Creating a welcoming and warm atmosphere where respect for others, service to others, and character building are emphasized should be a priority for the board. By focusing on our Christian values we can, together with parish resources, continue to grow a school that nurtures our children and serves its community.

To The St. Anne Catholic Community,

We have been in our parish new buildings for a year. These past months have given us time to see things that are working well and areas that need attention. The following policies are a response to that need. Written for the good of the entire parish in the light of the vision that was shared in the original design concepts, they are intended to insure respect for each other as well as church property. Please read the following pages carefully and take them seriously. We hope you will make every effort to help each other keep our facilities in good condition and working with each other devoid of conflicts. Thank you in advance for your cooperation. -- *Fr. Jack*

Rooms available for use only through reservation

Each building on the campus is equipped with handicap accessibility and elevators.

How To Reserve:

Forms are available in the Parish Office and *must be filled out for ALL room reservations*. Phone reservations will not be accepted. When filling out a room reservation form, please submit a separate form for each event/setup. You cannot put multiple dates on one request form. All questions should be directed to the **parish reservation coordinator at 847-382-5300**.

Notify the parish reservation coordinator and maintenance staff if your event has been cancelled or rescheduled. A setup drawing for larger events must be submitted to maintenance at least *two (2) weeks prior to the event*. You are responsible for making sure that your setup fits the room dimensions. Last minute requests are very difficult to fulfill since the daily functions at St. Anne keep the maintenance staff very busy. Please be understanding. If you are requesting AV equipment, microphones or easels, please contact the parish reservation coordinator and arrive early to ensure you have them and they are in working order.

Church and School Building/East Campus

Gathering Space

- ~ located on the west side of the Church building campus.
- ~ reserved for community gathering before and after all liturgies. On occasion it can be used for parish functions, but only with the *permission of the Pastor*.
- ~ solicitations must be reserved 4 weeks in advance through the communications office. Only parish related projects may solicit. No one may set up "shop" without a reservation.
- ~ kitchen available.
- ~ cloak room available and reserved for coats only. It is not a storage facility. Items left behind will immediately be discarded.

There are many community members creating an environment for this area and caring for it. Out of respect for them and for the Art and Environment Committee, it is important that flowers and other artistic arrangements designed for welcome and the liturgical seasons not be partially removed, displaced, or changed in the two-story area around the fireplace. Although this is a big parish and there is much to communicate and display, we ask that *additions and removals from this entire space, the large columns, outside doors/worship space portal and lamppost must be approved through the liturgy office*. Certain types of tape are harmful to the painted walls. Please check with the liturgy office before hanging anything. Arrangements on the front window sills and on the coffee tables may be used for meetings or other events where a centerpiece is desired. They are, then, to be put back immediately following the event or meeting. Displays which have been approved to advertise a parish special event are not to be removed.

Family Room

- ~ located on the southeast side of the Gathering Space.
- ~ reserved for wakes, weddings, Baptism appointments and prayer groups. It is not a parish drop-in room nor a general meeting room.
- ~ *NO food or drink* will be allowed in this area.

Furniture should not be rearranged in this room, even for funerals. For funerals it was intended that the room remain set up in conversational style rather than facing the casket. This room may be available for other meetings, but *only* with the permission of the Pastor

Chapel/Church

- ~ reserved for liturgical or spiritual experiences. Therefore, *nothing is to be removed or added without checking with the sacristan or liturgy office. Questions whether your use is appropriate for these spaces will be approved through the liturgy office.*

The Art & Environment Chairperson or sacristan will assist you in making sure that items such as candles, fabric, etc. be available for you when using the chapel. Please see that you clean the items you use and place them back in the sacristy. If you move the chairs in the Chapel, they must be put back. The Church environment is set up for a specific time in the church year. It is important that the space be maintained and the symbols are enhanced in an evocative way.

Parish Library

- ~ located on the mezzanine area off the Gathering Space is open to adults whenever the building is open. All are invited to browse, read in a comfortable environment or take out books on a self serve basis.
- ~ available to small discussion groups or study groups but must be signed out for such use. A librarian is on duty to assist you on Wednesday mornings from 9:00 a.m. until noon.
- ~ *NO food or drink* may be brought to this area. You must leave it in good condition and turn off the lamps except for the one on the librarian's desk.

School Conference Room

- ~ located on the entrance level of the school.
- ~ available for meetings after school hours.
- ~ accommodates 12 to 14 people.

Hospitality Room

- ~ located on the lower level under the chapel.
- ~ available for all parish activities and accommodates up to 200 people.
- ~ full kitchen available.

School Cafeteria

- ~ located on the lower level of the school.
- ~ available after 5:30 p.m. on school days and all day on the weekends.
- ~ accommodates up to 350 people.
- ~ full kitchen available.

School Gym

- ~ located on the main level of the school.
- ~ available for large parish functions outside of school hours and scheduled athletic events. You must obtain the approval of the pastor, the school principal and the athletic director.

Community Room

- ~ located on the lower level of the school building under the church.
- ~ available for certain activities like, scouting, craft oriented parish projects, rehearsals etc.

Nursery

- ~ east side nursery is located in the lower level of the school
 - ~ available only on Sunday to care for children during the 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Masses while their parents attend the service.
- ~ west side nursery is located on the lower level of the parish center.
 - ~ available for those who have group meetings and need sitting services for young ones.
 - ~ contact the rectory office to make an arrangement for this service. Payment to sitters is due that day.

Parish Center/West Campus

Thane Hall

- ~ located in lower level.
- ~ available for all general purpose parish activities.
- ~ kitchen available for preparing snacks and light catered meals.
- ~ various meeting room configurations (*please specify on the room reservation form*)
 - ~ large meeting area accommodates up to 260 people
 - ~ meeting room accommodates up to 120 people
 - ~ a smaller room accommodates up to 20 people
 - ~ an open space area in the Senior Center accommodates up to 40 people. Reservations for this area must be coordinated with the Young at Hearts office *and* the parish reservation coordinator.

Parish Center Conference Room

- ~ located on the second floor of the parish center.
- ~ available for all general purpose parish meetings.
- ~ accommodates up to 35 people.

Parish Center Gym

- ~ located on main level of parish center.
- ~ available for all general purpose parish activities. Reservations must be coordinated with the Youth Ministry office *and* the parish reservation coordinator. Please be aware the pool tables are not to be moved. They have been professionally balanced.

Nursery

- ~ west side nursery located on the lower level of the parish center.
- ~ available for those who have group meetings and need sitting services for young ones.
- ~ contact the rectory office to make an arrangement for this service. Payment to sitters is due that day.

General Information

Kitchens

Kitchens available are:

- ~Kitchenette off Gathering Space
- ~Full kitchen on lower level of the church
- ~Small kitchen in Thane Hall

Supplies in the kitchen are kept in a locked room. You must make arrangements beforehand to get your items. It is your responsibility to contact the staff person connected to your group to ensure you know the following:

- ~how to unlock the room
- ~how to obtain supplies for hospitality
- ~how to work the coffee maker, dishwasher, ice maker, refrigerator/freezer etc.
- ~how to request maintenance staff to be available

Be aware that on the weekend you are on your own since the majority of the staff is not on campus. Kitchen policies are in place and posted in each of the kitchen areas. You are asked to assist our Volunteer Kitchen Group by reviewing the policies carefully and adhere to them. Clean up is your responsibility.

Publicity in the Gathering Space

The bulletin board located on the wall next to the kitchen area of the Gathering Space serves as an information media for the parish. We are in the process of obtaining standing information kiosks. These will hold brochures, pamphlets etc. Anyone wishing to display information must go through the communications office. If items appear and have not been approved, they will be discarded immediately.

The large coffee tables in the lounge areas of the Gathering Space will hold some bulletins on the weekend. All other information such as advertisements, papers, pamphlets, etc. are to be approved and placed in the appropriate areas of the Gathering Space -- not on these tables. The bookshelves contain various items: lost and found, bulletins, periodicals, children's books, etc. Remember, those items not approved will be discarded.

The Clarion (Parish Bulletin)

Because many ministries means having a large amount of information each week in the bulletin, it is important that the deadline of **10 days prior to publication** be adhered to. There is no guarantee anything submitted after this deadline will be published. *The editor reserves the right to format as space and time allows.*

It is necessary that only one group stuff the bulletin with an advertisement, etc. each week. The Communications Director has a calendar where reservations for this function are made. No one may put brochures, etc. in the bulletin without a reservation.

Gathering Space Solicitations

In order to keep the amount of solicitations in the Gathering Space reasonable, you must fill out a Gathering Space Reservation Form and submit it to the communications office. Reservations must be made 4 weeks in advance. Solicitations will be presented to the pastor for review and approval. No one may set up "shop" without a reservation. The communications office will contact you by phone to confirm your reservation. **Only parish related projects may solicit.**

Outside Sign

This sign is reserved for parish themes and large parish events.

Entrance Doors

Entrance doors are not to be used for solicitation of events. We now have the bulletin board. Please review bulletin board procedures.

Mass Announcements

There is a form in the Rectory Office that must be filled out to request Mass announcements. Announcements are to be parish related and kept short, especially if the event/project is also appearing in the bulletin. The Liturgy Office reserves the right to approve and edit your announcement.

Use of Parish Facilities by Outside Organizations

St. Anne Parish wishes to be supportive of community groups and activities. As such, its meeting facilities may be available for use by community organizations and groups on an "as available" basis. Given the demand for meeting places within our own parish ministries, it is usually possible to reserve single dates, not a multiple meeting schedule. Depending on the meeting facility requested and the organization involved, the parish may charge a rental fee and require a liability waiver. Inquiries regarding the availability of parish facilities should be addressed to the business and operations director with the understanding that approval is subject to the review of the pastor.

Important Reminders

- **Reserve** the room you need via forms available in the rectory office. No phone reservations accepted.
- **Notify Maintenance** staff two weeks prior to your event for set-up.
- **Tape** may not be used on the walls for posting or advertising.
- **Lights and doors** are usually taken care of by security in the evening. However, be sure to turn out lights in any room you have used.
- **Garbage:** please place liquids in sink. Please pick up trash on the floor.
- **Clean Up:** you and your group are responsible for leaving the room clean and in good condition.
- **Cancellation:** call the rectory office and notify maintenance staff.
- **Advertisements:** must be approved.
- **Solicitations:** must have a reservation.
- **Make sure:** you know how to get into your room, obtain supplies, obtain keys if necessary, and work equipment if using any. It is your responsibility that you do this since many staff members are not accessible during the weekend hours.

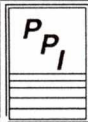
