Walk On provides equine assisted activities to people with physical, cognitive, social and emotional disabilities. Walk On is organized for charitable and educational purposes to inspire people to vance to their highest tential.

Welcome to the first issue of "Hearts, Hands & Hooves News Report." Walk On was the dream of several people dedicated to providing horseback riding for people with disabilities. Two years ago that dream became a reality when a special facility designed specifically for our program became available for use. Thanks to two prominent Barrington Hills residents Walk On Farm was created from the ground up.

Established in 2006, the Not-for-Profit Walk On program was named after the command, "Walk On". This term is used by the participant to have the horse move forward in a therapeutic riding lesson. Currently our program provides services to 40 participants representing a variety of disabilities. Each week participants experience the magic of the horse while they laugh, have fun and develop balance, feel natural body movements on a three dimensional plane and

form an emotional bond to a large animal. Where else can one experience such magic? Developing strength, coordination, visual motor integration, and normalization of muscle tone while improving communication skills, attention span, self image and the ability to follow directions. WOW!

Many people have questioned how I personally became involved in equine assisted activities as I am not an equestrian. Professionally, I am an Occupational Therapist and worked in various venues with children with disabilities. During the time I lived in Kalamazoo, Michigan, I was introduced to Lyda Mc Cowan who was starting a therapeutic horseback riding program and looking for students to participate. This was in 1969, I worked at a school for children with disabilities and this was a perfect match for a therapist interested in sensory-motor activities.

From that start I have continued to be involved in several programs after I moved to Chicago, both as an active board member and by involving the students I worked with at the Illinois Center for Rehabilitation & Education. In about 1990 I became active in NARHA (North American Riding for the Handicapped Association) as a member of the Board of Directors and as president of the board for two years. Ten or so years ago I became the chair of the Accreditation Committee and I have continued as an advisor to the Accreditation Committee and an Accreditation Lead Site Visitor.


Mary's Llerd Tails

Cocoa is a Buckskin Quarter Horse gelding. He was the first horse purchased for the Walk On program at a western lesson barn. His story follows:

"I went to see Cocoa at a barn in Bull Valley, Illinois I arrived ahead of the scheduled appointment on purpose and was therefore able to observe a group of horses outside in a dry paddock area. I was attracted to a 14.2 hand dark quarter horse resting in the field. He had a kind eye and a gentle look on his face. Of course, that horse was COCOA. I watched Cocoa in a lesson with a 9 year old girl. He was kind and took excellent care of her; walking, trotting and cantering on command. To show off his temperament, the instructor threw a beach ball at him, played a radio, and then jumped up and down yelling and screaming. She also had a rider carry a large flag from his back. While cantering with the flag, the flag wrapped around Cocoa's head. He calmly halted and waited to be rescued. I knew for certain then, that he would be great for the Walk On program.

Cocoa is indeed a kind and gentle participant in our program. Because of his trustworthy nature, he is usually the first horse that participants ride when they come to Walk On. Each day he helps children to sit up tall, guide through obstacles, ride without help, and learn to trot and canter. Each day as I watch Cocoa work, I am grateful that Cocoa works for us."





"Our son, Gabriel has shown tremendous gains from his weekly riding at Walk On Farm. His fitness, coordination and self confidence have improved. He really enjoys his lesson, and looks forward to it each week. He sleeps better after his lesson because of the fresh air and exercise. One week, on the day after his lesson, he received 96% of his possible points at school plus eleven bonus points. He loves the attention from the instructors and volunteers who work so well with him. He gets the benefit of peer/social interaction without the stress of typical peer group interaction. The interaction with the horses is also beneficial. Because of his coordination and social issues, he no longer wants to participate in team sports, so at Walk On, he is able to participate in a physical/sporting activity.

His communication skills are improving. He is very proud of feeding, grooming and walking the horses and shares stories with us. His self confidence is increasing from being able to help, care, work, and ride the horses when in many parts of his life, things like handwriting, organizing his written and spoken thoughts, and social interaction are so difficult for him to accomplish."
