### Thank you for a wonderful year

Year 2001 was our best year ever. We almost doubled our endowment from \$211,000 to \$399,000. Since this was only our third full year, we are taking this opportunity to thank the community, to report on the grants for 2002, to provide you with our financial information as required by the IRS and to acknowledge our loyal donors since we started.

We make a simple promise that seems to have struck a welcome chord in the Barrington area: we will never spend the money you give us—only the proceeds each year. Those proceeds are based on 5% of our average net asset value over the trailing 12 quarters. Our directors have absorbed costs personally, including this mailing, so that we can achieve our goal of 99% of your money continuing to give year after year. The Foundation's low overhead strategy also seems to be something the community likes.

The Foundation is the only local endowment that benefits the entire community. With more than 70 nonprofits in the area, the Foundation provides another avenue by which you may give on the basis of established criteria against requests of the local charities. Our funds come from the Barrington area and we grant them only in the Barrington area.

### Announcing the grants for 2002

Our grant review committee received 15 grant requests totaling \$60,925. Against our guidelines, the committee selected these organizations for 2002 grants totaling \$10,000:

Barrington Area Arts Council to start a collaborative program for older adults	
to share experiences and stories of life with all ages	\$1,500
Barrington Area Council on Aging to offer a course for family caregivers	\$1,000
Barrington Youth Services for a program to strengthen Hispanic family ties and	
help their children adjust to different cultures	\$1,500
Lafarge Program, a second grant to continue this senior education plan using	
volunteer teachers and professors	\$2,000
New Generations for a year-long leadership training program in civic involvement	\$4,000

Each of these grants has been designated to start or extend programs to address unmet and unduplicated needs in the community. In three years, our grants now total \$22,500.

### **Celebrating three great years**

In late 1997, Norval Stephens learned that the Lilly Foundation was encouraging Indiana cities to start community foundations to improve community life. With a borrowed handbook, Stephens asked Dave Nelson and Jim Lancaster to see if anyone else thought this a good idea. The three shortly become seven with Jim Fitzgerald, George Yapp, Kim Duchossois and Glenn Reed joining. The Barrington Area Development Council provided early sponsorship. By the fall of 1998, we publicly announced formation of the Foundation and closed the year with \$34,000 in donations. Hollywood Video chose the BACF for a benefit launch in 1999, putting us over \$100,000, a year ahead of schedule—and we were off. Our next goal is to raise our endowment to \$1,000,000 and grant \$50,000 per year.

# Full disclosure from the start

From the start, the Foundation Board determined that we would fully and fairly disclose the source of our funds and the nature and amount of all expenditures. We maintain a website, <br/>barringtonareacommunityfoundation.org>. This contains our mission and how we operate. A copy of IRS Form 990 (the charitable information tax report) is now required to be made available to any interested person, but, starting in 1997, the Foundation published its financial data on the website. Set forth below is a summary of our financial condition for the last three full years. ### What is the mission of the Barrington Area Community Foundation?

To address unmet needs in the Barrington area, the greater of District 220 and BACOG, and to provide residents with a vehicle to give back to the community.

### What is the promise?

We promise that we will never spend money you give the Foundation, only the proceeds over the years on the basis of 5% of the net assets averaged over the trailing 12 quarters.

### How is the endowment managed?

The Foundation's investment committee invests Foundation funds in accordance with an approved investment policy, which prescribes a prudent mix of stocks, bonds and cash equivalents. Currently, common stocks represent approximately 65% of the total investment portfolio.

### May I donate appreciated stock or other securities?

Yes, of course. We will handle the transaction immediately at no cost to you and report in writing to you the dollar amount of your gift for tax purposes.
