#### IRAs—A Renewed Interest for Investment by Sharon L. Keller, J.D., LLM

One way to save money for retirement is to contribute as much as you can to an individual retirement account (IRA), a 401(k) Plan, a Keogh Plan or a Simplified Employee Pension Plan. These retirement plans allow you to contribute before-tax funds to an account and receive tax-deferred accumulation of the funds, which will not be taxed until the funds are with-

The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 expanded the opportunity for you to use IRAs. An IRA is a personal savings plan that lets you set aside funds for your retirement. Subject to some limitations, you may be allowed to make and deduct from your gross income on your tax return a cash contribution to an IRA.

The annual IRA contribution is limited to the lesser of \$2,000 or 100% of your compensation. Alimony is treated as compensation. Earnings in your IRA are not taxable until they are distributed to you. Beginning in 1997, deductible IRA contributions of up to \$2,000 can be made for each spouse. In order to receive the deduction, the combined compensation of The Roth IRA is funded solely with afterboth spouses must be equal to or greater than the contributed amount. If you are a homemaker and do not work outside the home, the amount you can deduct for contributing to an IRA increased from \$250 to \$2,000.

In addition, the Taxpayer Relief Act removed the restriction that prevented an individual who is not an active participant in an employer-sponsored retirement plan account from making a deductible IRA contribu-



tion if his or her spouse is an active participant, provided their joint income is less than \$150,000. This provision applies to taxable years beginning after December 31, 1997.

#### **BAAC Awards 1998 Arts Boost Grants**

The Barrington Area Arts Council (BAAC) and the Illinois Arts Council, a state agency, are pleased to announce the recipients of the 1998 Art Boost Grants. This year BAAC matched a \$7,290 Arts Development from the Illinois Arts Council with \$4,410 to award Art Boost Grants totaling \$11,700. Eligible applicants are nonprofit organizations proposing arts related projects located in Barrington and its seven villages as well as East and West Dundee and all of McHenry County. A "project" is defined as an arts activity, program, artist in residence, event or series of events. Sixteen groups submitted grant applications and collectively requested funds totaling \$25,861. #### **Eyelid Surgery**

Eyelid surgery, also known as blepharoplasty, is one of the most common procedures performed in facial rejuvenation. Redundant or puffy eyelids can make people appear older or tired. The redundancy of the eyelid skin is usually due to relaxation of the skin, whereas the puffiness is usually due to the underlying fat pockets located within the upper and lower eyelids. A blepharoplasty removes the excess fat, muscle and skin from the upper and lower lids. This allows tightening of the eye area thereby providing a more refreshed and youthful appearance. Sometimes eyelid surgery is combined with a forehead lift to correct a drooping or low brow and provide a smoother forehead. Also, laser resurfacing may be used to improve the wrinkles within the eyelid skin.

**Upper Eyelid Surgery** 

In surgery of the upper eyelid, an incision is made within the natural fold of the eyelid in order to minimize any scarring. The excess skin, a strip of muscle, and any excess fat are removed to better sculpt the upper lid. Fine sutures are then used to close the incision. These are removed within the first five days after surgery.

**Lower Eyelid Surgery** 

Lower eyelid surgery may be performed in one of two ways. Some patients have simple eyelid puffiness caused by excess or herniated fat without excess skin. This may be corrected by a procedure called transconjunctival blepharoplasty. In this procedure, the incision is made inside the lower eyelid and the excess fat is re-

moved. This eliminates any visible incision. Frequently this procedure is combined with laser resurfacing of the lower eyelids in an effort to tighten the skin. If the lower eyelid has more wrinkles than the laser can remove, an inconspicuous incision is made along the lash line of the lower eyelid. Through that incision any excess fat, muscle and skin are removed and the incision is closed with fine sutures. If the lower eyelid itself is too loose, additional procedures may be done to tighten and improve its contour. The lower eyelid sutures either dissolve or are removed within the first three to five days after surgery.

#### Browlift

Patients sometimes come in for consultation thinking they need eyelid surgery to reduce the fullness of the upper eyelid, but actually only need elevation of the brow. Elevation of the brow may be performed by itself or in conjunction with eyelid surgery in order to provide a more youthful appearance to the eye

From elegant sculptures of "spirit spouses" and "wild spirits," to the life-size recreation of a masquerade frozen in time, to short videos of secular and sacred performances, the first major exhibition to focus on the art of the Baule people of the Ivory Coast is at The Art Institute of Chicago. Baule: African Art/Western Eyes, on view in the Regenstein Hall of The Daniel F. and Ada L. Rice Building, now through May 10, 1998, invites visitors to examine, glimpse, watch, or "observe with awe" more than 125 artworks in wood, gold, and other materials. Works include masks, statues, fly whisks, jewelry, and objects of daily use that are displayed to encourage consideration of cultural differences in approaching and viewing art.

The Baule (pronounced boughlay) represent one of the largest ethnic groups in the west African country of the Ivory Coast (Republique de Côte d'Ivoire). Baule villages are traditionally built amid the forests of the central Ivory Coast, and the opposing force of village and wilderness provide central themes for Baule art. Of equal interest to the Baule are the opposing and complementary realms of men and women, as well as the com-

mon elements each gender share.

The exhibition is devoted to a different type of "looking," reflecting the Baule interpretation of artworks as spiritual containers rather than a late 20th-century notion of "art for art's sake." The isolated, totally visible object and the intense examination that we find in museums are very rare in Baule villages. "'Art' cannot be described from a Baule point of view simply because their view does not include 'art' in the Western sense of the word," states Susan Vogel, organizing curator of the exhibition and former director of the Yale University Art Gallery.

Vogel explains that in Baule culture, art is usually not displayed or examined

openly. Although the aesthetic qualities of masks and statues are greatly valued by the Baule, they are not discussed in public. Baule people do not embrace the Western ideas of "art" or "masterpiece," but esteem the visual power of their masks and sculptures and remember them in great detail even if they may only have glimpsed the objects once or twice in their lifetime. It is primarily the spiritual nature of objects that give them their value.

This belief is further explained by Baule consultant and research assistant Koffi Nguessan as he states: "We Baule live with art in the sense that statues are kept in our houses, but we don't do it in the way you do in America. We live with the spirits more than with the statues... that is the difference between us and you-and that is why you will never hear a Baule say, 'This is a beautiful sculpture.' We are aware that Baule art is beautiful, but the aspect that interests us most is the spiritual, religious side."

Though not on daily display, art plays an integral role in the lives of Baule people. Men and women have intimate relationships with their "spirit spouses"figural sculpture that is kept in a private place and cared for on a regular basis. Diviners display interesting and unique objects during performances to enhance drama and impress audiences. Communities gather to participate in periodic masked performances that are both enter-



This enables the clients to prepare meals while the new kitchen is being installed. Clean up (which can be challenging without a sink) is, therefore, kept to a minimum.

#### **East and West Coast Writers Receive Whetstone Awards**

"Squaring Up," the story of a young farm couple fighting their own small war in the years after World War II, has won L.G. Batesman of Redmond, Washington, the \$500 Whetstone Prize for 1997 in Volume 14, the latest issue. The \$250 John Patrick McGrath Memorial Award went to New York writer Eric Rustad for his story, "The Office of Victim Services." The editors of Whetstone, an annual journal published by the Barrington Area Arts Council, give awards to stories and poems they deem "best of the best."

"Our fields rose slowly out of darkness, the long windows of wheat shocks looking like wandering columns of men," Batesman writes in his opening. "He has a talent for evocative detail, and his ability to tell this story through a woman's eyes is amazing," says editor Jean Tolle, who noted that the author won the McGrath Award for a story that appeared in Volume 12. "Previously he'd sent us some pieces that we rejected, but with someone to watch."


