was referring to the current Congressional attempts to balance the budget, provide a major tax cut for the wealthy and "in delicious irony" strengthen family values. Gallagher is an author, scholar, disability rights activist and post-polio quadriplegic. He offers a unique perspective on the current health care debate in Congress and the nation concerning budget cuts in health care programs. Other thoughts from Gallagher on this issue are:

• "Our nation is the wealthiest in the entire history of mankind. Our national debt is lower than the debt of most industrialized nations. Our overall tax rates are lower than any of the Common Market countries except Turkey. We are the only country in the industrialized world that does not have some form of universal health coverage. Yet we are now in a process of dismantling what coverage we have—the 'safety net' of Medicare/Medicaid."

 "The Congress plans to turn Medicare/ Medicaid over to profit-driven Health Maintenance Organizations whose policies deny disabled people the rehabilitation they need to become productive citizens."


 "Low level HMO clerks—who know nothing of medicine and who have never seen the patient-make treatment decisions which rightly belong to the physician and his informed patient."

"HMOs make profits by rationing health care. If we are going to ration health care, it should be done equitably and honestly, as we rationed in World War II-not by some company out to make a fast buck."

· "Health care profiteers are no better than war profiteers."


His articulate opinions and thoughts are based on years of research, experience in the White House and on Capitol Hill; and living as an independent person with disabilities. Gallagher was recently named the \$50,000 1995 Henry B. Betts laureate for his work on behalf of quality of life for people with disabilities. It was Gallagher who first described to the world the disabled President Franklin D. Roosevelt in the book, FDR's Splendid Deception. Roosevelt and everyone who surrounded him denied the fact that he couldn't walk alone. Gallagher's book somehow made it OK for the leader of the Free World to be disabled. Senator Bob Dole, in a congratulatory letter to Gallagher on winning the Betts Award, speculated that because of "the hard work... of disability advocates such as Hugh, I trust that today Americans would have no problem in electing as president a man or woman with a disability."

Gallagher's latest book, By Trust Betrayed, License to Kill in the Third Reich, describes the methods used by the government and medical professionals in Nazi-controlled Germany. Physicians "selected" people with disabilities for various experiments and "final treatment" procedures. While the US health care system is far from the Third Reich, Gallagher warns that economic necessity to keep health care costs down may imperil the poor, the infirm and people with disabilities. He finds the current discussions regarding health care reform eerily familiar and feels compelled to "fan the flames" of controversy on behalf of the rights of all people with disabilities.



## Famous Opera Houses Of Europe

This is the fourth in a series of five articles on famous opera houses of Europe which will be visited in connection with the Barrington Chapter of Lyric Opera's Operafest '96 tour September 23-October 7, 1996. #### Vienna—Die Staatsoper

For a half century or more, Vienna was known as the leading opera house of the world because of its bold productions, good singers, orchestral quality and calibre of conductors. In 1857 the reigning court decreed that Vienna's medieval fortifications were to be razed, and an impressive boulevard, the Ringstrasse, was designed to be lined by such new building as the Parliament, the City Hall, the University and the Opera. The Opera building, in Neo-renaissance style, was begun in 1861 and completed in early 1869. Previously the Hofoper (Staatsoper) originated in the old Karntnertortheater, which stood on the site behind the present opera house now occupied by the Hotel Sacher.

The Opera House managed to survive wars, financial depressions and political overthrow these past 127 years. In 1938 the Staatsoper, like every other public institution was subject to "Gleichgeschaltet" (Nazified) which meant that there would be no musicians of an unacceptable racial origin. However, knowing how the Viennese were attached to their opera, the Nazi auclaring virtually all its artists unfit for military service. Page 22 Barrington LIFESTYLES – February, 1996

fore the end of the war, the opera house received a direct hit during an Allied air raid. The entire building was destroyed except for its facade, the loggia and the great staircase. In its reconstruction, great care was taken to build a house that would match the style of the remaining parts. Today the Staatsoper stands more beautiful than ever, housing great art pieces in its statuary, paintings and tapestries. The new stage with a total of 16,225 square feet can be separated by iron curtains into sidestage, backstage and proscenuim. Six stage elevators accomplish set changes, and a 46-ton rotating stage used in special effects can be folded up and stored in the back. The house seats 1,658 seats and 551 standing places.





#### How To Get Aerobic Exercise To Work For You

What is aerobic exercise? Aerobic exercise is considered an exercise that requires oxygen. This would include activities such as walking, jogging, biking, swimming, stepping, etc. What are the benefits of aerobic exercise? Aerobic exercise improves the cardiovascular system and burns fat. In order for the body to use fat as a fuel source it must have oxygen. Oxygen is carried through the body via the cardiovascular system or the heart and the lungs. By improving the ability to carry oxygen through aerobic exercise, a person improves their ability to burn fat. Eventually they can workout at higher levels and still burn fat. How often should I exercise to see these benefits? Results of any exercise program will vary. In order to see cardiovascular gains, a person may need to exercise 15-30 minutes per day for at least three days per week. In order to burn a substantial amount of fat, a person may need to exercise 30-40 minutes per day for 4-7 days per week. How hard should I exercise? Many people start an exercise program that is too hard. An activity needs to be performed at a level that can be sustained for a 15-40 minute period of time. The exact intensity of this activity will vary and depends on your fitness goals, your current fitness

level and your physical limitations. A good rule of thumb is that you should be able to carry on a conversation while exercising, but should not he able to give a speech. You should be a little out of breath. Why shouldn't I exercise real hard to burn fat? Fat is, like a couch potato. It is very comfortable tucked in it's little pouch on your body. If it tries to perform all activity, it gets out of breath. Therefore, after a great deal of coaxing (15-20 minutes), it will react to light activity with an oxygen mask. If you move too fast, it will stay seated very comfortably on it's couch and it's counterpart, carbohydrate will be used instead.

It is important to check with your doctor before beginning any kind of exercise. Certain medications and physical conditions may require modifications in your program. The guidelines listed above are general guidelines. Each person may respond to exercise differently. It is recommended to start out slow and build up to these programs. Warming up, cooling down and stretching also need to be included to reduce the risk



# Tony Romano Wins 1995 Whetstone Prize


Whetstone, the literary publication of the Barrington Area Arts Council, awards its 1995 Whetstone Prize to Tony Romano, Glen Ellyn, Ill., for his short story, 'Treading Water," and to Jim Finley, Texas, for his short story, "Keeper of the Downs." Volume 12 is available for purchase for \$6 at the BAAC office (708-382-5626), the Writers Alley, or Village Hallmark, all in Barrington and from Border's, Oakbrook and Prairie Moon, Arlington Heights. This year's Whetstone Prize is underwritten by John W.

Whetstone editors Sandra Berris, Juliann Fleenor, Marsha Portnoy, and Jean Tolle also announce that L.G. Bateson, Redmond, WA, receives the 1995 John Patrick McGrath Memorial Prize given to a writer of promise for his short story, "Walter Benoit's Horses." He was awarded \$250. Underwritten by Adrienne and Mary Anne McGrath, the prize is administered by the Barrington Writers Workshop and the recipient named by the editors of Whetstone. John Patrick McGrath, who died in 1994, was a member of the Workshop.

"Manuscripts come to us from every state in the country and a few from outside the country," explained Portnoy. Whetstone publishes and awards its prizes to writers outside of Illinois as well as those who reside in the state.

Tony Romano, a faculty member of Fremd High School, Palatine, is a two-time winner of a PEN Syndicated Fiction Project award, with both stories being produced on National Public Radio's "The Sound of Writing" and syndicated to newspapers nationwide. His fiction has appeared in VIA: Voices in Italian Americana (Purdue University), Sou'wester, and the Chicago Tribune. Romano's "Treading Water" could be described as a story of a woman who is always waiting for the morning alarm to go off. Tolle noted, "Romano sustains the woman's point of view and creates a taut narrative of a young mother whose life is balanced between her three children, a bird in the dryer vent, and four televisions, all which are constantly blaring white noise."

Jim Finley has been published in Best of the West 2, Other Voices, Farmer's Market, New Texas, and Oxford Magazine. In "Keeper of the Downs," Finley tells the





#### Teach Your Child To Be A Better Writer

Writing skills are valuable tools that your child will use throughout school and throughout life. Writing is the final stage in a complex process that begins with think-

Writing skills also encourage clear thinking. The process of creating a story, relating a series of events, or even expressing thoughts and feelings focuses the writer's attention on organizing the information and presenting it clearly.

Remember that in helping your child to learn to write well, your goal is to make writing easier and more enjoyable for them. How can you promote these skills in your child? Dr. Huntington, founder and president of Huntington Learning Centers, recommends the following tips:

1. Use games. There are numerous games and puzzles that help a child increase vocabulary and improve both speaking and writing. Try crossword puzzles, word games, anagrams and cryptograms designed especially for children. Flash cards are good too, and they are easy to make at

2. Write together. Have your child help you with letters, even routine ones such as ordering items from an advertisement or writing to a business. A child needs meaningful, not artificial, writing tasks. This helps the child see first hand that writing is important and truly useful in everyday life. Your child will also learn that different types of communication require different styles of writing.

3. Encourage your child to write to relaenjoy corresponding with a pen pal. Encourage your child to take notes on trips or rington at 382-3655 or in Buffalo Grove at outings and to describe what he or she saw. 459-5939.

Encourage keeping a journal. This is excellent writing practice as well as a good outlet for venting feelings. Encourage your child to write about things that happen at home and school, about people he or she likes or dislikes and why, things to remember or things the child wants to do. Especially encourage your child to write about personal feelings-pleasures as well as disappointments.

4. Praise. Take a positive approach and say something good about your child's writing. Is it accurate? Descriptive? Thoughtful? Interesting? Does it say something?

5. Brainstorm. Talk with your child as much as possible about his or her impressions and encourage the child to describe people and events to you.

6. Making lists. Most children like to make lists, just as they like to count. Making lists is good practice and helps a child become more organized. It's good practice to make lists of things to do, schoolwork and test deadlines, social events and other reminders. Your weekly shopping list is an excellent opportunity for practice.

It is important to remember that all students do not have the basic writing skills to respond to these suggestions.



#### Steps To Lessen Tax Burden For 1995

Although we have entered into a new year, there are still steps we can take to lessen our tax burden for 1995. This issue will focus on planning for the infamous date: April 15. Each year is a new adventure as a result of the ever changing tax laws.

Up until you file your 1995 income tax return, you can establish an IRA (individual retirement account). If you are married, this will give you a \$2,250.00 deduction provided you and your spouse together do not earn over \$45,000.00. If you are single, you can deduct \$2,000.00 if you don't earn more than \$25,000.00.

If you are an employer with 25 or fewer employees, you can establish a SEP (simplified employer pension) IRA for yourself and your employees. This would allow you to reduce your taxable income by 15% of your income, or \$9,240.00, whichever is less. You have until April 15 to establish a **SEP for 1995** 


One change as of October 1, 1995 concerns travel and entertainment expenses. Prior to the last three months of 1995, you could deduct travel and entertainment expenses of \$25.00 or more. However, for any expenses incurred on or after October 1, 1995, the amount was increased to \$75.00. You will have to be aware of this change in compiling your documents for your tax preparation.

Some of the various information you need to adequately prepare your taxes con-



sists of all sources of income and earnings. Also, put together a list of tax deductible items such as business expenses, interest payments, paid taxes, medical expenses and charitable contributions. Remember that for any charitable contribution in excess of \$250.00 you need to supply the IRS with a formal written statement concerning the donation from the charity, describing the charitable contribution and the value of the

#### Keeping Warm In Winter Can Be A Challenge For Older Adults

in the winter, according to Amy Griswold, University of Illinois Extension educator, consumer and family economics.

to hypothermia. Even healthy elderly people can become ill from prolonged exposure to mildly cool temperatures of 65 degrees, or from sudden drops in temperature, Griswold said.

As people age, physiological changes can affect the body's temperature control system. Temperatures that feel quite warm to a younger person may feel chilly to an aging adult.

"For these reasons, the types of fabrics available, garment construction and clothing design and fit are especially important considerations for the population of older adults who have difficulty keeping warm in winter," Griswold said.

The most comfortable fabrics keep body heat from dissipating, yet allow moisture to evaporate. Wool fabrics can provide warmth, but they are not as easy to care for as some other fabrics. Acrylic fibers used in sweaters, for example, are soft, lightweight and are considered easy-care fibers. When shopping for warm clothing, look for fabrics made from loosely twisted yarns that are thick and absorbent. The thicker the fabric, the warmer it will be because there will be more dead-air space among the fibers to provide insulation.

Elderly individuals have special needs for warned Griswold. Some fabrics can be clothing that is both comfortable and warm thick, yet very lightweight due to texturizing processes that make man-made fibers comfortable and breathable.

Good examples of warm fabrics include The elderly are much more susceptible velveteen and corduroy, quilted fabrics, sweat-suit fleece fabrics—especially acrylic fabrics-and thermal knits.

Comfort and warmth are key concerns when selecting among clothing designs. Clothing that fits closely, especially at the neck, wrists, and ankles, helps hold in body heat. Yet clothing that is too tight can inhibit circulation.

As people age, it is common for the neck to become fuller and the head to tilt forward. So a garment with a high neckline, such as a turtleneck, may be uncomfortable. A lower neckline or a V neckline may be a better choice, even though a well-fitted higher neckline would hold in heat better.

Griswold suggested that the elderly choose well-fitting straight-legged trousers, long skirts, long, fitted sleeves, vests, and ski-type pajamas. Also, leotards, pantyhose, opaque hose, thick socks and head coverings help retain body heat.

Remember, too, that layering of clothing such as blouses and sweaters will provide

· Contrarian. The contrarian buys stocks that others shun. Such stocks often have low price/earnings ratios, are usually in an out-of-favor industry, trade close to book value, and have small institutional ownership. According to contrarian opinion, when people say the market is going up, it means they are fully invested and have no additional purchasing power. To the contrarian, this means the market is at its peak. When people are predicting a decline, the contrarian believes that they have already sold out and thus the market will

• Cyclical Investor. A cyclical investor buys stock in companies that will benefit from a change in the economic cycle. Earnings of these companies go up and down with changes in the business cycle and so these stocks are often valued on "peak" earnings-or the amount the company can be expected to earn at the peak of the business cycle. Examples of cyclical industries are housing, automobiles, and paper.

Growth Investor. This individual chooses stocks that have potential for above-average earnings growth in the future or that have long histories of aboveaverage growth. Over time, growth stocks tend to outperform slower-growing companies. However, such companies tend to reinvest earnings into the company and thus

pay little or no dividends.

· Income Investor. Stocks that have moderate dividend yields and prospects for dividend growth appeal to this investor. A steadily growing dividend reinvested into additional shares of a high-quality stock can compound returns nicely.

· Value Investor. Seeking value, this individual buys stocks that appear inexpensive based on the assets the company has today. This investor's theory is that if a company can earn just average profits on its net assets, then its share price should rise closer to its net assets per share. When the stock market is at high valuations, value investors often become contrarians.
