

Twentieth Annual Classical Music Series

The Woodstock Fine Arts Association announces its 20th season of fine classical music at the Woodstock Opera House. The Series "Music for a Sunday Afternoon" will open February 16, 1997, with violinist Lee-Chin Siow. She is a young prodigy who is one of the most talked about violinists appearing before the public today. She is the Gold Medal winner of the 1994 Henry Szeryng Violin Competition and the First Prize winner of the 1994 Louise D. McMahon International Music Competition







1997 Arts Boost Grants Awarded

The Barrington Area Arts Council (BAAC) and Grants Director Gail Collier is pleased to announce the recipients of the 1997 ARTS BOOST Grants. This year BAAC's match to an Illinois Arts Council Arts Development Grant of \$7,290 provided a total of \$10,600 in grant funds. BAAC received eleven grant requests from not for profit organizations or institutions throughout the seven villages of Barrington as well as East and West Dundee and all of McHenry County for proposed arts related projects. 



Smiles For Success

Last month I discussed the value of a winning smile in business and social life and how your orthodontist could help by properly aligning your teeth. However, there are other things which can be done to enhance your smile which may be just as important or even more important than orthodontics in specific cases.

The simplest and safest is probably a thorough cleaning followed by bleaching treatments. These are usually doctor-prescribed but patient-applied at home.

Slightly chipped or malpositioned teeth may be modified by reshaping them with a dental drill or by building them up in specific areas with bonding. Bonding usually involves addition of a tooth colored plastic to correct shape or mask color.

More severe irregularities may need something stronger and longer lasting than plastic bonding. In these cases a veneer or a crown is used. Veneers and crowns are made of ceramic material in a dental laboratory from impressions or models of your teeth supplied by your dentist. The veneer or crown is returned to your dentist for placement with a dental cement or bonding technique.





Parents And Acting Out Adolescents

If you have an "acting out" adolescent in your midst, chances are you are stressed, frustrated, at a loss about what to do, fearful for his or her life or your own survival, and having a hard time knowing whether the behavior you are seeing is "normal" teenage behavior or "red flag warning" signs to take heed about. The hardest job in life can be parenting an adolescent, and in particular, an acting out adolescent. If you are feeling stressed by this task-you are not alone.

What is "acting-out" behavior? Acting out behavior are behaviors that put your child "at risk" for survival. They can be demonstrated in a multitude of ways.

- 1. alcohol or substance abuse
- 2. falling school performance
- 3. poor attitude
- 4. sexual promiscuity
- 5. defiance toward authority figures
- 6. conflict with families
- 7. lack of regard for others
- 8. continual lying
- 9. poor peer group situations
- 10. vandalism

The developmental stage of adolescence carries with it a certain amount of turmoil, turbulence and change—not only for the adolescent but for his or her parents as well. When human beings undergo a process of change that is both physical and mental the transition is not always smooth. The teenage years are characterized by trying out independence, new philosophies about life different than their parents' beliefs, adjusting to new bodies and surging hormones, making new friends, experimentation, stress about fitting in somewhere and defining where that might be. Steps like these are typical and parents are wise to allow and encourage these explorations, although this might be easier said than done. For the parents, the letting go process is challenging

and a delicate balancing process. BUT, although teens might "look" like small adults, they are not fully formed mentally. Their decisions might lack the good judgement that we, as parents, might hope for them. Our job as parents can be compared to walking on a mine field; one step in the wrong spot can cause a family explosion. We don't want to "overparent" when a teen's task in this stage of life is to learn how to make good choices and accept the consequences of those not so wise choices. Likewise, we don't want to "underparent" when we see our children make choices that might be life threatening or damaging to their future.

How do we know where to draw the line? What is acceptable versus nonacceptable behavior? How do we set limits to keep our teen safe while allowing them the ability to grow, mature and become independent? How do we assess if the behavior is due to biological reasons versus psychological reasons? Parenting groups can help you assess your own situation, while learning from others in similar situations. On Tuesday evenings 7-9 pm or Wednesday mornings from 9-11 am, I conduct meetings for Parents of "At-Risk" Adolescents. We discuss ways to better cope with these difficult times, ways to empower ourselves as parents to set the limits and guidelines that are crucial to healthy adolescent development as well as the ways to effectively "let go" for positive family growth. When you have reached your limit and are ready to give up is precisely the time you can benefit from group support. The group setting allows people to learn from others who have faced similar challenges and help those who are struggling today. You, your child and your family are worth saving! 



Tax Changes

WE'VE MOVED!! Finally, we have settled into our lovely new office at 18-3 East Dundee Road (just east of Motor Werks). We all are happy to be there and we are enjoying the luxury of space. This month I am continuing the discussion on tax changes that were enacted last year, most of which will take effect after December 1996.

The Small Business Act of 1996 made major revisions to the Internal Revenue Code and will have a significant impact on S corporations, making them a more effective vehicle for many small businesses. Generally, these revisions are effective as of January 1, 1997.

Prior to the passage of the Small Business Act, an S corporation was limited to 35 shareholders. Under the new statute, an S corporation can have up to 75 allowable shareholders. The statute also altered the entities that may be a shareholder. Formerly, S corporation stock could only be held by the following:

- 1. Individuals who are citizens or resident
- 2. An individual's estate for up to 2 years from death
- 3. An individual's revocable trust during life or for up to 2 years after death
- 4. A special Qualified Sub-Chapter S Trust 5. Grantor Trust where the Grantor was a U.S. citizen or resident during the Grantor's

life or for up to 60 days after death. The new statute expands permissible shareholders by providing the following:

- 1. A Grantor Trust can own stock in an S corporation for up to 2 years after the death of the Grantor
- 2. Qualified retirement plan trusts, most charitable organizations, and certain banks, insurance companies and other financial institutions may own S corporation stock
- 3.An "electing small business trust" is now eligible to be a shareholder of an S corporation

nization which holds a contingent remainder interest, but not a current income interest, may be an S corporation shareholder. Interests in an electing small business trust may be acquired by gift or inheritance, not by purchase. This amendment will permit charitable remainder trusts to hold S corporation stock, thereby facilitating the use of these trusts in business succession planning.

Under the new statute, S corporations may own more than 80% of the stock of a C corporation. Previously, S corporations could not have other corporations as shareholders without losing their S corporation status. Now an S corporation may also own a wholly owned S corporation as a qualified subsidiary. The provision which allows S corporations to create subsidiaries enables an S corporation to segment its activities into separate subsidiaries for liability purposes.

Before developing her own pottery style, Pahponee imitated the old designs she saw in museums. She soon realized that creating her own style was more rewarding than replicating the old. "I am a contemporary clay artist," she says with a passion. She uses whatever works for her, including wheel-throwing and commercial clays. Much of her decorative pottery is created by dung firing. The dung is generously donated by her horse and buffalo who share a family farm with her husband and two sons in Leon, Iowa.

Accurate Social Security Information A Must On Your Tax Return

Beginning this year, the Internal Revenue will deny the dependency deduction and the Service will disallow certain credits and deductions where valid Social Security Numbers (SSNs) are not provided on tax returns. These adjustments could cause refunds to be reduced or, possibly, result in a balance due.

Take special care to enter complete and accurate SSNs for yourself, your spouse (if filing jointly), and any dependents born before December 1, 1996, as well as for qualifying children for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and dependent care

Due to recent tax law changes, the IRS You should check the Social Security

dependent care credit on returns with missing or incorrect SSNs for dependents or qualifying children. The IRS will also deny the EITC on returns with missing or incorrect SSNs for the taxpayer, spouse (if filing jointly), or qualifying children. This means the returns will be processed immediately and refunds will be adjusted accordingly. The IRS will send a notice to the taxpayer advising them of the changes made, but will not ask for additional information. Corrected information may be provided by the taxpayer at any time.

Poor Report Cards: What To Do

While January marks the beginning of the new year, it is also the halfway point in your child's school year. The skills developed during the first half of the year will be your child's foundation for the more difficult work ahead. Shortly, schools will be distributing midyear report cards. What should you do if you are unhappy with your child's midyear report card?

According to Dr. Raymond Huntington, founder and president of Huntington Learning Centers, "Parents know their own children. If you believe your child could be doing better than his or her grades show, you owe it to your child to remedy the situation.

"More than current grades are at stake," Huntington continues, "If grades are mediocre or poor, it means your child is not gaining valuable skills. This can come back to haunt children later. The skills children learn in school are like building blocks. If a skill is not learned adequately, future skills will suffer. When a child tries to build advanced skills on a shaky foundation of knowledge, there is likely to be trouble ahead."

child brings home a poor report card:

1. Examine the situation realistically. It is important to remember that every drop in grades indicates that valuable skills are being missed. An effort should be made to learn and reinforce those missing skills. While this is being done, it is also important to identify and remedy the basic problem, so it does not continue to hurt your child's education.

2. What is really the problem? Is there a behavior problem? Sometimes, bright students get bad grades for behavior-related activities. Does your child hand in homework? Is it correct and on time? Is your child bored with schoolwork, and so is not paying enough attention? These are not excuses; they are symptoms of different problems. You must identify the problem before you can remedy it.

3. Talk with your child. Why does your child think he or she got poor grades? Does he or she take the situation seriously? How does he or she plan to do better? It is important that your child knows you take the situation seriously. Work with your child to Mediocre or poor grades can result from a develop a plan that will help achieve better variety of problems. Dr. Huntington offers the grades. 




Local Businesswoman Promotes Self-Esteem

"There was something about his work that impressed me very much when I first saw it in New York six months prior to our opening," remembers Studio owner Tom Hilligoss. "I had several conversations with the publisher and meetings with their representative, but kept hearing that the artist doesn't paint enough works for a show." Persistence paid off, however, and in February 1992, five months after the award-winning gallery opened its doors, the second U.S. show for Roy Fairchild-

Woodard was held at The Studio of Long Grove. "Roy's bad luck was our good luck," continues Hilligoss. "A strained back kept him from traveling from his home in London to attend our first show. The show was a huge success, nonetheless, and we received a promise from the publisher for a second show in October of '92. This show was even more successful and this time the artist attended." And although it was said under the name of Woodard, illustrations for record sleeves, "Red and White Flowers"

that he would not be willing to address an audience, the artist had a great time speaking to a large crowd of fans and collectors. His career has soared since that exciting beginning. The Studio of Long Grove is now assembling a major retrospective showing of works by Roy Fairchild-Woodard including originals oils, aquatints, serigraphs on paper, and a beautiful group of serigraphs on linen which have been enhanced by the artist and which

look spectacular—some even challenging the original artwork. Roy Fairchild-Woodard was born in 1953 in Surrey, England. He lives and works most of the year in his country


home. This peaceful environment is fundamental to his well being and stability as an artist, although he travels throughout Europe to obtain new sources of inspiration. He is particularly influenced by the painters of the Renaissance and he visits Italy in particular to study frescos, tapestries and paintings and to see for himself the techniques with which

His vision is coloured by his immersion in this past. His surfaces are rich and sumptuous and he uses varied interwoven elements such as fabrics and flowers in his work. The crumbling plasterwork of ancient frescos are also alluded to in his use of plaster as base for acrylic and oil overpainting.

His admiration for Egon Schiele and Gustav Klimpt can be seen in occasional references of line and decoration but he has extended their techniques to produce something altogether bolder and contemporary.

After leaving school at sixteen to train as a technical illustrator, he then took a degree in graphic design. Having completed his education he set up his own studio. He soon found it was difficult to make a living from his own work and supported himself and his family for several years by producing,





advertisements and books, as well as decorative serigraphs and lithographs. He achieved considerable popularity with his suites of pastel coloured figurative prints. Experimenting with different techniques he developed entirely new methods of achieving effects in serigraphy to obtain qualities of light and colour that are now in general use. His own painting and printmaking is done under his family name, Fairchild.





- 3. Spread a thick layer of mustard on one side of breasts—top with seasoned bread crumbs.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven (450°) for 10 minutes.
- 5. Serve over spinach briefly sautéed in butter at the last minute.

Interesting Atmosphere Wonderful Food



You can almost smell the salt air as you set foot into Port Edward Restaurant. In our indoor harbor floats the 25 foot "Porpoise" sailboat built in 1934 by Bond Boat Builders in Chicago. The Porpoise was Tony Bond's personal boat and was designed by his close friend and associate, naval architect John Deering. The strong and large wooden hull would have made her a fine fishing vessel at the turn of the century. But now our unique Porpoise is to dine one or two couples graciously in her cabin... a true unique dining adventure!

Our indoor harbor is New England inspired. To the south by the Colony House of Newport, Rhode Island North, by the old

Union Oyster House in Boston, and the picturesque Fisherman's Lobster Dock Shacks of old Penobscot Bay, Maine.

The huge timbers, joists and decking were salvaged from an old Milwaukee cheese factory and the old Starck Piano Company warehouse of Chicago. The strong timbers are virgin cutting of long leaf yellow pine, no longer available commercially. Three McHenry County barns were used for planking and hand hewn timbers for the Salem Lounge and Wine cellar. The old 1920's windmill dividing the lobby and the lounge was saved from destruction by Edward and provided an intimate setting for "popping the question" or romantic dining.

Our lounge overlooking the beautiful Fox River was inspired by the House of Seven Gables of Salem, Massachusetts. Salem's obsession with witchcraft in 1692 motivated the building of a secret room and stairs for the safety of the owner's sisters to provide a hideout from the "burning at the stake" witch hunters. We too have a secret room in the lounge. Look and see if you can find it. In the far end of the restaurant is the Navigator's Room with an outstanding collection of hard hat diving helmets, whaling harpoons, lances and an old jaw bone of a Sperm Whale. Hanging from the ceiling are oars from World War II Liberty Ship life boats.

We are celebrating **Port Edward's** 32nd anniversary this year with Edward's continuous hand on the helm. Interestingly, in 30 years of serving Alaskan King Crab Legs, Port Edward's suppliers have calculated that put end to end, the crab legs will have gone around the world during our celebration.


The encrusted cannons by the entry are of Spanish origin, circa 1680, from the Caribbean and the double ship's wheel is from an Alaskan ice breaker. The coral encrusted anchor in front of our indoor harbor was hauled up from the east coast of the Florida Keys and a few steps away, an old diver's two man pump from Montreal, Canada in

excellent working order. Just up to the side of it is a battered French ship's figure head from the turn of the 17th century. Throughout the restaurant is a collection of English antique nautical signs, rare "lead top" and 18th century binnacles, Edward Wolowiec's original paintings and nautical artifacts too numerous to mention. The collections and selection of Edward's world wide travels are reflected in our "gifts international" shop next to the wine cellar in our lower level. Top Side features an art gallery with more of Edward Wolowiec's paintings as well as nautical prints of other outstanding artists such as Turner, Spurling, Carl Evers and Charles Vickery.

Our long time guests are giving us raves about the new Sunday brunch with sea food accent look! A new brunch feature is the chef's carving station featuring London Broil. Also new is eggs benedict made to order. Of course we still have the omelet station that just about everybody loves and dozens of other items, plus a 20 foot dessert table. And don't forget our scrumptious International Seafood Buffet, served every Friday night.



How Do I Work With A Kitchen Designer?

You've decided that the time has finally answer, according to Norini-Johnson, is so come to remodel your kitchen. You're facing a multitude of decisions to make your dream kitchen become a reality. What wood, style and finish to I want for my new cabinetry? Should I choose a freestanding range or a built-in model? Would I like solid surface or laminate for the countertop?

You know you should contact a kitchen designer but you're not sure how to work with one. Many potential remodelers have questions about the role of a designer, according to Star Norini-Johnson, CKD, ASID, owner of Distinctive Kitchen Designs, Inc. in Wauconda IL. Her answers to some of the most common questions might help you in achieving your dream kitchen.

1) Will a designer try to sell me what I don't really need? "Most good designers won't oversell. They'll try to make you aware of the options available to you," Norini-Johnson says. And there will be more than you may realize: cabinets packed with ingenious storage aids; new labor-saving, high-tech appliances; and a broad range of revolutionary countertop materials, just for openers. "Your designer should present different ideas to help you make the right decisions."

2) Suppose my designer won't do what I want? "When a designer disagrees with what you want, the professional designer will usually discuss the pros and cons of the issue." says Norini-Johnson. "Perhaps the designer is concerned about a safety issue, such as proper clearances. However, it's your money and you have the final decision. If, on the other hand, you feel that the designer is not interpreting your needs or ideas, it may be a good idea to look for another professional to assist you.

3) Why does the designer need to know how much I want to spend? The obvious you won't end up with an elaborate commercial-type installation if you're interested in a simple, family kitchen. The designer also has to know your family's special needs. What about a baking center or a snack counter for toddlers? Or an island with a vegetable sink to allow more than one person to participate in food preparation? A good designer is usually very practical and should make recommendations as to which cabinets or finishing materials may best maximize your budget.

4) If I use a designer, how can I be sure what my kitchen will look like? "Only a few clients can visualize what their kitchen will look like from a floor plan. As a rule, I will often draw a perspective rendering of the finished kitchen. If you are not certain, or do not understand any element of the design, be sure to ask the designer to clarify the design concepts before placing the order for cabinets or other materials."

5) Will my kitchen cost more if I use a designer? "Quite often, the very opposite is true," says Norini-Johnson. "As mentioned before, designers can usually maximize the client's budget and avoid costly mistakes. However, don't be surprised if the designer has the policy of asking for a retainer at some point prior to your commitment for a purchase. After all, our time is valuable too, and we all have to make a living. The retainer usually covers the drawing and design time that the designer will invest prior to your ordering the kitchen. The retainer can usually be applied as part of the deposit for the order. It is a good idea to ask the designer about the billing policy during the first interview."

Someone in America dies every 33 seconds from cardiovascular disease, the No. 1 killer in the U.S. today. Lack of physical activity has been clearly shown to be a risk factor for cardiovascular disease. Regular exercise also prevents bone loss as a person ages, boosts energy levels, releases tension, improves the ability to sleep, improves self-image, counters anxiety and depression, and increases enthusiasm and optimism.

Scientists have not found a direct link between regular exercise and stroke. But

they do know that exercise reduces the risk of a variety of other health problems, such as high blood cholesterol, high blood pressure and obesity, which can contribute to heart disease and stroke.

"It's important to work in a workout every day. It could save your life," said John Dailey, Ph.D., president of the Illinois Affiliate of the American Heart Association.

"Regular exercise is one significant way to help reduce heart attack risk. No matter how busy you are, your workout should have the same importance as any other appointment of the day," Dailey said.

Physical activity can easily be incorporated into daily life, both at home and at the office. Using the stairs instead of the elevator, walking the dog and bicycling or walking to do errands are some examples. Activities for cardiovascular health, however, should significantly increase the blood flow to the big working muscles for an extended
