

CHARLES RENNIE MACKINTOSH-4 SCOTTISH GENIUS

♦ he Art Institute of Chicago is presenting one of the most important 19th/20thcentury decorative arts exhibitions ever mounted with the showing now through June 2, 1997, of Charles Rennie Mackintosh.

Charles Rennie Mackintosh (1868-1928), the Scottish architect, designer, and artist, formulated an aesthetic that, even at the end of the 20th century, looks startlingly fresh. Like his American contemporary Frank Lloyd Wright, Mackintosh created totally integrated environments. He and Margaret Macdonald, his wife and close collaborator, designed not only commissioned buildings, but all of their contents: furniture, textiles, decorative wall treatments, and virtually every other element of the interior decoration. Because very little of Mackintosh's original architecture, furniture, and textiles is found outside his native Scotland, the exhibition offers American audiences a unique opportunity to experience the scope and brilliance of his work

The first retrospective of the Scotsman's work to be shown in the U.S., Charles Rennie Mackintosh presents a spectacular array of more than 250 works, surveying his entire career, with architectural drawings and models, room settings, furniture, and decorative arts. The exhibition is also the first to include the watercolors and landscape paintings that he produced near the end of his life after he had turned away from architecture.

Although Mackintosh is now widely acclaimed for a highly original group of buildings, interiors, and designs for furniture produced in Glasgow around the turn of the century—his most celebrated masterpiece, the Glasgow School of Art (begun 1896) celebrated its centennial last year-he had a relatively brief career as an architect in that city, leaving for good in 1914. This body of work, however, inspired a new generation of continental European architects and designers with his original vision, fully conceived interiors, and uncompromising standards.

Since his death, Mackintosh has been described variously as a pioneer of the modern movement, as the last of the Victorians, as a master of Art Nouveau, and as a neglected genius. Charles Rennie Mackintosh seeks to cut through the myths, reflecting a broader and more accurate assessment of the artist's work than was previously possible, as recent scholarship has greatly enhanced the understanding of the artist and his milieu.

The exhibition examines each aspect of Mackintosh's life and work, including the important role played by Margaret Macdonald. Organized chronologically, it begins with Mackintosh's early architectural projects and designs for furniture and interiors in the 1890s. Concentrating on the great flowering of his work at the turn of the century—a period that saw the completion of the Glasgow School of Art, Hill House, and an astonishing group of tearooms he designed for the Scottish entrepreneur, Miss Catherine Cranston—the exhibition includes original architectural drawings and period photographs of the completed buildings. Furniture is represented by both the works themselves—chairs, tables, cabinets, desks, dressers, hat and coat stands—and the artist's preparatory drawings. The artist's textile designs and graphic works are also featured, as is the full range of Mackintosh's later

independent drawings and watercolors. To emphasize the impact of Mackintosh's architecture, the installation features large-scale, highly detailed models of his three most important projects-the Glasgow School of Art, Hill House, and the Scotland Street School. These are complemented by four short films, made especially for the exhibition, that study the exteriors of Mackintosh's key buildings and then move inside to explore the interiors. Almost all the objects in the exhibition were designed for a specific commission and a specific location within that commission—the films reveal how carefully Mackintosh conceived his interiors, balancing the decorative schemes with the design of the furniture and fittings

The centerpiece of Charles Rennie Mackintosh is a meticulous re-creation of the white and silver Ladies' Luncheon Room from the Glasgow Ingram Street Tea Rooms (1901). The recently reconstructed


room—one of Mackintosh's commissions for Miss Cranston, which are considered among his most outstanding achievements—has not been seen since it was disassembled when the Tea Rooms were demolished in 1971. A complete interior with the tables set, looking ready to receive customers just as they were in 1901, this stunning restoration features original furnishings and superb decorative gesso panels that Mackintosh and Macdonald created for the room.

Despite Mackintosh's early achievements in Glasgow and his international reputation, recognition in Britain was short-lived. In 1914, he departed Glasgow because of lack of work-first for the East Anglian fishing village of Walberswick, where he produced a masterful series of watercolors that include delicate flower studies and still lifes, then for London, where he tried to reestablish himself as an architect. Finally, he moved to the South of France, where in his last years, living modestly, he painted the brilliant series of landscapes that concludes the exhibition.

Charles Rennie Mackintosh was organized by Glasgow Museums, in association with the Hunterian Art Gallery, University of Glasgow, and the Glasgow School of Art.

The Chicago presentation of the exhibition is made possible by the Sara Lee Foundation. The exhibition is supported by an indemnity from the Federal Council on the Arts and Humanities with additional support from The British Council. Edu-

Facial Plastic Surgery, Looking Your Best

Dr. Churchill specializes in plastic and reconstructive surgery of the face and neck. Humans have a unique capacity to express emotion through facial expressions. Unfortunately, when we do this, we form expression lines where our skin repeatedly folds. Over time, and with the accumulated damage of sun and other environmental factors, these expression lines become permanent creases. There are a few different options available to lessen the depths of these creases. Collagen injections have been available for years and more recently fat injections and Gortex insertion have become popular. While these treatments provide very nice results, there are some potential problems with them. About 1% to 2% of the population is allergic to collagen, and the improvement obtained with collagen injection will completely dissipate within six months. Fat, on the other hand, never causes an allergic reaction, however, enough of it will dissipate in six months so that a series of injections are required to maintain the correction. Gortex is the are made of and it is well tolerated by human tissue. Nevertheless, this is a permanent implant that when placed beneath the skin has a small potential of rejection and can sometimes be felt beneath the surface. While all of these have been used with excellent results, the search for an ideal filler has continued. An ideal filler for creases would be a material that is easy to insert, becomes incorporated by the tissue without risk of rejection, and maintains its correction permanently. tion (or building up). Alloderm is actually the substructure of human dermis. All the cells have been removed and it is freeze dried. After being rehydrated, Alloderm is cut into small strips which are threaded beneath the crease of the skin through two small needle holes. The insertion sites disappear in a few days and patients can usually resume normal activity almost immediately. At first, the Alloderm can be felt beneath the skin, but over a few months time, the Alloderm becomes part of the patient's own tissue as cells grow into the area. As this happens, the Alloderm can no longer be felt and a very natural soft feeling is obtained. Alloderm is usually inserted beneath the skin after injection of a local anesthetic. We have used it in frown lines, smile lines and lips. It has also been used in nasal reconstruction and scar improvement. There will no doubt be new uses for Alloderm as time goes by. Alloderm is not currently being used for same material that artificial blood vessels the very fine lines around the eyes. This is still better treated with laser resurfacing. While some may prefer collagen, fat or Gortex, it's nice to have an added option for reversing the signs of aging. A consultation is required to determine which filler is best suited for an individual patient.

The Legacy of Shaker Craftsmanship (Part III)

This history behind Shaker nesting oval boxes began 150 years before the Shakers were founded. Nests of round and oval boxes were valued containers as early as 1650 in colonial homes that frequently had little or no storage space. They were comparable to our modern day canisters, spice jars, drawers, first-aid kits and pill boxes. These boxes were passed down and cherished for generations.


Shaker "fingered" lap boxes were the height of beauty and function: the "swallowtail" tapered lap joint allows the box to "breathe" with changes in humidity. Today there are several fine boxmakers preserving this Shaker tradition. Many precise steps are involved in the shaping and sizing of box bands before assembly. Bands are then painstakingly hand bent around wooden molds and the precision-cut laps are fastened with copper tacks. When dry, tops and bottoms are cut and held in place with tiny wooden pegs, just as the finest origi-

"SIMPLE IRA"

Happy spring! Now that April 15 is behind us, it is time to begin to tax plan for 1997. To this end, this month I am going to discuss a new type of retirement vehicle that was created in the Job Protection Act of 1996 and which became effective as of January 1997. The retirement plan that was created by the Act is called the SIMPLE plan (Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees). The SIMPLE-IRA plan replaces the salary reduction simplified employee plan, or SARSEP, beginning in 1997. Employers may continue SARSEPs established before 1997, but no new SARSEPs are allowed.

The SIMPLE plan is available only for employers that do not sponsor a qualified plan and that have 100 or fewer employees who received \$5,000 or more in compensation in 1996. 



"SIMPLE IRA"

generally must be eligible to participate in the SIMPLE plan.

A SIMPLE plan can be implemented using separate IRAs for each participant. A SIMPLE-IRA is funded by employee contributions and employer contributions made to the employee's IRA. The maximum employee contribution is \$6,000 per year. The maximum employee contribution is indexed for inflation and will increase in \$500 increments.

Under a SIMPLE-IRA, the employer is required to contribute to the plan each year. The employer has a choice of matching the employee's contribution using a formula or contributing a set percentage of the employee's compensation. The employer can match the employee contributions dollar-for-dollar up to three (3%) percent of the employee's compensation. However, the employer can elect a lower percentage matching contribution for all employees, but not less than one (1%) percent or compensation. In lieu of making the employer may elect to make a contribu- changes next month.

tion of two (2%) percent for any year. All employees are 100% vested in all amounts in the SIMPLE-IRA at all times.

Contributions to a SIMPLE account are deductible by the employer and are excluded from the employee's income. Distributions are taxed under the rules applicable to IRAs. Early withdrawals are generally subject to a ten (10%) percent tax applicable to early withdrawals from IRAs, except that withdrawals during the two year period beginning on the date of the employee's first participation in the SIMPLE plan are subject to a twenty-five (25%) percent tax.

Small businesses that have avoided qualified retirement plans because of the complicated discrimination tests and administrative costs may find the SIMPLE plan attractive. However, because of the requirement that employers are required to contribute to the plan each year, the SIMPLE plan may be a problem for some businesses.

BIDDING A JOB—Price Shouldn't Be Your Only Consideration

OK, so you need professional landscaping help, you've talked to three different companies and they've all given you bids. The designs are different, the prices are different-how do you decide which to use?

First of all, price isn't the only consideration. Buying a service/product such as landscaping is not like buying a computer. With an item like that you can compare the exact same equipment and features from one store to the next and go with the cheapest. But with landscaping, there are a number of factors that should be considered.

- 1) Design concept
- 2) Comfort level
- 3) Price and Quality
- 4) Experience 5) Referrals
- 6) Credit History

This list goes from most to least important and I'd like to go through how and why each should be considered.

Design Concept

Let's face it, if the price is great but the design doesn't reflect what you want or need, what good is it? The best landscape design/build firms are dedicated first and foremost to a professional, quality design. That design should take into account your soil, site and sun as well as any other lifestyle requirements you have. And while budgets certainly play a part in the overall picture and need to be considered, the look of a plan should be able to tell you if the contractor is or is not well-versed in type of plant affect the price. producing a full-service project or is

Comfort Level

This is a difficult one. Dealing with a contractor may, in some cases, last over many seasons. So being able to work with someone should be pleasant and not a source of undo stress. Questions you might ask yourself are: How comfortable are you in talking and dealing with this particular contractor? Does he/she seem knowledgeable? Is this someone I can trust? Do they seem to un-

derstand what I'm looking or? Do I have confidence in them?

Price and **Quality: Plant Materials**

These two elements must be considered together. When it comes to plant materials, all are not created equal. If you compare the price of the same plant from different

sources and there's a big difference, there's probably a good reason. What nursery are they coming from? Are they bare-root or balled and burlaped? When were they dug? What part of the country were they grown? All these issues as well as size and

Bare-root plants are sold with no soil mainly into lawn maintenance and trying surrounding their roots. Plants like these are purchased during the dormant season

and are cheaper for the processor to grow and ship. They are not inferior but they do need more initial care and may take a year to two to catch up in size to their balled and burlaped counterpart.

Balled and Burlaped plants are dug out of their growing medium so that a ball of soil surrounds the roots; the ball is wrapped in burlap and then tied for transporting. This is a more expensive process

Price and Quality: Hardscapes

When considering hardscapes such as brickwork and retaining walls, it's easier to price compare because you're talking

square footage. Keep in mind, though, the materials being used. Starting with concrete on the low end, prices per square foot escalate with the type of material.

So while price is easy to compare, what about the quality of the installation? Go see similar jobs that the company has done and talk with the homeowner. Check for things like uniformity, levelness of the surface, appropriate grading.

Experience

There are basically two types of landscape businesses: lawn maintenance and design/ build companies. While there is overlap in both, ask where their emphasis is and how long they've been in business. Many lawn maintenance firms get into design work and learn on the job. Design/build firms tend to have their employees trained spefrom wholesale cifically in plant selection and installation of large projects

Referrals

Most contractors will supply you with a list of recent referrals. Either have them take you around or ask where jobs similar to yours are. Don't be shy. Ask questions, ask for phone numbers of other clients.

Credit and Insurance

Appropriate insurance and good credit is very important to the homeowner. If you pay in full and your contractor doesn't pay their supplier, you could find yourself with a lien placed on your home. How do you prevent this? Ask for names and phone numbers of suppliers and call to see if they're current on their account. Ask to see a certificate of insurance and call their agent. It takes more time on your part, but could prevent problems in the future.
