If you were born abroad, bring along a "Certificate of Naturalization," "Certificate of Citizenship," "Report of Birth Abroad of a U.S. Citizen" or a "Certificate of Birth." If you do not have these documents and cannot get them, call the passport office to see what other forms of identification will be accepted.

If you were born in the U.S. and a certified birth certificate is not available, bring along a notice from the registrar of the state in which you were born that says no birth record exists.

Capital Gains and the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 by Sharon L. Keller, J.D., LLM

For the next few months, I will discuss the new tax bill entitled "Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997" in detail. This month the discussion concerns the reduction in the capital gains tax rate. As with most tax bills, the reduction is not simple nor straight forward. This article will discuss the rates and when they come into effect.

Capital Gains occurs when you sell capital assets and you experience a gain. These assets can be in the form of securities such as stocks. For sales of capital assets after May 6, 1997, the rates on capital gain have been lowered to 20% and 10% for persons in the 15% tax bracket. However, because there are many exceptions to these rates based on the date the asset was sold, the length of time the asset was owned and the type of assets held, the computation of the tax is extremely complex. I have included a schedule for the capital gains tax rates:

1. For capital gains taken into account after July 28, 1997, the lower capital gains rates do not apply to the sale or exchange of assets held for 18 months or less.

2. The current 28% maximum rate continues to apply to the sale or exchange of capital assets held more than one year but not more than 18 months.

3. Beginning after the year 2000, the maximum capital gains rates for assets that are held more then five years are 8% for taxpayers in the lowest tax bracket and 18% for all other taxpayers. The 18% rate only applies to assets first acquired by a taxpayers after December 31, 2000. If you hold a capital asset used in your trade or business on January 1, 2001, you may elect to treat the asset as having been sold on that date for an amount equal to its fair market value and as having been reacquired for the same amount. If such an election is made, any gain is recognized, but no loss is allowed.

5. If you made an installment sale of a ous October.

capital asset before May 7, 1997, your gain on installments received after May 6, 1997, generally is eligible for the new rates, not the rates in effect when the sale was made.

6. Capital gains on collectible items such as art, antiques, jewelry, stamps and coins are generally eligible for the 28% maximum tax rate.

7. If you sell business or investment real estate on which you took accelerated depreciation, the portion of your capital gain representing the accelerated depreciation is generally taxed a the regular, not the capital gains rates. However, after May 6, 1997 this type of gain may be eligible for a new maximum rate of 25%.

8. The new law does not change the rules for deducting capital losses. Therefore, if after netting your transactions you have a capital loss for 1997, you can generally offset up to \$3,000 of the loss against your other income. Any excess is carried forward to future years.

Impressionist Painter Alan Wolton **Returns to The Studio of Long Grove**


first show for Alan Wolton last October had an opportunity to meet not only an extraordinary artistic talent, but an utterly charming man. Born in England and raised in South Africa, Wolton came to the U.S. 15 years ago to paint the magnificence of our mountains and coastal regions. Art lovers who attended The Studio's says. Through countless hours spent in the mountains and at the seashore, Wolton has "stalked his landscapes, hunting for the most picturesque or dramatic views." His paintings, which are created indoors in his studio, evolve from the mood evoked while in the wild-from a certain sparkle in a mountain stream, ruffled leaves in the wind, or the crash of ocean waves on jagged cliffs. The memories of the initial emotional response he finds in nature typically take time to develop in his mind into a vision of the finished painting. Only when he knows what the final appearance of the painting will be, does he begin to paint-often feverishly and to the point of exhaustion. "I'm remembering the mood," he says, "the power and the purpose, not the actual linear design." And although Wolton has become known for monumental-sized works, even his smaller paintings express this power.

A highly-respected representative of the prestigious Santa Fe school of American artists, Wolton ranks high among living Impressionist artists. Tumescent Liposuction, Part One— Safety First

Liposuction is the most commonly performed cosmetic procedure in the United States. First developed in the early 1970's by Italian and then French surgeons, the procedure was introduced into the U.S. in 1982. Early liposuction procedures were severely hampered by the risks associated with general anesthesia and excessive

In 1987, American dermatologist Jeffrey Klein, M.D., described a new "tumescent" technique for performing liposuction totally by local anesthetic. His revolutionary system not only removed the risks of general anesthesia, but virtually eliminated blood loss. Today, Dr. Klein's methods are used by dermatologists and plastic surgeons around the world in a procedure that can be safely performed in a properly-equipped medical office.

The tumescent technique of local anesthesia involves placing large volumes of specially-prepared local anesthetic into the area being treated. The anesthetic is formulated so that it does not sting while being administered and produces numbness that lasts nearly 24 hours, eliminating the need for pain medication. In addition, the anesthetic permits the removal of large amounts of unwanted fat with such small instruments that no stitches are required—the incisions are merely puncture wounds in the skin.

While the tumescent technique of liposuction is extraordinarily safe, not all physicians perform liposuctions using the Klein technique. A small number of serious complications, including some deaths

Tips from the Top of The Rock™

Well... what great news! A historic change took place on August 5, 1997 when President Clinton signed into law the federal bill H.R.2014. It was a day of great joy for the Real Estate community nationwide. There are many benefits included in this federal tax package, but the one that I am extremely gladdened by is the \$500,000/\$250,000 Exclusion on the Sale of the Principal Residence.

For years the real estate community nationally has lobbied for and supported a change in capital gains earned on the sale of a principal residence. Prior to May 7, 1997, a homeowner of any age had been able to defer all or part of a gain by buying a qualifying replacement residence within two years before or after the sale of his home. And secondly, homeowners age 55 or older have had the opportunity to permanently exclude up to \$125,000 of gain from gross income by making a special one-time election.

Now the new law states that most sales made since May 7, 1997 are excluded for a gain of up to \$250,000 for an individual, or \$500,000 for married couples filing a joint return.

There are some caveats to this law with respect to the number of years you have had to live in the home and other specifics but the overall picture is:

- 1. Couples filing a joint tax return can exclude up to \$500,000 of gain on sale of principal residence. Single return filers can exclude up to \$250,000.
- 2. Gain in excess of \$500,000/\$250,000 is taxable at capital gains rate.
- 3. Effective for sales on or after May 7,
- 4. Home must be used as a principal residence for two of the preceding five years. Exclusion does not apply to vacation or second home properties. Formula provided to give partial exclusion to those who cannot Dream House Headquarters.

satisfy the two year requirement.

5. Provision replaces and improves rollover and \$125,000 exclusion rules.

And this is the really good news:

- 1. Age 55 requirement eliminated. This provision is available to homeowners of any age.
- 2. No requirement to roll over proceeds of the homesale and reinvest. Thus, home owners have options to trade up or to trade down on a tax-free basis.
- 3. If a home is used as a principal residence and as a rental property during the period of ownership, any depreciation taken after May 7, 1997 must be recognized
- 4. The exclusion may be claimed only once every two years.

As I mentioned earlier, there are many special rules regarding the new tax exclusion and we will make you aware of them as they become available. However the overall impact of this legislation is extremely positive. This new exclusion will simplify recordkeeping for many taxpayers. The improvement in the amount of gain excluded makes it almost unnecessary to keep pesky home-improvement records.

The fact that most homeowners do not have to reinvest their home-sale proceeds to avoid paying tax will allow them to base their decision about the size and cost of their future purchase on factors other than tax consequences.

The fact that a homeowner can buy and sell a principal resident every two years, make a profit and pay no tax is a bonanza to our American homeowners. 


