Governor Pledges Support for Women's Business Ownership Council

"Women-owned businesses are a vital and growing force in Illinois," the Governor said. "Women are starting small businesses at twice the rate of men, and their success is making a real impact on our economy. We need to do everything we can to ensure that government is nurturing this growth.

"A Women's Business Ownership Council can help us encourage women entrepreneurs by making recommendations and advising state government on matters affecting women-owned businesses. Legislation currently before the General Assembly would create the Council. It is my intent to sign the legislation if it reaches my desk. Should the bill fail to pass, I will create the Council through Executive Order."

vides for a Women's Business Ownership Council within the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs (DCCA) to review the status of women-owned businesses statewide and the roles of state and local government in assisting and promoting aid to women-owned businesses.

The Council would report annually to the Governor and General Assembly on new private-sector initiatives that would provide management and technical assistance to women-owned businesses, as well as ways to promote greater access to public and private-sector financing and procurement opportunities.

Literary Awards are presented in order to both recognize the creative excellence of Illinois writers and to promote awareness of non-commercial publishing in the state.





Combating Arthritis With Exercise

Since arthritis makes joints stiff and painful, the natural tendency is to minimize movement. This can simply lead to stiffer joints-and more pain-since inactivity weakens the muscles that stabilize joints.

Arthritis is a group of diseases, most notably - degenerative and rheumatoid arthritis. It can be linked to systematic illnesses such as gout and lupus (systemic lupus erythematosus). DJD or degenerative joint disease is the most common type of arthritis, involving the soft cartilage that makes up joint surfaces. It affects people over the age of 30. There are two different types of DJD. Primary DJD results from normal wear and tear, commonly affects thumb joints and fingers, the neck, low back, hips and knees. Secondary DJD occurs after injury to a joint, from disease,

(due to such problems such as poor posture or occupational overuse).


Both forms of DJD produce little inflammation, while rheumatoid arthritis causes large swollen and hot joints in more than one area.

Studies have shown that people with DJD can maintain and restore their flexibility by following a carefully designed exercise program implemented gradually and regularly. Expect pain when first beginning the exercises realizing the discomfort should soon diminish. (If pain continues - cut back and seek professional advice.)

A Guide to the Toughest Grades In School

Dr. Gordon Bishop, an experienced principal and superintendent, explains which school terms are easiest, and which are the most difficult for most children. Keep in mind that each child is different and will develop according to his or her internal timetable.

Grade 1. Children switch from kindergarten, where play is high on the agenda, to first-grade academics. Seat work and extended school hours require new levels of self-discipline. The expectation that all students will be able to read at the end of the year places a burden on some children.

Grade 2. Kids get a breather both academically and emotionally. Reading skills are a rehash of those learned the year before, so children who struggled in Grade 1 have a chance to catch up. They know the school routine and have established friendships.

Grade 3. Students are asked to master cursive writing. In many schools, Grade 3 marks the beginning of required homework. Teachers' expectations increase. Students make the leap from reading works to assimilating what they've read, and multiplication table drills begin.

Grade 4. Generally smooth going, this is the time when children have better muscle coordination so that handwriting is less of a chore and sports skills also improve. Long division in math is a focus.

Grade 5. Fifth grade allows children the chance to build upon previously learned skills. Fractions and decimals are of primary concern, as are beginning study skills.

Grade 6. Students enter sixth grade as boys and girls and leave as young men and women. "Confused" best describes sixth graders' state of mind. Their experience is made up of growth spurts, anxiety over

the prospect of entering junior high, and mixed messages about their place in the world. Material concerns such as clothing and possessions take on special importance.

Grade 7. Teachers probably would agree that this grade is the hardest to teach because of the many physiological changes children undergo at this age and the roller coaster of emotional highs and lows that accompany them. Tremendous peer pressure makes this year particularly stressful for kids.

Grade 8. This is still a time of many physical changes. Eighth graders are now 'seniors'' and are regarded with awe by younger children.

Grade 9. A year of independence and decision making, ninth grade is the time when kids are expected to choose what they want to study. Kids often need help sorting it out.

Grade 10. Students have established themselves as part of a social group and have joined clubs or athletic teams with which they identify. They have begun to make decisions about the special interests they want to pursue.

Grade 11. A meaty year academically, juniors who are college bound are expected to make solid grades and to participate in extracurricular activities. They will also take the SAT and ACT exams, which are important factors in determining college acceptance.

Grade 12. With the end of the long school road in sight, some students begin coasting academically. At the same time, students face anxiety about the future (whether about getting a job or going to college), and many get very emotional as they contemplate leaving friends and family.



Dr. Raymond Huntington, founder and President of the Huntington Learning Center, says that parents can help children improve their ability to concentrate. The following are three methods Dr. Huntington recommends in helping your children improve their attention:

1. Using positive self-talk and positive images. At sporting events you often see one player standing alone, muttering to himself, "OK, you can do it! Keep your eye on the ball." This is "self-talk," an important tool for controlling attention. Children can be taught to use it.

People also improve their attention span by controlling the images they see in their mind's eye. When a runner is half-way through the race, she may picture herself crossing the finish line; or a dieter may imagine his new appearance when tempted by an ice cream cone. These images help keep attention focused, and increase motivation to complete the task.

2. Asking questions about the work. Another way to direct attention is to ask Barrington at (708) 382-3655.

The ability to focus attention may seem questions while studying. Some general instructions are: "What is this paragraph about? What is the evidence that supports the central idea? Is this argument true or false? Why?" Asking themselves questions helps students bring their attention back to the task at hand.

3. Setting specific study goals. One way to improve is for children to work, toward specific goals as they study. You might want them to study until they can tell you the main point of the paragraph, or until they can solve a specific math problem. Together set reasonable goals, and discuss each goal with your children. Remember that many small goals are better than a single large one.

2) Is he/she knowledgeable? (Check the school brochure for teachers'


3) Are the teacher's corrections made clearly and in a positive way?

4) Are the students well behaved and attentive for their age?



At the end of the month, we were cleaning up some of our schedules for our financial statement and I realized that our used vehicle inventory was almost a million dollars! It amazes me that when we opened ten years ago, our new car inventory was about a million dollars and now it is many times that.

We used to consider 15 or 20 used vehicle sales a good month and now we average between 45 and 50 a month. We take a very comprehensive look at every vehicle traded into our dealership and choose only the best to retail. We feel a moral responsibility to make sure the vehicles we keep to retail have been checked out as thoroughly as possible. The vehicles go through a 21-point inspection to determine the quality and if they do not meet our standards, they are wholesaled to a secondary source. I was further surprised in my review that we wholesale an



average of 75 to 80 vehicles a month that do not meet our standards.

It's obvious that a pre-driven vehicle does not have a warranty like a new vehicle, but we try to make sure they are as reliable as possible. If they aren't good enough for us, they are not good enough for you!



Strengthening-tones muscles that support joints, making the joint more stable. When experiencing acute flare-ups, isometric exercises (which do not move joints) are best.

Endurance-enhances aerobic capacity, helping oxygen flow normally to all cells of the body and improving overall fitness level. Best results are achieved when such activity is done three times a week for 20 minutes at training heart rate. Swimming is a particularly good activity since it sup-




