

Now 38 years old, the Rev. Mr. Conner was a copy boy and police reporter before he became a minister ten years ago. He began his career as a copy boy for City News Bureau in 1941 and was a police reporter for more than a year, assigned to the Central Police Building until he was inducted into the Army in 1943. He was in service for four years.

The Rev. Mr. Conner attended Roosevelt university for two years and was graduated in 1950 from Cornell college, Mount Vernon, Ia., with a degree in philosophy. He received a bachelor of divinity degree from Garrett Theological seminary in 1954.

The guest speaker will tell firsthand experiences of interracial work in Chicago, being actively engaged in the programs and organizations which are aimed at meeting the challenge of the problems involved with changing neighborhoods. The Rev. Mr. Conner is married and he and his wife have three sons, who range in age from 3 to 7.




