MINUTES OF MEETING OF PRESIDENT & BOARD OF TRUSTEES HELD FEBRUARY 28, 1966, 8 P.M.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER by President John H. D. Blanke. Trustees present at roll call: David R. Capulli, Paul J. Shultz, J. Frank Wyatt, Frederick J. Voss, James F. Hollister. Also present: May L. Pinkerman, Village Clerk; Patrick J. Gaffigan, Manager; B.J.Zelsdorf, Treasurer; Byron S. Matthews, Attorney.

MINUTES of 2-14-66: Correction on page 5, par. 2, line 2: change "running" to "pumping". MOTION Trustee Wyatt to approve as corrected; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Ayes: Trustees Capulli & Voss not voting due to absence that meeting.

CHICAGO AERIAL INDUSTRIES INC. REZONING: President stated this item moved up on agenda to accomodate large number of people present. Items to be considered: letter of 2-28-66 from Chicago Aerial; copy of petition filed by objectors 2-2-66 at public hearing and amended petition presented tonight by objectors. Letter from petitioner was read stating they are studying possibility of amending petition along lines recommended by Plan Commission; requested deferrment of decision at this time. Trustee Wyatt made a general statement of position of Village at this time explaining that Petitioner has opportunity to amend if desired. If this is done matter could be referred back to Plan Commission, and if not, Board could take action. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Board defer action on recommendation of Plan Commission on Chicago Aerial Ind. Inc., petition until next meeting and we will expect if petition is to be amended it will be done by then. 2nd Trustee Voss. President recommended approving motion. Trustee Shultz felt this would give opportunity to neighbors to meet with Petitioners to exchange ideas and wishes of people in area. PETITION received from R.KENNEDY DEV. CO. requesting permission to erect signs8' x 29' to replace present signs at Fox Point; fee paid. Artist's sketch in color displayed. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to refer this to Zoning Board of Appeals for hearing; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Ayes.

ILL. MUN. LEAGUE: Copies of informational sheets distributed by President covering 10 months ending 10-31-66.

ORDINANCE-SCHURECHT GARAGE SETBACK: read. MOTION Trustee Shultz to approve as read; 2nd Trustee Gapulli. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister. #915.

SPRING CLEAN UP DAYS: Barrington Trucking Co. will collect April 25,26 & 27th.

BILLS: MOTION by Trustee Wyatt to approve for payment from funds indicated; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Roll call- Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister.

HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION: President recommended reappointment of Harold Lipofsky, Mrs. Erskine Wilder and Rev. Donald Olson to Commission for 3 year terms and the appointment of John A. Papadakis, 735 Bryant Ave. as new member. MOTION Trustee Wyatt to concur in this recommendation; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Ayes.

COMMONWEALTH EDISON CO. AGREEMENT ON SERVICE WITHOUT CHARGE: Read by Manager. It is dated 1-31-66 and effective 2-1-66, following under ordinance passed 10-14-57. President Blanke will acknowledge receipt.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY HOUSING TEAM: President Blanke introduced Mr. Don Freye, 2624
Fair St. Evanston, who presented other members of the team present: Dr. Martin Bickham of Wilmette; Mrs. Rosetta Gratford, Evanston; Leonard Kendricks, Evanston and Thelma Araithwaite of southside area. He stated they had already visited over 200 Village Halls and Boards and their purpose in being here was to try to suggest to the President and Board of Barrington a number of things a community can do to face up to problems of today in this area. He presented copies of several sheets for distribution. Mrs. Corliss Anderson, Barrington, added a few words as a citizen of the Village and Dr. Bickham related information on activities in other areas with real estate boards, etc. President stated messages delivered tonight will be taken under advisement.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT #74: Public Hearing to be held 3-15-66 in Circuit Court, Cook County. Attorney Matthews advised on procedure to be followed by any property owner who may not have received notice of public hearings (preliminary). Trustee Wyatt understood there may be a few so involved. President stated 3 copies of assessment roll are filed with President, Manager & Treasurer. Total estimated cost \$61,379. of which Village share is \$15,962.32.

ORDINANCE 914 -Amending Ordinance 884: President stated #914 passed at last meeting will be eigned in the morning, following the receipt of letter from Attorney which was read. Manager Gaffigan also read draft of letter he will send Attorney Braithwaite for Mandernach with copy to go to R. Kennedy Dev. Co. with certified copies of Ordinance #914.

CHGO. & NW. RR. CO. letter of 2-16-66 reported by President to suggest Village prepare petition of annexation of railway right of way; Attorney so directed; plat of the Railway and MacArthur property needed for which President suggested Village pay, recommending that Wight & Co. prepare such plat. MOTION by Trustee Capulli to concur; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Attorney has talked with Mr. Snyder who stated signatures will be forthcoming. Mr. Snyder reported to Manager Gaffigan that it had been announced recently on a news broadcast that the Forest Preserve District was again active but it was not thought to pertain to the MacArthur property. Trustee Wyatt urged this matter be followed thru immediately. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister.

HILL STREET: President reported the Sidwell map still shows this as a lot and Attorney Matthews has been advised to follow up on this; he stated the County map is now correct and he will contact Sidwell to update theirs.

MANAGER'S REPORTS:

Authority requested to advertise for bids for furniture & equipment for the Public Safety Building, etc. with opening date March 18th at 2 P.M. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt that Village Manager be authorized to advertise for bids; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister. (remove item #9 from Fire Dept. request)

TREE CARE: Report from Roth Landscape of 2-22-66 briefed, also the balance in Fund available. Discussion had on spraying & sanitation programs. It was stated some complaints received on work not yet done in some areas. Sanitation work since ice storm damage not yet finished. It was agreed apraying important at this point. Condition of fund vs work yet to be done explained by Manager who felt also spraying should be done and he will get estimate from Mr. Parrish on sanitation work uncompleted.

PUBLIC SAFETY BLDG. PROGRESS REPORT: Bids received on plaque (3): \$269.; 285.;\$366.

After an order is placed shop drawings or sketch will be presented for Board approval.

MOTION by Trustee Shultz to award contract to low bidder: Architectural Bronze &
Aluminum Corp. at \$269. 2nd Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli,Shultz,Wyatt,
Hollister. Noes: Voss.

CHECK LISTS: soon to be ready for working on. Moving in date discussed; MOTION by Trustee Shultz that Board set MARCH 11, 1966 AS FINAL MOVE-IN DATE AT PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING; 2nd Trustee Capulli. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister.

GRAVEL: Trustee Shultz felt time right to start this; discussion had on installing tile; decided that Street Dept. will take care of this.

RETAINING WALL: Mr. Ewald advised this is not in present contract.

FIRE & BURGLAR ALARM PANEL: Matter presented by Manager. Chief Muscarello felt Central Watch best; they would contact all business people on special service; matter of charges for this special service discussed; some areas charge from \$1. to \$5. each; new panel board will accommodate up to 64 customers and another panel could be added if and when necessary. RECOMMENDATION: That contract go to Central Watch. MOTION by Trustee Voss that contract be awarded to Central Watch on recommendation of Chief of Police; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister.

SIDWELL MAPS: Manager felt Village should have larger expansion maps for Cook & Lake Counties that are coming out at cost of \$138. for 19 for Cook & 5 for Lake, for use of Village offices and Plan Commission. Agreed.

HOME BLDRS. ASSOC. OF CHICAGO recommended several changes for zoning consideration. Manager has read same and will consult with Engineers. MOTION Trustee Wyatt that this be done; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Ayes.

ZONING ORDINANCE CHANGES: Letter from Attorney T.A. Matthews, on changes suggested, reported on. Attorney B.S. Matthews stated understanding has been reached with Plan Commission; it should be gone over again soon with Commission & when received from them action can be taken.

GREAT LAKES FIRE EQUIPM.CO. - PUTTA & KELSEY: Division of certain property covered in letter from Attorney B. Matthews dated 2-17-66. RESOLUTION cover this read. MOTION Trustee Eyatt to adopt this Resolution; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister.

LOAD LIMIT ORDINANCE: After discussion of proposed ordinance it remained tabled.

DRAINAGE DITCH CAPACITY (S/A #74) Manager reported concern had about capacity of ditch between Railway and Russell St. playground and he was concerned about last portion of Mr. Hodel's letter of recent date. Trustee Capulli felt this the right approach to the area and that perhaps sometime in future an additional storm sewer connection could be made. Manager did not consider flooding playground and parking lot even during a 10-yr. rain or thaw a good prospect; he will call Mr. Hodel on this.

KENNEDY SEWER PROBLEM: Sometime ago Mr. Kennedy asked to use an ejector pump to reach existing manhole; last week they asked occupancy permit for 9th family. Manager received letter from Consoer, Townsend & Assoc. approving this as temporary assistance to Kennedy Development.

LIVING CONDITIONS ON EJ&E PROPERTY: Sometime ago report was received on specific area within village with non-conforming use of buildings. Chief of Police will contact Chief Engineer of the Railroad about this.

<u>DUNDEE AVE:</u> President has received inquiries about conditions of this street.

Manager reminded that he has made several attempts to have work done in this area.

DOWNTOWN PARKING (area 110 E. Station St.) Trustee Capulli stated he has discussed this with business men abutting the property and Bank for 3 years; suggested meeting of people involved in immediate area to discuss future handling of problems. Manager will contact Bank about metering their lot in which idea he concurred. Mention was made of a possible mall in area. Manager will also talk with business people in area adjacent to lots in question.

Discussion of several holes in pavement on Hillside Ave. had; to Street Dept.

MEETING ADJOURNED at 10.05 P.M. on MOTION by Trustee Wyatt; 2nd Trustee Hollister. Ayes.












Storm Sewer Proposed For Immediat

Reference is made to my letter of February 15, 1966 and your Mr. Hodel's letter of February 24, 1966 requesting board approval of the resolution of intent for \$36,000.00 of MFT funds to finance the estimated public benefit portion of this project, to be known as 27CS.

I have the following questions prior to my recommending the approval of this resolution, to-wit:

- 1. Mr. Engler of your firm indicated all of the streets in this area were designated arterial and thus eligible for MFT financing--if this be true, why isn't Roslyn Road included in the resolution's description of the project? Your preliminary plans show an 18" and 24" storm sewer in Roslyn from half way between Prospect and Sunny Lane to Bryant Avenue.
- 2. The description of Waverly states from Prospect to Bryant, whereas the plans show a sewer starting midway between Sunny Lane and Prospect on Waverly westerly to Bryant, plus a 15" line on Waverly from just west of Exmoor to Exmoor.
- 3. I would also like to be advised if a definite decision has been made by your firm on the alignment of the 36" sewer in the alley between Bryant and Exmoor -- can it stay in the northerly side of the alley, or will it have to go in an easement to be obtained

Have you decided whether to reconsider your dropping of the benefit area on the south side of Northwest Highway due to deleting the proposed storm sewer on that side from Exmoor westerly? It seems to me that this area benefits from gaining capacity in the proposed new sewer from Exmoor and Northwest Highway southerly via a 42" outfall sewer to Flint Creek, doesn't it? Gentlemen:

Re: Proposed Northwest Area Storm Sewer C.T.&A. #65-058

With the submission of the latest revised preliminary plans and estimates of cost by Mr. Hodel of the Village Engineers on February 4, 1966, it is advisable to review the events of this project design.

- 1. Upon petition of 62 property owners in the area north of Route 14 and west of Hough Street, the Village Board authorized the Engineers on March 8, 1965 to prepare preliminary plans and estimates of cost.
- 2. By letter dated July 6, 1965, Mr. Hodel transmitted a three page data report and preliminary alignment plan of which copies were given to the President and Board of Trustees at the July 12th meeting. Costs were \$150,930.00 for stage I and \$59,700.00 for stage II, the total of \$210,630.00 for a benefit area of 97.7 acres.
- 3. As a result of that discussion on July 16th, President Blanke addressed a letter to Mr. Townsend of the Village Engineers with copies to myself and Board members outlining ten items to be reconsidered on this preliminary plan.
- 4. Replying to President Blanke's letter on September 30, 1965 Mr. Hodel indicated additional surveys resulted in certain changes in alignment which reduced the cost of the project on stage I to \$111,300.00 but increased the cost of stage II to \$80,500.00 for a net reduction of cost to \$191,800.00 for the 97.7 acres. Copies of this revised preliminary

plan and estimates of cost were distributed and discussed at the board meeting of October 25, 1965, at which meeting I reported that the field tile in the area had been opened and 160° of new tile was installed by our Public Works Department.

- 5. At the board meeting of October 25th I was directed to solicit financial participation in this project by the State of Illinois which was done by letter to Mr. James Dinkheller on October 28, 1965. By letter of November 10th, plus a meeting at his office on December 1st and another letter of December 3rd, District Engineer Dinkheller felt that installation of the 36" pipe under Route 14 at Exmoor Avenue when Route 14 was widened in 1952 was the extent of the state's participation in the storm drainage proposed for this area.
- 6. My report to the Board, at the meeting of December 13, 1965, covered these facts from the State, plus recommending three items for reconsideration by the Engineers with the direction to them to draw final plans and specifications. The Board directed, however, that the Engineers restudy the northerly boundary of the drainage district in terms of the northern village limits and to incorporate my items in still the preliminary plan stages.
- 7. By letters of January 26 and February 3, 1966 Mr. Hodel transmitted ten copies of revised preliminary plans and estimates of cost which a) reduced the benefit area to 84 acres; b) reduced the cost of stage I to \$103,079.35; c) reduced the cost of stage II to \$77,481.86; d) reduced the total net cost to \$180,561.21; e) indicated that four lots

outside the northern limits of the village could be assessed for benefit in the drainage district, without additional construction cost; f) delineated the public property area to 16.9 acres or about 20% of the benefit area.

Applying the tentative 20% public benefit to the rounded off figure of \$180,600.00 means a cost of approximately \$36,120.00 to the Village of Barrington.

RECOMMENDATION I: That the Village Board proceed as a Board of Local Improvements to install such storm drainage system, by a ten year special assessment, with the public benefit cost of approximately \$36,000.00 to be paid from the 1966 allotment of MFT Funds in a lump sum to the special assessment district. According to Village Engineer Engler, who specializes in handling MFT engineering programs, he has verified with State Engineer Richmann that we can use MFT funds for this drainage project since all of the streets within the drainage district are designated as state approved arterial streets. This will give the Village a method of financing our portion of this project without levying a drainage tax or burdening any of our appropriation funds for fiscal 1966-67.

RECOMMENDATION II: That the Village Engineers be directed to draw final plans and estimates of cost for review and approval by the Board of Local Improvements, such final plans to again consider keeping the 36% storm sewer either in the existing alley between Bryant and Exmoor Avenues or be placed in an adjacent easement on the north side of the alley, rather than in an easement on the south side of the alley, as it now is.

This letter is in further reference to your request by phone this date to the effect that my letter of February 21, 1966 did not definitely indicate that the proposed development of the Mandernach property could connect to village sewer and water on Eastern Avenue. You are advised that the board meeting minutes of January 10, 1966 reflect the following action and discussion:

Motion by Trustee Voss that the Village Manager be directed to advise Mr. Mandernach in writing that his prospective purchaser will be allowed to connect to Eastern Avenue on payment of proper connection charges, subject to receipt of letter from Kennedy Development Co. stipulating they have no objections to this..... (Trustee Shultz suggested it be stated that sewer be put in before Eastern Avenue is finished this spring; Manager stated Mr. Townsend had advised that should it go in after pavement is in it would have to be augured.) Also that this facility has been discussed and described in various letters referred to. Further, that Mr. Mandernach be advised of the availability of water in the area. Seconded by Trustee Shultz.

President Blanke stated he had read copy of letters and asked that one point be considered before passing on motion: There are terms stipulated in an agreement with American Can Co. which restrict the use of #70 S/A sewer to the area for which it was designed; he had conferred with Manager and Attorney on this. Attorney Matthews stated there is a provision which places a limitation on the use of the sewer, reading from the Deed of Dedication, but he gathers

there will not be enough sewage to violate these restrictions. Trustee Voss read from Engineers letter. Attorney Braithwaite stated as yet there is merely an option to purchase being considered. ROLL CALL ON MOTION: Ayes: Capulli, McCaw, Shultz, Wyatt, Voss, Hollister. Mr. Mandernach thanked everyone for their understanding and help in this matter.

As you know, the discussion with Kennedy Development ended with ordinance #914 (rather than a letter) passed unanimously by the Board on February 14, 1966 but not signed by the Village President for reasons outlined in copies of his attached report dated February 21, 1966. I also attach a copy of a letter from American Can Company dated February 22, 1966 for your information. I have this date discussed the contents of President Blanke's report and American Can Company's letter with Village Attorney Byron S. Matthews, who has advised me that nothing contained in either of these documents prevents the Village from permitting your prospective purchaser to connect their 80,000 sq. ft, building, with 150 employees, to Eastern Avenue sewer and water facilities according to requirements of the applicable village ordinances.

I think the foregoing information is sufficient evidence of the fact that the Village of Barrington is fully in accord with the aims of your prospective purchaser's development and that Kennedy Development Company has cooperated toward that end, as well.

I trust that this information will be sufficient for your purposes.

As we understand the situation, the proposed laboratory building is to be constructed on 32.7 acres known as the Mandernach property, which lies outside of, but adjacent to the Special Assessment No. 70 Sewer District. Further, the Special Assessment No. 70 Sewer District connection to the American Can 15" sewer was approved by American Can engineers and is in fact presently connected thereto. Whether a further connection from the proposed laboratory building to the Special Assessment No. 70 Sewer would jeopardize our use of the 15" sewer is a question that our Engineering Department is not prepared to answer without more information than we have been able to provide for them. I have discussed this with our Engineering Department in New York and it is their recommendation that we should oppose any additional sewer loading on the 15" line which would interfere with our full use of it. Dear Mr. Matthews:

Attached to this letter is a two-page statement relating to the proposed sewer connection from the Mandernach property to the Special Assessment Sanitary Sewer District No. 70 and area charges therewith.

The Village President's statement makes reference particularly to the restrictions set up by a Deed of Dedication and the Ordinance which effected its acceptance back in 1956.

The following are points of concern to the Village President:

1. The ordinance establishing a formula for area connecting charges passed at the Feb. 14 board meeting properly so has no directive for the issuance of sewer connection permits.

2.A special ordinance seems to be necessary which will direct village authorities, that is, the building commissioner, the public works superintendent and the village office as to the number of acres, and the square feet of floor space, and the number of occupants that may be serviced from the Special Assessment No. 70 sewer district.

3. The discussions at the January 10 village board meeting represented a building with maximum of 80,000 square feet floor space and a maximum occupancy of 150 persons. However, no mention was made as to number of acres involved in a proposed project.

4. The ordinance on area charges passed at the Feb. 14 meeting concerns the entire 32.7 acres, and the acreage for the project is not set forth.

5. No reference is made to disposal of storm waters or surface run-off disposal.

6. The recommendation from the village engineers is based on 80,000 square feet floor space and & 150 persons, with reservations.

7. The 32.7 acres has a potential of more than one research or office facility, under the stipulations of the Zoning for the area.

8. The possible import of stipulations in the Deed of Dedication should be evaluated in a letter from the village attorney.

At date of this Special Report the President of the Village of Barrington has not approved the subject ordinance by applying his signature. It is not his intention to veto the subject ordinance. It is apparent that he will not approve the subject ordinance prior to the next regular meeting of the Village Board of Trustees, which is February 28, 1966.

Faced with the task of approval of the subject ordinance since its passage at the February 14 village board meeting, the Village President has become concerned with the problems that could arise in applying the subject ordinance as to the issuance of sewer connection permits applying to Special Assessment Sanitary Sewer District No. 70.

The Village President has received no letter, or copy of a letter, from Mr. Byron Matthews, attorney for the Village of Barrington, stating that the subject ordinance is in proper legal form, and acceptable as to allotment of area sewer charges applying to the 32.7 acre Mandernach land described in the subject ordinance.

A letter from Kennedy Development Company, dated February 11, 1966, and delivered to the Village Board at the February 14 meeting, expresses a position of the company in reference to the subject ordinance based upon a statement ascribed to the village engineers. The Kennedy letter states: x"In light of the findings and recommendations of the Village Engineer contained in the letter of Consoer, Townsend and Associates we believe that the action requested by Mr. and Mrs. Mandernach is reasonable."

The recommendation of the Village Engineers, set forth in their letter dated January 6, 1966, to the Village of Barrington, is based upon the proposal of attorneys for Mr. and Mrs. Mandernach, to make sewer connection to Special Assessment District No. 70 for a Rasearch and Development Building with 80,000 squaare feet under roof and a maximum occupancy of 150 persons. The engineers advised the Mandernach attorneys, "it is our opinion that it would be preferable from an economic and engineering point of view to provide sewer and water service to this property from the Fox Point Subdivision." However, due to urgency and nature of the request, the Village Engineers expressed recommendation that sewer connection be granted to the 8-inch tile line in the alley north of Route 14 west of Eastern Ave. A legal opinion was suggested, to be obtained from the village attorney.

Re.: Mandernach Area Sewer Connection

The following day, on January 7, 1966, the village attorney stated an opinion on making a sewer connection from the Mandernach property to the Special Assessment Sewer District No. 70, as a result of having had "some inquiries." It is not known if the inquiries made reference to any restrictive prior ordinance.

approved; The proposed sewer connection from the Mandernach acreage was at the Village Board meeting January 10,1966. The following is excerpted from the minuates of that meeting: "Discussion: President Blanke stated he had read copy of letters and asked that one point be considered before passing on motion: There are terms stipulated in an agreement with American Can Co. which restrict the use of No. 70 Special Assessment sewer to the area for which it was designated; he had conferred with Manager and Attorney on this. Attorney Matthews stated there is a provision which places a limitation on the use of the sewer, reading from the Deed of Dedication, but he gathers there will not be enough sewage to violate these restrictions."

Special Assessment Sanitary Sewer District No. 70 is bounded at the south by Northwest Highway, at the west by George Street, at the east by Eastern Avenue and at the north by the south boundary of American Can Co. land. It delivers sewage to a 15-inch diameter sever tile that courses through American Can Co. land and carries also the sewage from the Barrington Meadows Subdivision. It will also carry sewage from the 12 homes to be built in Etters Glendale Addition and the area between that subdivision and Barrington Meadows north of Lake-Cook Road. Areas that have been connected to Special Assessment District No. 70 since the American Can Co. Agreement was consummated, are the Lutheran Church of Atonement, the Middle School, and the Mandernach Homestead.

At a meeting on June 6, 1956, the Board of Trustees passed Ordinance No. 625, which was then approved by the Village President, in which the Village of Barrington accepts Deed of Dedication of the 15-inch trunk sanitary sewer from the American Can Co., said Deed being dated May 23, 1956. Section 4 of said Ordinance states: "No permit for a connection with said 15-inch sewer hereinabove referred to shall be issued without compliance with the provisions of this ordinance." Such a permit was asked for and issued several years ago when the Kendall Co. sought to make connection.

The terms and conditions of the accepted Deed of Dedication state in part: "neither the Village of Barrington nor any officer, agent, or employee thereof shall at any time authorize or allow connections to be made with said sewer, or with any extension of said sewer in Grantor's land or beyond the Easterly and Southerly borders thereof, or with any sewer leading directly or indirectly into any such extension, which will increase the quantity of sewage ultimately reaching said sewer to an amount which will at any time prevent or interfere with the free flow and disposal of thessewage originating on Grantor's land or on the land of Jewel Tea Co., Inc., or on both of such lands."

It seems a companion ordinance regulating connections from the Mandernach and other properties should be considered.
