<u>Library:</u>Currently fulfilling a \$6,000 pledge to the Barrington Area Library to furnish a multi-purpose room in the new library building. Sale of a cook-book compiled by members is the source of funds. In 1977, \$1200 was donated from proceeds. This project to continue until pledge is fulfilled.

<u>Art Fair:</u> open to artists for nominal entrance fee, to promote interest in cultural art. Proceeds from fees and admissions given as prizes to winners, and balance to promote cultural art in high school. For example, in 1975, \$1,900 was donated to Barrington High School to provide a gallery in the school for the exhibition of art.

Senior Citizens: Provide entertainment and transportation for local senior citizens.

<u>Social Activities</u>: Revenue provided by dues. Activities for members such as Home Art Crafts and Arts, Bridge Games, Luncheons, Literature, Speakers on Cultural Topics, Theatre Parties, etc.

<u>Donations</u> to various cultural and civic groups such as FISH, Barrington Youth Services, Barrington High School Sierra Club, Hospitalized Veterans Writing Project, Barrington Area United Drive, Barrington Historical Society, Animal Rescue Foundation, Save the Bald Eagle, Countryside Center for the Handicapped, Barrington Mobile Intensive Care Unit, Northwest Opportunity Center, Citizens for Conservation, Educational Television Channell 11, Senior Girl Scouts. #### MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS BARRINGTON WOMAN'S CLUB, JUNE 7, 1977 AS CORRECTED

The June meeting of the Board of Governors of the Barrington Woman's Club was held at the home of LaVera Warzak, and was called to order at 9:45 A.M. by President, Sharon Bradley. Sharon thanked LaVera and the hostesses for having the meeting.

The roll call was taken, and the following members were absent: Mildred Prall, Betty Bjors, Dottie Blickle, Nikki Claffey, Jan Nameth, Audrey DeCook, Jean Krueger, Rene Clarke, and Evelyn Krause.

The minutes of the two Board meetings in May - May 3 and May 18 - were read and approved as corrected.

Estelle Girard read her Treasurer's Report and it was approved to be filed for audit. She mentioned that she had received letters of thanks for club donations to the Northwest Opportunity Center and the Mobile Intensive Care unit. She also stated that she is planning to move a 2,000 C.D. at 6% which will mature in June at the First Federal to a  $7\frac{1}{2}$ % C.D. at the First National, maturing in 6 years.

She also mentioned that she has increased the annual dues for nonresident members from \$6 to \$7.50, in line with the increase from \$12 to \$15 for regular members.

Marie Beaubien gave her report on the scheduled general meetings for the 1977-78 Club year, beginning with the opening luncheon in October at the Villa Olivia Country Club, and featuring a fashion show by Charles A. Stevens. Her meetings are all scheduled through next May, and include five luncheons and two teas at Langendorf Park. Marie has already submitted her information to the Yearbook Chairman, and the publicity to the Public Relations Chairman. The contracts for speakers have been given to the Treasurer. Marie also mentioned that attendance at General meetings would be substantially increased if each Board member would bring one other member.

Rozanne McCandless suggested that we might include a coupon with the monthly President's letter, to be returned with a check for a reservation at the upcoming luncheon. She further suggested that the coupon might include a place for indicating whether the member needed a ride to the luncheon, or could offer a ride to other members. Catherine Harkins indicated that the Club still has two cabinets of equipment at St. Paul's Church, and since we are not using the Church for Club meetings this year, we should remove the equipment. Audrey DeCook is to see to the removal.

June Brandvik mentioned that she has already received 12 commitments for her Art Classes next Fall. She is considering a second session to begin in January, but does not plan to list it in the Yearbook. If it materializes, it will be handled by a mailing to Club members.

Tina Madden reported on Collectors for the coming year. She has scheduled four meetings and needs an extra \$20 in her budget. She stated that good programs tend to cost about \$50 each, but could probably be obtained for a bargain at \$40. Her meetings will be in November, December, February and April on the second Friday of each month.

Rosemary Wolfe told of her upcoming Literature meetings. She has scheduled seven meetings, covering the months of November through May, excluding February.

Helen Jantz reported on the Golf Outing on June 6. It was decided that the Club would sponsor one golf outing a month during the 1977 season. The next outing will be July 11 at the Thunderbird Golf Club, and will be followed by a salad luncheon at the home of Dill Pope. She also reported that beginning in the Fall, the Tennis group will meet on Mondays, from 12:00 Noon until 2:00 P.M.

Jean Dake brought up the question of Theater parties in the Fall, and again in the Spring. It was suggested that she might consider using regular cruise buses for outings to Chicago, rather than school buses, since many members have indicated that they would be interested in attending the theater outings if we improved the quality of the transportation.

Marilyn Haayen reported on the August 14 Art Fair. Since the Friends of the Library will be sponsoring a book sale in the Theater-in-the-Round at the High School in conjunction with the Art Fair, she asked that Board members try to bring used books for sale. The Art Fair will also feature a Gourmet Luncheon, prepared by a French Chef, for \$3.50 per person.

Grace Wytmar and Jean Dake reported on upcoming activities of the Barrington Arts Council, including a Lyric Opera reception at Mancuso Cadillac, and a Dinner-Dance sponsored by the Dance Associates. The Arts Council Calendar will include a listing of Barrington Woman's Club activites, if we submit such a list to the Arts

Council. There are to be more concerts under the "Music in the Homes" program, in coming months. The first concert was highly successful, as was the International Folk Festival at the Middle School.

Lucy Henry presented the 1977-78 budget for approval of the new Board. The budget was revised to give an extra \$25 to Collectors as requested by Tina Madden, to be offset by an additional estimated \$25 to be received as an initiation fee from new members. Jean Dake moved that the budget be accepted as revised. The motion carried.

Estelle Girard mentioned that our accountants would like us to cut down on the number of special accounts, such as Art Fair and Special Projects, and that any Special accounts should be approved by the Board of Governors. Ellen Smith indicated that we should not have special accounts, but that all transactions should go through the Club Treasurer. Estelle Girard suggested adding interest from the General Fund account to the Scholarship accounts, in order to provide more money for scholarships, thereby eliminating some of the \$500 budgeted each year to meet our scholarship commitments. Ellen Smith said that the Club should not commit itself to any specific Philanthropies until we see what money is available at the end of the fiscal year.

Lucy Henry, Finance Chairman, suggested that the Finance Committee meet with Estelle Girard and arrive at some decisions about special accounts, rather than bothering the entire Board about our financial set-up.

Sharon Bradley stressed the importance of Board members, notifying the new Friendship Committee Chairman, Marcia Bruder, of illnesses or deaths among Club members.

Norma Carey raised the question of when the new Board should take over from the old Board at the end of the fiscal year. It was agreed that the new Board should take over after the installation of officers at the General Meeting in May. It was suggested that we might consider a joint meeting of the old and new Boards after the May General Meeting.

Rozanne McCandless read her membership report, and moved that it be accepted. The motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 A.M.

The minutes of the June meeting were not read, due to the absence of Recording Secretary, Jean Dake. Marcia Bruder agreed to record the minutes of the current board meeting.

Estelle Girard gave her Treasurer's Report, and it was moved that it be filed for audit. The motion carried.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS BARRINGTON WOMAN'S CLUB, SEPTEMBER 6, 1977 (AS CORRECTED)

The meeting was called to order at 9:35 A.M. by President Sharon Bradley. Sharon thanked Hostess Audrey DeCook and Co-Hostess Tina Madden for their help with the meeting.

Roll call was taken and the following members were absent: Bunny Monteaboro, Rosemary Wolfe, Dottie Blickle, Marcia Bruder, Nikki Claffey, Jan Nemeth, Rene Clarke and Evelyn Krause.

The minutes of both the June and July meetings were read, since Jean Dake had been absent in July. It was moved that the minutes be accepted as corrected. The motion carried.

Estelle Girard gave her Treasurer's Report, and moved that it be accepted. The motion carried. Estelle read a letter from our accountant, Mr. Charles Courmier, in which he quoted from our By-Laws, Article II, Section 6.(a), stating that "The Treasurer shall be custodian of the funds of the Club, and, subject to the order of the Board of Governors, shall collect and pay out all moneys belonging to the Club." He recommended that according to this By-Law, accounts such as Art Fair and Special Projects should be brought under the control of the Treasurer. He indicated that we could set up an accounting system maintaining flexibility, but still be in agreement with our By-Laws. Otherwise, we should consult with our lawyer, and change our By-Laws to correspond with our actual accounting practices. Secondly, he mentioned in his letter that the Barrington Woman's Club has shown an increase in its assets from \$21,600 in 1971 to \$30,900 in 1977, which, in his opinion, is inconsistent with a non-profit status. He and our lawyer, Bev Vanderburgh, are working on the non-profit status for income tax purposes.

Ellen Smith, as a member of the Finance Committee, expressed her opinion that all Club monies should go through the Treasurer, in spite of the fact that certain individuals may keep books of their own. She also stated that we should stop accumulating excessive funds in view of our desired status as a non-profit organization.

It was agreed that recreational money - i.e., Bowling, Bridge, etc. - was not subject to Treasurer restrictions, because these monies are considered to belong to individual persons outside the jurisdiction of the Club Treasurer, and are distributed at the end of the year in prizes.

Marilyn Haayen mentioned, in connection with the non-profit question, that some of the Hospital Auxiliary money is in C.D.'s, and is permitted to earn interest, without disturbing its non-profit status.

Ellen Smith stated that the Scholarship Committee has been studying the question of making the Club Scholarships self-supporting, as discussed at the July Board meeting.

Ellen Smith moved that we add to the By-Laws as follows, in accordance with better accounting procedures:

Article IV - Dues and Finance Section 3 (part b.) All accounts, including special accounts, must have the signature of the bonded Treasurer of the Club, and the balance of each account reported on the Treasurer's monthly report.

Estelle Girard suggested that she would meet again with Mr. Courmier to straighten out our accounting system.

Dolores Johnson announced that she had received a letter of thanks for our contribution to the Barrington Historical Society.

Marie Beaubien mentioned that Cathy Loughran will replace Ken Dake as pianist at the October Opening Luncheon, in connection with the Chas. A. Stevens fashion show. It was agreed that Sharon Bradley's September letter to the general membership will include a coupon requesting reservations and checks for the luncheon as well as a box to check as to whether the member needs transportation to the meeting.

June Brandvik announced that she has sixteen members enrolled in her Art Class - a sufficient number to pay for the instructor, etc. They will meet at St. Michael's Church on Tuesday morning to avoid Monday conflicts with Conservation, Tennis, and Rubber Bridge. She is still considering a change back to Mondays, and the possible use of the new room at the Library, which the Barrington Woman's Club is furnishing. The room has a kitchen and can be divided into halves, with each half accommodating fifty people.

Mildred Prall and Tina Madden mentioned their up-coming meetings in September and November, respectfully. Mildred's conservation meeting in September will feature a visit from Dorothy Fromherz, who writes the column in the Courier entitled "The View from Echo Point."

Helen Jantz announced that Duplicate Bridge now meets on the first Wednesday of the month at 10:30 A.M. and that Rubber Bridge has been moved to the second Monday at 11:00 A.M.

Jean Dake discussed various possibilities for Theater Outings, including Carol Channing in "Hello Dolly" at Airie Crown, and the "Vanities" at Water Tower Place. The final plans will be announced at the October Opening Luncheon, at which time Jean will take reservations. It was decided to start with a maximum group of 38 (one bus full), and to expand the group later if interest warrants a second bus.

Betty Bjors announced that she is planning six Travelers' trips this year, beginning with a Caribbean Cruise in November. She will distribute informative leaflets at the October luncheon.

Catherine Gallagher raised the question as to the inclusion of women as committee members in the Yearbook when they have not yet paid their 1977-78 dues. Committee Chairmen agreed to contact these women and report back to Catherine.

Marilyn Haayen reported on the tremendously successful Art Fair. She had a total of 304 artists - 60 more than ever before - and 28 artists competing in the Barrington Scene competition, with 42 entries. Juried entries totaled 472, by 214 artists - 104 more than any other year. She has no financial report as yet, because of outstanding bills. Marilyn also stated that the Junior Women's Club sold many smoke alarms, and that the Friends of the Library Book Sale and Luncheon were very profitable, with a profit of \$730 on the books, and \$800 on the lunch. The Barrington Historical Society, under the leadership of Helen Zoern, had 24 exhibits, and Phoebe Sharp collected many donations for the Friends of the Library. Marilyn thanked Merle Rauchenberger for the Art Fair publicity. Marilyn is planning to increase the prizes for the 20th anniversary of the Art Fair in 1978 to a total of \$500 for first place. Win Jones has agreed to judge the 1978 Fair.

A

Grace Wytmar reported for the Barrington Area Arts Council. The Council is offering memberships at \$5 per year, with benefits such as first choice of Arts Council activities, and special notification of all events. She also announced that Kathy Umlauf, in charge of the concert series in homes, is selling season tickets at a total price of \$20 for four concerts, beginning in October.

Audrey DeCook announced that the 1977-78 Yearbook will show a telephone number for General Luncheons.

Helen Zoern stated that she now has all club property, including the silver previously stored at St. Paul's Church.

It was reported that the Hospital Auxiliary is sponsoring a luncheon and fashion show at Inverness on September 30, at a cost of \$6.50. They are also selling stationery, featuring scenes of Barrington.

Rozanne McCandless read her membership report, and moved that it be accepted, with the exception of one new member whose dues were out. The motion carried. It was mentioned that in future reports, Rozanne should list those members who had dropped their memberships, as well as those who had officially resigned.

Enid Reed, Scholarship Chairman, reported that she had sent out six scholarship checks in the amount of \$500 each. The Wilma Spreyer Scholarship fund is running out, with a current balance of about \$200.

Grace Wytmar announced that the new Board Manual is ready for duplicating. It consists of 32 pages, and we need at least 32 copies. After discussion of various methods of duplicating the pages, it was moved by Ellen Smith that we spend the money necessary for commercial duplication, and for appropriate folders to hold the pages. The motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 A.M.
