As stated in my letter of August 5, 1969, our District personnel have reviewed the condition of East Hillside Avenue in your Village.

I understand patching of the surface was done on Friday, August 1, 1969. The District plans to resurface about 600 feet which they consider in need of immediate attention in mid-September. This work hopefully will return the street to a serviceable condition.

Senator Graham also requested a study of the traffic problem in Barrington resulting from Route 59 bisecting the Village. I understand the Village has done some work to alleviate this problem. If I understand correctly, the work included the modernization of traffic signals, elimination of parking, maintenance of pavement markings and signs, and the widening of the intersection at Main Street. I commend you for what you have accomplished.

Hopefully with the recent increase of revenue granted by the Legislature, the Division of Highways will be able to place in its annual program a project which will reduce the traffic congestion in Barrington. In the meantime, I understand the Lake County Highway Department has conducted origin and destination surveys on Route 59 and is reviewing, in conjunction with the Division of Highways, various relocation possibilities. There are no immediate plans, however, for the relocation of Route 59.

Please feel free to contact the District personnel at any time regarding highway work in Barrington.

Thank you much for your letter regarding House Bill 435. As you know by now, this bill was amended from that of its original form. The bill as amended and passed would do the following:

Motor fuel tax in Illinois, including diesel fuel, is increased from 6g to 7½g per gallon. Distribution of the 1½g increase is based on greatest need, and, because greatest need on existing systems is at the State level, 2g of the 12g increase will be paid directly to the State, with the remaining lø distributed on the basis of the present statutory formula which is, after deductions:

> State \* Cities 23% Counties Townships

In 1970, this new lag will yield:

\$32,200,000 Cities State \$12,200,000 Townships Counties

# MINUTES OF MEETING OF PRESIDENT & BOARD OF TRUSTEES JULY 28, 1969 at 8.00 P.M.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER by President F. J. Voss. Present at roll call: Trustees David R. Capulli, Paul J. Shultz, J. Frank Wyatt, Earl M. Schwemm, A. K.Pierson. Also present: May L. Pinkerman, Village Clerk; R. D. Heninger, Village Manager; B. J. Zelsdorf, Finance Director; Leroy Tornquist, Legal Consultant.

MINUTES of 7-14-69 approved as submitted MOTION Trustee Wyatt; 2nd Trustee Schwemm. Roll call-Ayes: Capulli, Wyatt, Schwemm, Pierson. (Trustee Shultz absent that meeting.)

INQUIRIES INVITED FROM AUDIENCE: Mrs. Zoern, Barrington Historical Society, on behalf of the officers of that organization thanked President Voss and Trustees for all cooperation received from Village and on behalf of Mr. Ringman, President of the Society, invited all to attend their open house to be held Sunday, August 17th from 12 Noon until 4 P.M. They requested permission to place some type of planting at the door - 2 evergreens could be placed on either side of ramp and the Garden Clubs have agreed to do this. Concensus of Board was to do anything that will enhance the appearance of building in consultation with Village Manager. Permission was given for continued use of a die cut of old Village Hall on their stationery.

ASSOCIATED YOUTH FOR COMMUNITY ACTION (A.Y.C.A.) Ted Newman, Vice Pres. requested permission for a door to door campaign in Village to raise \$5,000. which, in addition to their present \$2,000. would give them a fund of \$7,000. A letter had been received and item was on Agenda for later in meeting. He explained their operation and that \$2500. would pay for an adult coordinator; \$1800. for decorating and enhancing facilities they have in basement of North Park Field House with balance becoming a contingency fund. This is a not-for-profit organization; has been checked out by Manager with Supt. Miller of the Park District and the Police Dept. MOTION Trustee Wyatt to grant the A.Y.C.A. permission to conduct such a fund drive in Village of Barrington and that permit be issued and fee waived in connection therewith; 2nd Trustee Capulli. Ayes. President Voss suggested they inform the Chief of Police of their plans - drive last 2 weeks August.

ORDINANCE: MOTION Trustee Wyatt to adopt Zoning Variation Ordinance re <u>CLARK OIL</u> <u>CO.</u> sign, 205 N. Northwest Highway; 2nd Trustee Pierson. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli, Shultz.Wyatt,Schwemm,Pierson. #1090.

APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE presented by Manager Heninger and discussed. MOTION by Trustee Wyatt to adopt Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year commencing May 1, 1969 and ending April 30, 1970; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Schwemm, Pierson. #1091. President Voss pointed out that this appropriation and budget which has been noted in the Press to be of record size includes expenses for parking improvements as well as for waste water treatment plant and is not all for goods and services.

AGREEMENT RELATIVE TO DISPOSAL SERVICE was presented by Village Manager Heninger who advised on rates to be filled in where needed. Discussion. On Page 4-line 26 following 'quantities' insert: ("not to exceed 25 pounds"). Manager drew attention to #1 on Page 1 - "from every residential unit in the Village" stating there are approximately 200 water & sewer users not now taking garbage pickup, adding that in order to bring files up to date it would be his recommendation that we bill everyone not now being billed and they would have to come in and sign an affidavit (to be prepared by Legal Consultant) declining service. There is a choice of twice-a-week and once-a-month service now and Atty. Tornquist was to check statutes on burying of garbage. It was felt the affidavit should state how they propose to

dispose of garbage. Once a month general trash pickup to be last Tuesdays & Thursdays each month. MOTION Trustee Wyatt to approve agreement relative to disposal service between the Barrington Trucking Co. div. National Disposal Service, Inc. and Village of Barrington and that the appropriate officers of the Village be authorized to execute contract; 2nd Trustee Pierson. Roll call-Ayes; Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Schwemm, Pierson.

ORDINANCE: MOTION Trustee Wyatt to approve ORBINANCE RELATIVE TO THE REMOVAL AND COLLECTION OF GARBAGE AND REFUSE; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Roll call-Ayes:Capulli, Shultz, Wyatt, Schwemm, Pierson. #1092.

PROPOSED HOSPITAL BARRINGTON AREA: President Voss presented summary on meeting he attended at Farman Hotel recently called by the Hospital Committee of Barrington-Cary-Grove. They have decided to pool energies with goal of one hospital for area, The Evangelical Hospital Assoc. is working with them. Have been advised by State it will require general support from people in general from area otherwise forget it. 200-bed hospital facility being considered (not a first aid station) to be first rate & similar to Sherman at estimated cost between six and nine million dollars of which 60% can be financed and two to three million dollars would have to be pledged & to serve all surrounding communities. According to the State there is at present a 154 bed shortage in Elgin-Barrington area alone. Barrington has been asked to pass a Resolution of Support which was read by President Voss. It was noted the Evangelical Hospital Assoc. has 2 hospitals in Chicago - Christ Community with six to seven hundred beds and the Evangelical which is smaller; if they took over this proposed one they would own it and have a Board of Trustees. Discussion. MOTION Trustee Capulli to adopt Resolution as read; 2nd Trustee Shultz. Aves.

President Voss requested Trustees to remain after this meeting for one to discuss acquisition of property.

<u>KIWANIS CLUB OF PALATINE PEANUT DAY:</u> MOTION Trustee Schwemm to grant permission for group to hold annual Kids Day Peanut Sale in Village Fri.9-26-69;2nd Trustee Pierson. Ayes.



The Barrington Courier-Review published in issues July 31 and August 7, 1969 Ordinance No. 1062 which was passed at the February 10, 1969 Village Board meeting. No signature of approval by the Village President appears in the published ordinance. However, appended to said published ordinance, within parentheis, is the statement:

"This Ordinance Effective without Signature of President by

"This Ordinance Effective without Signature of President by Operation of Law."

Quite naturally the question arises: Why did the Village President Not Sign Ordinance No. 1062 upon passage by the Trustees?

At the February 10, 1969 meeting the Village Board passed Ordinance No. 1061 to vacate railroad street, and it passed Ordinance No. 1063 to rezone the Draper Development area; both ordinances were signed at that time by the then Village President.

In reference to the Parking Lot Lease for the Draper Development the Village Board voted February 10, 1969 to pass Ordinance No. 1062 with corrections to be made in the drafted lease; the major correction being that the south boundary of the parking area is the railroad right of way instead of Railroad Street (which was being vacated).

The then Village President John H. D. Blanke, whose term of office closed on April 30, 1969, held Ordinance No. 1062 until April 30 to apply his signature of approval, pending receipt of the following:

- 1. Corrected copy of lease with signature of developer.
- 2. Recorded plat of vacation of Railroad Street.
- 3. Survey plat showing area of proposed Municipal parking

lot in Draper Development.

4. Verification of seven foot dedication to Hough St. Since none of the information 1 to 4 came to the

Village President's attention before his term of office expired, he returned Ordinance No. 1062 to the Village Clerk unsigned.

The undersigned former village President believes that minutes of the Village Board should show when the properly executed lease was received by the village clerk, when the Plat of Vacation of Railroad Street was recorded and when Ordinance No. 1062 became law.

Distribution of MFT Funds Effective August 1, 1969

MUNICIPAL CLERKS

Gentlemen:

House Bill 442, signed by Governor Ogilvie on July 8, 1969, amended Section 7-204 of the Illinois Highway Code to provide payment of motor fuel tax funds allotted for use by municipalities as soon as possible after the first of each month.

In compliance with the new provisions, the Department of Public Works and Buildings will prepare vouchers each month for the payment of motor fuel tax funds directly to the various municipalities beginning with the next monthly allotment.

The balance of funds in the State Treasury will be available for use by the municipalities as needed with the following qualifications.

The Legislature previously authorized a temporary transfer of up to \$60 million from the motor fuel tax fund in the State Treasury to the General Fund. So far \$30 million has been transferred and it is probable that another \$30 million will be required to be transferred. This loan must be repaid by June 1, 1970. Until the amount transferred has been repaid, the Department cannot release funds beyond the amount which will maintain in each municipality's balance an amount equal to its proportionate share of the \$60 million.

For those municipalities whose balances are below their proportionate share of the \$60 million, the Department will withhold from future allotments an amount which will bring each municipality's balance up to its share of the \$60 million.

In those instances where the Department has authorized a municipality to obligate its future allocations, these commitments will be honored. After the municipality has received funds from future allotments to satisfy this obligation, the Department will then withhold from future allotments an amount which will bring the municipality's balance up to its proportionate share of the \$60 million.

Your municipality's proportionate share is shown at the top of page 1.

The following examples may help to clarify the intent:

Example I - Municipality "A" has an MFT balance in the State Treasury of \$25,000; its proportionate share of the \$60 million is \$45,000; its July allotment amounts to \$15,000; the difference between the \$45,000 and the \$25,000 is \$20,000 which is the amount needed to bring its balance to its proportionate share of the \$60 million. The municipality's July allotment, plus \$5,000 of its August allotment, will not be vouchered until the loan is repaid.

Example II - Municipality "B" has a balance in the State Treasury of \$10,000; its proportionate share of the \$60 million amounts to \$30,000; its average monthly allotment is \$20,000; a contract has been awarded and approved in the amount of \$50,000. Future allotments will be vouchered up to \$50,000 to cover the amount of the contract. Then \$20,000 of future allotments will be withheld to add to the present \$10,000 balance. After which, all future monthly allotments will be sent directly to the municipality.

Example III - Municipality "C" has a balance in the State Treasury of \$50,000; its proportionate share of the deficiency is \$15,000. This municipality may request funds up to \$35,000. All future monthly allotments will be sent to the municipality.

MR. DUGAN: This is a meeting of the/Board of Appeals. We are here to hear the petition of the Barrington Motor Sales and Service Corp. of 136 West Northwest Highway in which the petitioner asks for a variation in the sign ordinance to grant them permission to erect the usual sized Datsun sign by the Nisson Motor Corp. of USA. If there is anyone here who would care to come forward and give testimony, we will be more than willing to hear it.

(Mr. Ron Bransky of Barrington Motor Sales & Service sworn in.)

MR. DUGAN: You are involved with Barrington Motor Sales as what? MR. BRANSKY: President.

MR. DUGAN: Would you please state your case.

MR. BRANSKY: It is purely that the sign has not conformed to the ordinance due to its size and we are asking for a variation.

MR. DUGAN: We discussed this last time you were here. The sign is on 3 by 3 panels. If it is put in a vertical position, it would be 31 feet high. If it were put in a horizontal position, it would conform to everything except the total size of the signs. The 32 feet -- square feet -- will exceed that because there are 6 panels. If it is horizontal the only variation would be in the total area of the sign; if it is vertical there are two things. A variation in the amount of total sign area, and also a variation in the total height because it will be exceeding it by 11 feet.

MR. BRANSKY: Right you are. It is merely a standard sign made by Datsun throughout the nation.

MR. DUGAN: You are not saying all Datsun dealerships have a vertical sign? MR. BRANSKY: No, either horizontal or vertical.

MR. KOEHN: Do you have a sign there now?

MR. BRANSKY: Just a paper sign in the window.

MR. WERHAN: Do you have any plans with you?

MR. BRANSKY: No.

MR. DUGAN: There are 3 by 3 panels that can be mounted either horizontal or vertical. This is the size of thething we have to consider.

MR. KOEHN: Does the sign have back lighting?

MR. BRANSKY: Illuminated internally.

MR. KOEHN: You propose to illuminate the sign at what time?
MR. BRANSKY: We didn't bring that up. It would be just during opening hours and when it is starting to get dark out. We close at 9. We could turn that off.

MR. KOEHN: Would you propose to do that?
MR. BRANSKY: We have a sign we leave on all night. We could turn the Datsun sign off. Would be no problem.

MR. DUGAN: If it were a horizontal frame, would it create any great distress to you?
MR. BRANSKY: We never figured out where to put a horizontal sign.

MR. MICLER: The sign isn't in front of the property?
MR. BRANSKY: At the edge of thebuilding directly out toward the edge of the street. On the west side, the used car side.

MR. DUGAN: How far back is the edge of your building from the street? MR. BRANSKY: That is a good question. Fifteen feet inward is where the building begins.

MR. DUGAN: Now, what you are saying is you expect to have this sign erected back toward the building rather than out?
MR. BRANSKY: Like where the Jeep sign is, but 50 feet east of that, the edge of the unpaved part.

MR. DUGAN: Last time we were talking informally, we were talking about a drive-under area, and it would necessitate greater height.

MR. BRANSKY: We have to have clearance through.

MR. DUGAN: You were talking about a driver-under area. This disturbed me. Now you get 31 feet in the air. If you got vertical and 2 feet off the ground, then you are pretty well within this area except for the total area of the sign itself. This is the part I have been stuck with since the last time we talked. To find out what you really want to do. MR. BRANSKY: We are looking for effectiveness.

MR. DUGAN: I can understand this. If you put the sign out toward the front why do you have to have a drive through? If you entered on the east side of the building and exited on the west side? There was nothing in here indicating you would have to cross under any sign.
MR. BRANSKY: I never said anything like that. Instead of driving under, you would be driving through it.

MR. DUGAN: For instance, your store has got a front entrance. It would seem to me the Datsun sign would be somewhere in the middle or towards the front of your parking area. This is what you are trying to establish. Coming down from Northwest on the east or west, you would see the Datsun sign.

MR. BRANSKY: We have used cars and customer cars out there. You wouldn't see the last two letters.

MR. WERHAN: Is there an automobile that is over 6 feet tall?
MR. KOEHN: My comment would be I find it difficult to make an opinion on something that is undefined. I think the Board is entitled to a specific proposal describing the location of the sign, the size and the height. Without this, I don't see how the Board can suggest approval or disapproval.

MR. DUGAN: Where specifically is your sign going to be?
MR. BRANSKY: The sign was planned at the 50 foot line from the corner.

MR. DUGAN: Do you have anything indicating exactly where on your property this is to be done? This was not given. Is there a commercial firm going to put this sign up? Do you have someone who would draw up specifications as to where this sign is to go and where it is to be mounted?

MR. MILLER: None of us realize where you are going to put it.
MR. KOEHN: I would reserve my comment until I know the height, excess footage and location of the sign.

MR. BRANSKY: The footage over all the property is 50, so it would be 100 feet from one and 50 from the other end. The building is 50 feet wide. We have a 50 foot lot on either side. There is 150 foot frontage. It would be 50 feet from one property line, 100 feet from the other property line and as far in the front as possible.

MR. KOEHN: What height?

MR. BRANSKY: Proposing 10 feet off the ground.

MR. DUGAN: 31.7 feet, which is 11.7 feet higher than norm.

MR. KOEHN: The point I am trying to make is any variation of an ordinance must state what the variation is. Therefore, if he is asking for 10 feet 21.6 feet in height, to be located in a specific point, then we have something to justify a variation on. Other than that we cannot do it.

MR. DUGAN: I think your basic approach to/has been insafficient. You have no specifications.

MR. BRANSKY: I am stating them now.

MR. DUCAN: We can't take them as stated. They must be in some definitive form, like a drawing or a plot. I would recommend you decide exactly where you want this sign and present it as such. I don't think you will stand much of a chance if you don't do it. It is an 8 by 4 sign, and it may not exceed 20 feet. These are the things that are involved here. MR. KOEHN: When you talk to the sign manufacturer, ask him the illumination wattage. The two probelsm are height and how bright it is. The number of wattage behind it.

MR. DUGAN: We will convene then on the 23rd of July at 8 P.M.. Meeting adjourned.

MR. BRANSKY: I have some plats here, and also a letter. (Members examine plat of survey and letter from Barrington Motor Sales.) We changed our design of the whole thing. Instead of a vertical sign, we are contemplating a horizontal sign.

MR. DUGAN: The only thing you are asking for is the square footage.
MR. BRANSKY: Putting it horizontal would be more to my benefit anyway.
We would be using twin poles. It will look better. The moguls will
not be spaced apart. It will be squeezed together. No spaces. It will
be stronger, with all the tornadoes we have been getting. It will be
safer in case of a wind storm also. The only thing we wouldn't be
complying with is the square footage, which is what we are asking for in
the variation. Then we can go our 10 feet off the ground, which we can
drive under.

This is to advise you of the status of your application for Federal funds for sewage treatment works under Public Law 660. Your project was one of 217 downstate projects on file, as of the May 1, 1969 deadline, for evaluation for the fiscal year 1970 beginning July 1, 1969. The evaluation criteria of this Board is based on the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration guidelines used in administering Public Law 660 as amended. It includes several items under each of the following headings:

- I. Water Pollution Control Factor;
- II. Project Readiness Factor;
- III. Community Prevention Control Effort Factor;
- IV. Financial Need Factor;
- V. Relative Water Quality Improvement Contribution Factor.

The downstate allotment of Federal funds for Illinois under Public Law 660 has been depleted by the grants requested by the first nine projects on the established priority list. Therefore your project, which has priority position #30 , cannot be recommended for assignment of funds at this time. If any residual funds become available, your application will again be reviewed, based on your priority position and your current readiness to proceed with the project.

All remaining and new incoming applications on file as of May 1, 1970 will be evaluated for relative priority position for any P.L. 660 funds allotted for the fiscal year 1971.

Under the provisions of Section 8C of the FWPC Act P.L. 84-660, a community that elects to proceed to provide the necessary sewage treatment facilities prior to the receiving of a grant offer may later be eligible for reimbursement of the eligible portion of the project when a sufficiently high priority position is obtained. This new reimbursement feature went into effect last year.

RE: SCAVENGER CONTRACT

In considering the enclosed Agreement, you will find it helpful to have before you the Agreement used for bidding purposes.

In Section 1, \$30.00 per month was inserted in the first blank. The reference to once a month service has been modified to allow the Village to prohibit such service at any time at the option of the Village. If we are going to give this Contractor an exclusive for all service (as the residential rates contemplate), we should provide the safeguard of maximum rates, provided for the long addition at the end of Section 1. However, I must leave to you the insertion of the figures, after consultation with Barrington Trucking Company; you may find it helpful to refer to Ordinance Number 689.

In Section 2, "weekly" was changed to "monthly", and the designation of the day is to be in consultation with you.

The rates were inserted in Section 3 and commercial, industrial and institutional establishments have been specifically excluded from Village billing.

In Section 4, two references to "per residential unit" were deleted and in the first line "by the Village and others" was added. The intention is to allow annual adjustments for all charges, commercial-industrial-institutional, as well as residential, since we are providing for maximum rates.

Section 5 was amended to allow only Contractor for all types of service.

The words "for residential service" were deleted from the last sentence of Section 14, as I assume there will be no charge for any license, if the Contractor has an exclusive for all service.

It may be helpful, and should avoid questions as to changes, if you give a copy of this memorandum to Barrington Trucking Company.

When Barrington Trucking Company executes the Agreement, you should receive the bond provided for by Section 9 and the certificates of insurance required by Section 13.

The accompanying ordinance has been completely rewritten and is much shorter than the existing Ordinance No. 689. Note that I added "or create objectionable odors" to Section 3 (formerly Section 5).

The zoning map must be updated annually as this is required by law and we were paying \$600.00 per year plus printing costs to William S. Lawrence and Associates, Inc. our former consultant.

Under the heading "Planning Consultation" you may or may not know that at various times the Chairman and Members of the Plan Commission have conferred with me relative to annexations and zoning changes. When I contacted William S. Lawrence they were always evasive in their answers and were not able to provide us with anyone from their staff. As Mr. Barton suggests, we might test this arrangement and even proceed a step farther by requesting the services of a professional planner only at the request of the Plan Commission or when the Board is deliberating on a recommendation from the Plan Commission. tions. As previously informed, Barton-Aschman Associates, Inc. have recommended to us to await the results of the B.A.D.C. report prior to updating our Comprehensive Village Plan.

Item III "Citywide Thoroughfare Plan" is one of the projects that is very important if we are going to correct the so-called "Chinese Walls" from being constructed as physical barriers, blocking the possible continuation of many of our streets. A prime example of this is found in the complications we would encounter if we wished to extend Cook Street north to the N. W. Highway.

I strongly recommend that the Board authorize Barton-Aschman Associates, Inc. to proceed immediately to prepare a citywide plan for thoroughfare development and the cost thereof will not exceed \$3,200.00.

If it is your desire to have Mr. George Barton at our next meeting, July 28, 1969, kindly advise my office and I will attempt to have him arrange his schedule so that he may be present.

In response to your letter of July 1, I am pleased to submit this proposal for planning services to the Village of Barrington.

Our services can deal with any one or all of the following three activities.

I. Zoning Map

We will update your official zoning map annually, the next update being due in April, 1970. To enable us to do this, the Village will provide us copies of all ordinances dealing with zoning changes, annexations, and similar matters.

We presume that the mylar tracing of the existing zoning map can be obtained by you from William S. Lawrence and Associates, Inc. It further is assumed that the Village's needs can be met by a black-and-white map rather than one in color.

For this annual updating of the zoning map, our fee will be \$500. If the Village desires that we have a supply of maps printed, rather than using the Village's own printer, the printing costs will be in addition to the \$500.

II. Planning Consultation

A member of our city planning staff will attend the monthly meetings of the Barrington Planning Commission

July 14, 1969

in order to contribute his professional expertise to the deliberations of the Commission. Further, our planner should be provided with advance notice as to the matters to be covered at the monthly meeting, to enable him to prepare for the meeting. In intervals between meetings, he will be available for consultation by phone with the Chairman of the Commission or the Village Manager.

In acting in the capacity of a retained consultant, we should avoid involvement in major policy issues which are being studied with the Barrington Area Development Council. On such issues we could help your Planning Commission identify alternate courses of action and their results, but we should not take a firm position on certain issues until after the study has been completed for the BADC.

I suggest that we test this working arrangement for a period of <u>six months</u>. At the end of that period, the arrangement may be modified, extended, or terminated. Our maximum fee for the test period will be \$1,200.

#### III. Citywide Thoroughfare Plan

The arterial street system of Barrington is seriously deficient and the opportunities to create an adequate system continually are being lost as new land developments occur and new buildings are erected. A thoroughfare plan is one of the elements in a Barrington plan which can be dealt with today prior to major decisions resulting from the BADC study program. Because the need appears to be so great, we are proposing to prepare for the Village a citywide plan for thoroughfare development.

As we see it, the plan should recommend a complete network of arterial streets to meet the Village needs today and in the future. For many of the proposed thoroughfares, general alignment will be indicated, along with recommended right-of-way widths. In instances where there is not a great deal of flexibility in the location of new routes, the apparent best location will be studied in sufficient detail to assure engineering feasibility and to identify any lands required for rights-of-way. Similar treatment will be given to projects of first priority and on which action may be taken initially.

Mr. R. D. Heninger -3-July 14, 1969 Assuming that the Village can secure aerial photographs for us as required, our fee for developing the thoroughfare plan will not exceed \$3,200. Klein, Village Manager SUBJECT: Repair of Broken Hydrants Agenda Item The fire hydrant on the southwest corner of Cook and Lincoln Streets was found to have a cracked barrel due to water freezing in the barrel. This is an old hydrant and, therefore, difficult to replace. The other problem is that there is no way to shut down this section of water main unless eight (8) valves are turned off. This would also place approximately seven blocks out of service for the length of the repairs. Even then, the water may not be shut down enough for repair. I consider this replacement an emergency type of repair with the hydrant being replaced with a new six-inch hydrant valve and five and one-half-inch hydrant. The present hydrant has no hydrant valve and is a four-inch size. The main past this hydrant is a six-inch size. In order to complete the job properly, I am recommending that Rossetti Contracting do this work and also make a six-inch (6) valve insertion into the main allowing us to shut the main down. This valve would be inserted just south of Lincoln Avenue and be housed in a manhole. The cost of the hydrant is \$600 and the valve insertion is \$1,000. The Village will assist in some of the work.
