U.S. War Victim Once of Auburn

S. military attache at Stockholm, was remembered Tuesday by some older Auburn residents for having spent a part of his childhood days here when his father, the late Rev. Leon Artemus Losey, was pastor of Westminster Presbyterian church, from 1911 to 1915.

Capt. Losey's father, who succumbed to an appendicitis attack about 15 years ago while the family was living in a midwest state, was a graduate of Auburn Theological seminary in the 1910-11 class. He also took post graduate work here in 1911-12. He was ordained as a Presbyterian minister in Esperance in 1910, serving his first charge there in 1909-10, before he came to Auburn.

After the Loseys left Auburn in 1915, Capt. Losey's father became pastor of a church in Preble, later moved to Byron, and still later went west to Wyoming. At the time the Loseys lived here, Capt. Losey was only a youngster. He was born in 1909 before his parents moved to Auburn. His only sister, the former Margaret Losey, was born here. Capt. Losey was only six years old when the family left Auburn.

Mrs. Losey, who before her marriage was a registered nurse, settled in New Jersey and conducted a nursing home until she herself became ill and her son arranged to have her hospitalized in Wash-

He was assigned to duty at Mather Field, Calif., after graduating from West Point in 1929 and later was transferred to Washington. He stepped into the foreign service when he became an assistant military attache for air in Scandinavia
