Minutes of Fifth Annual Meeting of the Congregation

The Fifth Annual Congregational Meeting of the Presbyterian Church of Barrington was held in the Sanctuary, January 18, 1965, at 8:00 p.m.

Present were 70 members of the congregation, 12 Elders and Trustees, the Moderator and the Acting Stated Clerk.

The meeting was opened with Prayer by Dr. Victor Brown, Pastor.

The Moderator welcomed all members present, having previously thanked the members of the Women's Association for arranging the excellent dinner, and announced that the Stated Clerk, Elder Charles Boand had to be out of town and that the Minutes of the Meeting would be taken by Elder Wilbur Edwards.

The next item on the agenda was the reading of the Minutes of the last Annual Meeting. The motion was made, seconded and passed that the reading of the Minutes of the January 1964 Annual Congregational Meeting be dispensed with.

Mr. Edwards, after commenting that it would have been most appropriate for Mr. Boand to have been present to have given his report, read the Stated Clerk's report prepared by Mr. Boand. A member of the congregation called attention to the fact that the name of Mr. Jack Train had been inadvertently left out of the Clerk's report listing the members of the Pastoral Committee. The motion to accept the report was made, seconded and passed. This report is attached.

Mr. Donald Thomas, Treasurer, gave the Treasurer's report for the Current Fund for the year ended December 31, 1964, on behalf of himself and Elder Hal Wilson, the report of the Building Fund as of December 31, 1964, and the Treasurer's report of the Building Fund Checking Account. It was moved, seconded and passed that these reports be accepted.

The next order of business was the report of the Christian Education Committee and its Chairman, Jack Train. Following Mr. Train, Miss Rue Ann Porter gave a report on behalf of the Youth Fellowship Program. Elder Howard Hill, Superintendent of the Church School, followed Miss Porter with his report on the Church School Activities.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the attached reports of Mr. Train, Miss Porter and Mr. Hill be accepted.

The report of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Alvin Stieger, was read by Mr. Fred Lacock in view of Mr. Stieger's absence from the city. Mr. Lacock also presented on behalf of the Board of Trustees the Current Budget for 1965. The motion was made that the Board of Trustees' report and adoption of the Budget be combined and accepted. This motion was seconded and passed. This report and the 1965 budget are attached.

The attached reports by the President of the Women's Association, Mrs. Grace Schurecht, of the Associations' activities in 1964, and the proposed Budget for 1965, were followed by the motion to accept them. This motion was seconded and passed.

Mr. Jay Erzberger then presented the report of the Membership Committee, which is attached. The motion was made, seconded and passed that Mr. Erzberger's report be accepted.

The last of the planned reports was given by the Pastor, Dr. Victor Brown. Dr. Brown's report, attached, was followed by the tribute to Dr. Brown by Elder F. N.Bard, who stated that the congregation had greatly benefited from the constructive help of Dr. Brown in his sermons and what was not apparent to all was the tremendous amount of time Dr. Brown gave in leading the activities of the various Boards of the Church. Mr. Bard's comments were followed by applause.

The next item of business was the nomination of five Elders. Elder Paul Pearson presented in nomination for the session the names of Robert Johnson, Jay Erzberger; Don Albin, Jack Train, and Marshall McDonald. Mr. McDonald's nomination was for the unexpired term of Mr. Howard Dieter. The floor was then opened for further nominations. The motion was made that the Clerk be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for the five nominees. This motion was seconded and passed.

Elder Pearson representing the Nominating Committee then presented the names of four candidates as members of the Board of Trustees. These members of the congregation are Mr. William Stone, Mr. William Watson, Fred Lacock and Earl Cutler. Mr. Cutler's nomination was for the unexpired term of Mr. John Spence. Again the Clerk was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for these four nominees and the motion was accepted and seconded and passed.

The next item on the agenda was the nomination of four representatives of the congregation to serve on the Nominating Committee to nominate Elders and Trustees at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation in 1966. The following members of the congregation were nominated: Mr. Lee Vance, Mr. Gordon Monsen, Penny Godehn, and Ben Martin. The Clerk was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for these four nominees. This motion was seconded and passed.

Under the heading of New Business, the question was raised by Mrs. F. N. Bard as to the date for Double Services. The Moderator responded that a recommendation had been made that for the Lenten Season, beginning the first Sunday in March, we hold two services. The question was also raised by Mrs. Gordon Monsen regarding the special services and instructions during the Lenten Season. The Moderator responded again that he had received a recommendation that such services be held and that it was indeed possible that the congregation would soon hear more about this. The Acting Clerk requested that all reports of the various committees be handed him before the meeting adjourned.

The Moderator paid tribute to the many organizations which are contributing so much to maing our Church the great force that it is and can be in our community, and then adjourned the congregational meeting with Prayer.

Fifth Annual Report Of The Stated Clerk Of The Presbyterian Church Of Barrington To The Congregation

This fifth year of our official existence as a Church was one of severe trial and challenge both for the Congregation and its duly elected representatives.

It has often been said that the erection of a new structure to house an organization is a signal of the commencement of its decline. Perhaps this observation is inapposite to a Church. Perhaps it is merely a popular myth. But if it has any relevance to a situation such as ours, I think it has been belied beyond peradventure of doubt by the progress made by this Church in the past year.

Our Pulpit was vacant for nine and one-half months. Despite this our membership increased from 369 at December 31, 1963 to 453 at December 31, 1964, an increase of 22.8%. This was due to many factors: a loyal and patient Congregation, officers who were required to, and did, give more of their time and attention during this period to the affairs of the Church, a wise and genial Interim Moderator, Dr. William T. Jones, an inspiring initial Interim Preacher, Dr. George M. Gibson, a hard-working and effective Membership Committee under the Chairmanship of Alvin Stieger, and last but not least our new Pastor, Dr. Victor Brown.

The Committee on Nomination of a Pastor, which was elected at the meeting of this Congregation last January, and which consisted of --

spent many hours and many Sundays reviewing a large number of potential candidates for our Pulpit. At this point in time and space, I think we can say without qualification that theirs was a performance which merits an emphatic Well Done!

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Along with the expansion of other activities in our Church, Christian Education has experienced a substantial increase in enrollment and attendance during the past year. Church School facilities to accommodate approximately 144 children were constructed in the basement below the sanctuary as temporary quarters until the Christian Education wing could be added. As of this date, our enrollment is over 160.

This coming year, we are planning to take advantage of the impending double Church Services to expand our Christian Education activities so as to include the long-awaited Church School for adults and high school students. With the Church covering such a large geographic area, it has always been our belief that adult and teen-age Sunday morning Church School could be workable only with double Church sessions.

Double sessions will also provide us with an opportunity to divide some of our over-crowded Church School classes into two sessions.*

In order to accommodate increased responsibilities and functions, we are currently enlarging the Christian Education Committee, which has consisted during the past year of F. N. Bard, Howard Hill and Lester Klaas.

A new responsibility for the coming year is the program of the Communicants' Class, which has been transferred from the Worship Committee to the Christian Education Committee. It is planned that young people of the eighth grade and upwards who wish to join our Church attend a ten-week preparation program on Sunday after-

noons. You may wish to mark your calendars since the first meeting is scheduled for February 21st.

For the coming year, nursery care for children during the Church services will be provided by a paid adult with volunteer help from the high school young people.

During the past year, Joan and Lester Klaas and Joan and Jack Siekman have performed a yeoman's job in serving as adult counselors to the Youth Fellowship group. Tonight, Miss Ruanne Porter, the moderator from this group, will report on the Youth Fellowship activities during 1964.

Serving in the major task of the Christian Education Committee to date, as Church School Superintendent, Howard Hill will report on the activities of the Church School for the past year.

REPORT ON 1964 CHURCH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

We have completed a full year of church school activities with separate classes for nursery, kindergarten, primary, junior and junior high students. By December 31, 1964, there were 179 students who had participated in the Sunday School program under the direction of 14 teachers.

All classes are studying the 1964-65 thems of the Christian Faith and Life Curriculum - "The Bible." Our church school program is based on a three-year theme cycle of The Church, The Lord and The Bible. Next fall (October, 1965) the theme of the Christian Faith and Life Curriculum vill be "The Lord."

Special programs and activities during 1964 included, among others; monthly teacher meetings, special programs by the kindergarten, primary, junior and junior high classes in the Spring; collection and sending of gifts to Christopher House; Sunday School picnic in the Spring and collecting money for UNICEF.

It is particularly important to note that at the end of the 1964 Church School year our facilities were more crowded than at any previous time. Attendance is at an all time high - creditable to Dr. V. Brown and the excellent caliber of the teaching staff. In keeping with our plans for recruiting, training and rotating teachers, plus hopes for a summer Sunday School, it will be necessary for the adult membership, male and female, to accept the challenge and responsibility of teaching assignments.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES The Presbyterian Church of Barrington 6 S. Brinker Road, Barrington, Ill.

In 1964, twelve regularly scheduled meetings were held. Dume to personal and miness reasons, Richard Wann, Harold VanSteenderen and John Spence left the Board.

The Board is indebted to each of these men for their fine contribution this at year.

New members elected to the Board during the year are William Watson and John

At a meeting of the Session in November, a resolution was unanimously adopted tich delegated to the Board of Trustees the responsibility for the Building Fund Budget, lating to the initial unit of the Church building, other than memorials. This deletion includes the conduct of all activities relating to pledges and contributions to a initial unit of the Church building, other than memorials, and the supervision of a finances of the Church relating to the initial unit of the Church building, other as memorials.

The purpose of this action of coordinating the Every Member Canvass with the miding Fund, under the direction of the Board of Trustees, was to strengthen these two mivities under a unified campaign.

A new job description, which embodies this resolution, will be submitted to be a Board at its next regular meeting.

During 1964 the following items represented important actions and accomplishments of the Board:

- I. The Committee on Grounds composed of William Rose, Chairman, Harold VanSteenderen and Richard Wann
 - a. jointly with the Committee on Buildings, employed a new custodian. This is working out better than it has in the past when each committee had its own employee.
 - b. a second-hand tractor with a lawn mower attachment was purchased.
 - c. an underground drain was installed in the lower parking lot, to control erosion.
 - d. The front hill was greatly enhanced, thanks to Lee Vance and his personal vendetta against the weeds.
 - e. The landscaper has replaced most of the dead bushes and trees. With proper water and fertilizer all should be in good growing condition this Spring.

- f. The garden volunteers spent many hours of devoted time and energy, and we commend them for their efforts which have benefitted the beauty of the Church grounds.
- g. The total budget for all outside work was \$2,670.00 and the committee spent \$1,913.45 which included \$500.00 for a second-hand tractor.
- h. Plans for the coming year and longer range call for a better road approach and improved parking facilities.

A job description has been set up for the Committee on Grounds by Bill Rose. luties and responsibilities as outlined should be a great help to the members of the tee for 1965. The contribution of Bill Rose has been immeasurable this past year.

- II. Committee on Buildings composed of Alan Gage, Chairman, Al Stieger and Bert Heath The following has been accomplished:
 - a. Some patterns for routine maintenance and repair of the Church were established. Preventative maintenance and repair work has been carried out.
 - b. A workable method for handling weddings and funerals has been developed.
 - c. In the areas of visual improvement the following has been completed.
 - 1. Erection of a new office for the minister.
 - Installation of rear parking lot lights.
 - 3. Balancing of heating system in Church basement including relocation of thermostat and installation of outlet for auxillary heater in wing.
 - 4. Installation of coat hooks in basement.
 - d. The sale of the Manse was completed on December 12, 1964. This relieved us of our indebtedness to the Church Extension Board in the amount of \$2,500.00, Board of National Missions, \$8,000.00 and the Guaranty Savings and Loan, \$14,060.59.

Some open projects have been set up to be completed in 1965.

I think we are all deeply indebted to Alan Gage for the many hours he has it on this committee. He has, of necessity, had to handle most of these projects by self.

Since this committee requires mechanical skills, we are eager to accept tional talent from a member interested in this project.

III. Committee on Finance, composed of John Spence, Chairman, Fred Lacock and William Rice.

As you can imagine, this committee is a busy one, since it is responsible for preparation of the annual budget and the details associated with the Every Member ass, and which now includes the initial Church building.

a. During 1964 the Church had an Operating Fund budget of \$45,000 (This figure is exclusive of Church loan payments). The actual expenditures against the budget totaled \$45,999.00 this past year. This was an increase of \$6,882 over 1963 disbursements and \$999.00 more than the 1964 budget.

Operating Fund income from congregation pledges, and open plate collections amounted to \$43,907.00. This was an increase of \$10,305.00 over 1963 receipts, and \$1,103.00 less than the estimated budget for 1964. (Refer to Treasurer's Report) Payments on the principal loan of the Church building amounted to \$35,000.00. These payments were made possible from receipts of Building Fund pledges and decrease in cash balance.

b. For the year 1965, the proposed Annual Operating Budget totals \$91,000.00 (a detailed copy of this budget is attached hereto). This figure includes principal payments on the initial building amounting to \$35,000. The Operating Fund budget amounts to \$56,000.00 which is approximately \$5,000.00 more than our disbursements this past year. (Refer to Treasurer's Report)

The annual Every Member Canvass and Stewardship Campaign was conducted in late November under the direction of Norman Tucker. The results of this campaign are not yet complete. However, according to Norman, the campaign was most heartening from the standpoint of the number of pledges made. From the standpoint of total funds committed for the future, it was somewhat disappointing.

While there are still a number of members who have not made a specific pledge for 1965, the average pledge will fall below that of 1964. This is difficult to understand if each of us is realistic about his personal obligation to the conduct of Church affairs. Every effort has been made to hold the proposed 1965 Budget to the lowest possible level. It should be noted that interest and principal payments alone represent a substantial portion of the budget.

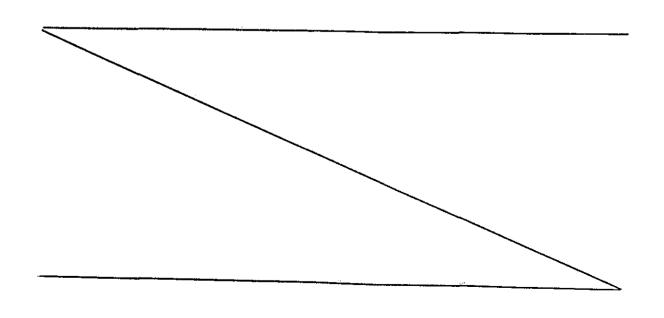
