ANNUAL MEETING OF CONGREGATION January 23, 1967

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation of The Presbyterian Church of Barrington, Barrington Hills, Illinois, was held in the sanctuary at 8 P.M. on Monday, January 23, 1967, pursuant to written notice from the Stated Clerk (a copy of which has been inserted in the minute book following the minutes of this meeting), publication in the Sunday bulletin, and announcement from the pulpit on the two Sundays preceding the meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 8 P.M. and was opened with prayer by the moderator, Dr. C. Victor Brown. Norman Tucker, Stated Clerk, kept the minutes of the meeting. There were seventy-six members present in person at the meeting.

A motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation held on January 17, 1966, and the Special Meeting of the Congregation held on January 17, 1966, and to approve the minutes of these meetings as written, was seconded and unanimously approved.

Eldred Gough, Treasurer, orally gave a report to the congregation covering the financial condition of the Church and the Church's cash receipts and disbursements for the calendar year 1966. A copy of this report is included on pages 13, 14 and 15 of the Annual Report, which has been inserted in the minute book following the minutes of this meeting. On motion duly made, seconded and unanimously adopted, it was resolved that the report be approved.

Mr. Albert Heath, a members of the Board of Trustees, reported on the 1967 budget. A copy of the budget can be found on pages 16 and 17 of the aforementioned Annual Report. On motion duly made and seconded, it was unanimously resolved that the report be approved and the budget for 1967 be adopted.

The reports of the Pastor, the Session Committees, the Board of Trustees and other Church organizations are also included in the Annual Report, which report was sent to each member of the congregation approximately ten days before the meeting. After discussion, it was moved and seconded that the Annual Report be received and placed on file. The motion was unanimously carried.

The moderator, Dr. C. Victor Brown, introduced the Stated Clerk who, in turn, introduced the members of the Session and the Board of Trustees present at the meeting.

Mr. Robert Johnson, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented orally the report of the Nominating Committee. A copy of the report has been inserted in the minute book following the minutes of this meeting.

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Mr. Johnson then put in nomination the names of the following men for three-year terms on the Session expiring at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation in 1970:

F. N. Bard Frank Cole Charles Desgrey Marvin Whitlock

These nominations were duly seconded.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the nominations were closed and the Stated Clerk was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot in favor of the above nominees.

The moderator declared the above nominees to have been duly elected to membership in the Session for a three-year term ending at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation in 1970.

Mr. Johnson then put in nomination the names of the following men for three-year terms on the Board of Trustees ending at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation in 1970:

Lee Perry
Ben Martin
Laurence Mullineux

He also nominated Albert Heath to fill the unexpired one-year term of Earl Cutler and William Zeidler to fill the unexpired two-year term of Robert Strauss. The nominations were duly seconded.

On motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the nominations were closed and the Stated Clerk was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot in favor of the nominees and the moderator declar them to have been elected for the terms specified.

The moderator then called for nominations of four members of the congregation to represent the congregation on the Nominating Committee, which will present its report at the next Annual Meeting of the Congregation. The following persons were nominated as such representatives:

The nominations were duly seconded.

On motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the nominations were closed and the Stated Clerk was instructed to cast a unanimous ballot in favor of the above nominees and the moderator declared them to have been elected.

Mr. Jack Train, Chairman of the Christian Education Wing Building Committee, made an excellent presentation regarding the activities of that committee and the status of the construction program for the Christian Education Wing. Mr. Train advised the congregation that the contractor would commence construction very soon and it was anticipated that the construction would take approximately 220 days. He also covered the work that remains ahead for the Christian Education Wing Building Committee in selection of furnishings, carpeting, etc. A number of questions regarding the construction program were discussed. One question regarding the Building Committee's plans to finish the ceiling in the present basement with acoustical tile was referred to the Board of Trustees for action.

Mr. Robert Hoffman, a member of the Board of Trustees, reported on the plans for financing the construction. Mr. Hoffman indicated that we had a commitment from the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company for \$80,000 at 6 3/4% and a further commitment from the First National Bank of Barrington for \$80,000 at $6\frac{1}{2}\%$. He also outlined certain other provisions of the loan agreement and briefly covered his efforts in obtaining this financing and getting it approved by Presbytery.

Mr. Lee Vance, Chairman of the Christian Education Committee, discussed the Christian Education program for the Church and also covered the plans of his committee for the future.

Pursuant to motion duly made and seconded, the meeting was adjourned with prayer by Dr. Brown at 9:25 P.M.



Seventh Annual Report to the Congregation

Our seventh year has indeed been an eventful one, full of many blessings, not the least of which is the leadership and inspiration we have received from Dr. Brown

On the following pages, you will find reports of the Pastor and of the Church organizations and committees. These reports will cover the activities of the past year which I will not repeat. However, there are certain statistics that I would like to highlight. During the year our membership has increased 16% to 628 members. Attendance at our morning worship services totaled 12.100 compared with 11,350 in 1965. In March, a communicants class of 22 young people completed a twenty week course of study and were admitted to membership in the Church. Three orientation classes for new members, each lasting for three weeks, were held during the year. The Sacrament of Holy Communion was observed five times during the year. In addition, private communion was administered to nine members by Dr. Brown assisted by one of the Elders. In 1966, four adults and nine infants were baptized by Dr. Brown. Dr. Brown performed fourteen marriages and officiated at five funerals. As can be seen from these activities together with the many board and committee meetings, this has been a busy year of continued growth.

The major areas of progress in the Christian Education activities of our Church in 1966 were:

- 1. Objectives Development of a statement of our objectives in Christian Education which has been distributed to all staff members. Copies can be obtained from the Church Secretary.
- 2. Job Duties Development of job descriptions for all staff personnel and written procedures for all major Christian Education programs.
- 3. Teaching Staff An approximate doubling of our teaching staff in 1966 in order to begin a program of "team teaching" (more than one teacher available for each class).
- 4. Attendance An increase in average Church School attendance from 86 in December 1965, to 155 in December 1966.
- 5. Teacher Procurement Selection of Al Thompson to recruit teachers a most rewarding move (it's hard to say "no" to Al).
- 6. Teacher Training Fred Dippel has made a good start in leadership training by building confidence and developing native ability in our staff. He has both the background and personality for this program.
- 7. High School Classes Both 9:30 and 11 A.M. classes have been successfully launched due to the hard work of Tom Caulfield, Chairman of Young Peoples Christian Education, and his staff.
- 8. Youth Activities Tuxis meetings continue to offer a vital Sunday evening program: A college and prep-school summer program is under way.

The monthly Catacombs parties for Jr. Highs have grown to over 200 in attendance.



- 9. Communicants Class Frank Cole, assisted by Gordon Stewart, continues to do an excellent job Sunday afternoons for a twenty week period of study and discussion with 22 young people planning to join our Church.
- 10. Adult Discussion Groups Eight groups are now meeting monthly with the major objectives being spiritual development. Two more groups are in the "forming" stage. The program started just over a year ago with one group. We now have over 100 adults involved. Congratulations to Cookie Vance, the coordinator.
- 11. Church Library We have the start of a fine Church Library, thanks to Dorothy Miller and her capable associates. Let's use it.

Our progress in the Christian Education area of our Church in 1966 could not have been accomplished without the foundation laid by personnel in former years. And your Christian Education Chairman also wants to publicly thank and commend all members who have made possible the continuing fine progress made in 1966.

Annual Report of the Board of Trustees For the Year 1966

In 1966, meetings were held every month with the exception of August. Attendance and cooperation of board members throughout the year was excellent. While there were no major projects to be carried out during the year, many hours were spent by the Board on routine work.

I. The Committee on Buildings - composed of Robert Strauss, Chairman, and Bill Ruge.

Our church building is now beginning to need additional attention, insofar as maintenance is concerned. Routine maintenance during this past year has required more time than can be expected from our present committee. The church basement was repainted and most of this was accomplished by members of the Board.

It is recommended that additional members be selected from the congregation to assist this committee in 1967.

II. The Committee on Grounds - composed of William Watson, Chairman, and Alvin Stieger.

Here again, additional manhours are going to be required to maintain driveways, parking and grounds. Space will be needed to store equipment that must be properly maintained.

This past year, evergreens and shrubs were replaced. Driveway and parking areas repaired.

III. The Committee on Finance - composed of Bert Heath, Chairman, Earl Cutler, Bob Hoffman, Bill Miller and John Croneigh.

This committee worked out plans to finance the Christian Education wing, purchase of an organ and present indebtedness of the church.

For 1966 the church budget amounted to \$102,000. Actual expenditures were \$101,915.02. The proposed budget for 1967 totals \$114,000.

Committment Sunday was October 30 in which an Every Member Canvass was conducted. In this canvass 237 calls were made, 227 have been completed. Since then 16 new pledges have been requested of which five have been completed.

As of January 1, 1967 total pledges amount to \$94,061. We anticipate total income for 1967 to be \$114,000 of which \$97,000 will be pledged as per schedule.

We would like to express our sincere appreciation to the captains and callers and to the congregation for its very fine response.

It is recommended by the Board of Trustees that the 1967 budget be approved by the congregation.

Annual Report of the Christian Education Building Committee For the Year 1966

The members of the Christian Education Building Committee are as follows:

The activities of the Building Committee will be discussed in detail at the annual meeting of the congregation so this report will be very brief. After many meetings with the architects, the Committee recommended to the congregation in a meeting on July 17, 1966, and received approval for the architects to proceed with the preparation of working drawings. The congregation also approved plans for financing the addition and authorized the Session "to contract for such financing so long as the estimated cost of \$160,000 for the Christian Education wing was not materially exceeded."

Upon completion, the plans were placed out for bid and a low bid of \$148,178 was received from Joseph A. Schiller, Inc., this bid includes \$7,000 for furnishings which can be produced more economically by the contractor. The specifications did not call for the movable partitions, which are estimated to cost \$13,400, or the carpeting on which we have a bid of \$7,264.68.

Through the efforts of the Board of Trustees, the Church has secured a commitment from the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago for a loan of \$80,000 at an interest rate of 6 3/4%, and a commitment from the First National Bank of Barrington for an additional \$80,000 at $6\frac{1}{2}\%$. Both loans are payable over ten years.

I wish to thank all of the members of the Committee for the many hours they have spent on this project and for their valuable aid and assistance. We are looking forward to the ground breaking ceremony on January 8, 1967.
