Dear Friends in Christ,

Sherri and I love to visit The Art Institute of Chicago. One of the fascinating displays we observed on one of these visits was a painting that revealed something behind the painting, perhaps a "first try" that was painted over by the artist. Suddenly the scene of one young woman was replaced by another scene entirely. When a "first try" is painted over by something else, art historians call this technique pentimento. The root for this word means "repent". In other words, the painter repented or changed his or her mind.

Most of our daily encounters are ones where we see the outside paint that some people have very carefully applied to their lives in order to get by in the world. Often, people are trying to hide a picture of themselves because they are afraid of what the revelation might do. In fact, I would suggest that in one way or another all of us have painted over our lives, our emotions, and our feelings.

I think the word pentimento is the best gift the church can give when it says, "People of God, feel free to turn about face – change your mind – begin again." The Church needs to be that place where we can freely turn in an old conception and replace it with a later choice. The best novels are those whose character's paint peels off and we get to see the real person that was there all along, a far better one than the one painted over.

At its best, the Church lets us peel off the anxiety that demands so much attention in our lives. Another once said, "Anxiety is a thin stream of fear trickling through the mind [that] if encouraged, cuts a channel into which all other thoughts are drained." Anxiety gives energy to the future that has not been created. In fact, 90% of what we are anxious about never comes to pass. The other useless emotion is guilt, which grovels in the things we are sorry for that have long since been forgiven in the heart of God.

May God help us to be a church family that does not demand repentance, but creates a place where people come and peel off the paint of manners and definition given by others, so that the true person, God created them to be, can be revealed to the world. When the opportunity to peel the paint off your life comes, let it happen so that the true child of God may emerge.

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# **Church Administration**

#### Session Notes from the June 28 Meeting

**Elders-Trustees Meeting**. Four designated Session members will meet with the Trustees to discuss the Trustees function and how Elders can further support the Trustees in their bookkeeping duties.



**Presbytery Meeting**. Dr. Baxter reviewed the recent Presbytery meeting where two candidates were examined and approved to be ordained.

**Board of Deacons**. Discussed the need to offer rides to people for Sunday morning worship, so a survey will be conducted to determine this need

**Membership and Outreach.** Angie Smith discussed long term growth issues and distributed the 2003 strategic plan that the committee presented last year. M & O is doing things in the community, and is also greeting visitors to make sure they are welcomed. The committee is working on the pictorial directory.

**Worship**. The committee discussed the budget, adding soloists to the worship service, and taking people to the Calvin College Institute for Worship and Arts in January 2005. This training event will give the committee a different way of looking at worship and lead to ideas on ways to build attendance at the 11:00 a.m. worship service.

**San Marcos Update**. There are three subcommittees making up the board which are meeting every week either by phone or in downtown Chicago in an effort to develop recommendations that will save San Marcos and be approved by the Presbytery by yearend. If the Presbytery disapproves the recommendations, then San Marcos will disband.

**Church Organization**. The recommendations of the ad hoc organizational committee were presented. This committee was formed to evaluate the church's organizational structure and to see if there was a better organizational structure that the church could adopt, and to review how to deal with key issues. Several recommendations were adopted for implementation.

\* Committee reports are to be emailed to the Church Secretary for dissemination at least 48 business hours *prior* to Session meetings.

\* Committee chairs are given 2 minutes at Session meetings.

\* Topics to be discussed *must* be presented to the Clerk no later than 48 hours prior to the upcoming Session meeting.

\* Most of the time at Session meetings should be used to discuss "core" issues rather than routine day-to-day topics.

\* It is important that all elders participate in discussions so that a variety of opinions and feedback are heard.

\* Session encourages ministerial staff to attend committee meetings. However, the only required committee meetings for staff would be those where the chairperson specifically asks a staff member to attend.

**Stewardship**: Bob Skopek. It is summertime. What a wonderful time of year. Nature is in full bloom and I constantly have baby "critters" running around my yard. Summer is also a time when I seem to think and reflect more on my life. I often think about what I have and what I continue to get on a daily basis. ### Stephen Ministry



Have you ever wondered what the Stephen Ministry Symbol stands for?

The Stephen Ministry symbol tells the story of a care receiver's journey from brokenness to wholeness through the transforming power of Christ's love. It serves as a simple reminder that it is not the Stephen Minister who restores a person to wholeness, but rather the healing a Care Receiver feels as he or she experiences the love and acceptance of Christ through a Stephen Minister.

The logo's most dominant feature is the cross. It reminds us that Christ is at the center of Stephen Ministry and of all Stephen Ministry relationships.

The broken person behind the cross symbolizes the brokenness in our lives.

The whole person in front of the cross signifies the wholeness we encounter through the transforming power of Jesus' love. It is only through Jesus and his life, death on the cross, and resurrection that we, who are all broken people, are made whole. The circle is a symbol of God's eternal and neverending love for us. God's love surrounds us, holds us, heals us, and the cross of Jesus at the center of that love. For it was Jesus, God's Son, who allowed himself to be broken on the cross to save us from our sin and give us the opportunity to be restored to wholeness through him.

Deacon's Corner, Tom Burke One of the important roles that deacons have is to visit members of the church who are in the hospital or at home recovering from surgery or some other malady. In a role reversal recently, the church deacons offered support to my wife Laura who underwent emergency surgery followed by a lengthy hospital stay at Good Shepherd Hospital. The visits, prayers, and donations of food by the other deacons were very much appreciated by our entire family and played a significant role in Laura's healing.

I was also asked to write about an interest of mine in *apologetics*, or defense of the faith, which was stimulated by visits of Jehovah's Witnesses to my door who challenged the claims of our traditional, Trinitarian Christian beliefs. To answer their objections I was forced to do research to come up with answers. In the process, and since then, I have learned a lot about the Bible and how to defend the faith even when discussing it with atheists.

One of the things I found out is that Jehovah's Witnesses use their unique New World Translation of the Bible. Their version is not well regarded by credible Bible scholars, and was deliberately scrubbed of most references to the divinity of Jesus, instead calling him a lesser god, or in reality the Archangel Michael. Various organizations like the Christian Research Institute in California offer excellent books and other materials that helped me when speaking with these folks.

Whether I actually reached any of the Jehovah's Witnesses and others who rang my doorbell over the years, sometimes coming back for more in-depth discussions, is hard to say. The key is to show respect and hope a seed was planted.

As the Apostle Peter wrote, "Be ready always to defend and give an answer for the faith that lies within you."

# Parish Life

As we begin to plan for the Fall-Winter-Spring 2004-2005 year, it is important that everyone be aware of the procedures for scheduling meetings, the instructions for unlocking and locking the doors and the check list of reminders for use of our church building.

Please call the church office, **847-381-0975** or email <u>bkalaway@pcbarrington.org</u> to schedule the date, time and room(s) you wish to use and let us know if you need any tables, chairs, TV, VCR, flip charts or easels. If you need a key, please contact the church office to check one out.

It is extremely important that anyone who has a key understands how to unlock and relock the doors; security for the congregation and staff is a prime concern. Below are instructions.

To Unlock. Insert key and turn to left until it clicks. Turn the latch to the right and pull the door open.

**Relock the door immediately**. Turn the key to the right until it clicks. Remove the key.

**To Unlock the crash bars**. Go inside and use the Allen wrench to unlock the crash bars. The Allen Wrench is the long red handled T shaped tool, which is on top of the fire alarm at the office entrance, or in the plastic newsletter rack at the Courtyard entrance. Push in and hold down the crash bar, place the wrench in the hole next to the crash bar, and turn to unlock the crash bars.

To Lock the crash bars. Hold in the crash bar, turn the Allen Wrench to lock. Crash bar should pop out.

Anyone who uses the building should also be aware of the need to clean up after themselves – dispose of trash, wash any dishes, coffee pots or utensils and launder any linens, including towels. BPW has undertaken the reorganization of the kitchen, sorting and redoing the cupboards and will be paying to have the kitchen professionally cleaned twice a year. Out of courtesy, everyone using the kitchen should abide by these rules:

\*If you get something out, put it back where you got it.

\*If you dirty something, please wash it and return it to its rightful place.

\* Linens (including towels) used by any individual or group, should be taken home, laundered and returned. While BPW will oversee the general upkeep of the kitchen, it is everyone's responsibility to keep it clean and orderly.

#### Check List at the end of the meeting or event:

\* Dispose of any trash. There are large trash cans in the kitchen.

- \* Turn out all the lights please make sure the slide light controls in Fellowship Hall are all the way down and "click". Turn out bathroom lights, Narthex lights, choir loft lights, etc. There are some security lights which will remain on.
- \* If you have turned the heat or AC on, please press the "run program" button. Please contact the Sexton a few days prior to the meeting if you need instruction on how to operate the HVAC system.
- \* Make sure all exterior doors are locked and push them to make sure they are closed properly.
- \* If you have been in the office area, turn off the Minolta copier and the Fiery box (ask a staff member how to turn these off), turn off all lights, lock the office door.
- \* If you have used the kitchen, please dispose of all trash/garbage, clean out, turn off and unplug any coffee pots, turn the dish washer to OFF, make sure the oven and cook tops are turned OFF, wash and put away anything you have used, launder any towels you have used and return them, take any unused food items home, lock the exterior kitchen door.
- \* Make sure everyone is out of the building.
