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outh Mission Trip 2005 – Gilbert, West Virginia.

Gilbert, a small town of about 400 people, can be found in the foothills of the Appalachian

Mountains and in one of the most destructive flood plains in the country. Mingo County was still recovering from the devastating floods of two years ago, this despite a large water retention project completed by the government a few years before. Our group worked in the area through the West Virginia Mission and Advocacy Workcamps agency, which is supported through the Presbytery of West Virginia and the funding of Presbyterian Disaster Aid. In addition to putting a new roof on a mobile home, we completed several smaller tasks.

We were warmly welcomed by the members of the Gilbert Presbyterian Church who provided us with housing and so much more. We slept in their manse, made our own meals and even found time to visit Coaltown, Home of the Rocket Boys. We learned more about each other during devotions and very active games of four square. And we continued on our faith journeys by serving others, as Jesus showed us.

Please join us on Sunday, August 7, 2005 at 9:00 a.m. as we lead worship and begin to share this awe-inspiring journey of service, faith and overwhelming hospitality.

This logo was developed by Wellness Place, a cancer resource center for all types of cancer and US TOO, an



international support group for prostate survivors, friends and families to promote the Greater Chicago Prostate Cancer Run-Walk'n Roll event on September 18, 2005. This event is the first Prostate Cancer Run-Walk'n Roll in Chicagoland and is being spearheaded by Myrna Porter, a member of our congregation

and one of the founders of Wellness Place. Myrna is receiving the support of her husband, Stuart, who is a

prostate cancer survivor. Another member of our congregation who is helping to promote awareness about prostate cancer is Stephanie Skopek. Stephanie is a member of the Advisory Board.

I am promoting this event in our Carillon because I am proud of our members who have seen a need to help and are taking action to meet that need. I am also promoting this event because prostate cancer is needlessly taking the lives of men throughout our area, the nation and the world. These human losses are taking place because there is a lack of understanding about this disease and its treatment. Here are some important facts about prostate cancer:

A man is diagnosed with prostrate cancer in the U.S. every 2.4 minutes (220,000 new cases a year).

A man dies every 17 minutes from prostate cancer (30,000 deaths a year).

There has been a significant increase in the number of men in their 40s and 50s diagnosed with prostate cancer. This increase will continue for next 5 to 10 years.

Over 10,000 men have been diagnosed in Illinois this year.

Prostate cancer is not fully curable but early diagnosis is critical in its treatment.

AIDS research receives more than \$2 billion in federal dollars. Breast cancer research will receive \$900 million next. Prostate cancer research will receive less than one half of breast cancer funding and far less than AIDS.

I am encouraging members of our congregation to save September 18th so that you can run or walk as a team member from our congregation. If you can't Run or Walk, serve as a volunteer at the event. If you can't do either of the above, sponsor the individuals who will be running or walking. Let's help Myrna, Stuart and Stephanie as they fight this neglected disease.

Stephen Ministry

A New Stephen Ministry Training Class to Begin in October

"I Can't Be a Stephen Minister!" Maybe you haven't said this aloud in a crowd, but for one reason or another you have talked yourself out of becoming a Stephen Minister. Anytime some new challenge shows up, the "I can't" phrase is bound to be nearby. You may have heard about Stephen Ministry, realized that you do have the gifts, the commitment, and the desire necessary to be a Stephen Minister, and you even may have felt God's tap on your shoulder. However, you still aren't sure.



What are some reasons you've given yourself for not becoming a Stephen Minister? Perhaps the following:

"I am not as qualified as those other Stephen Ministers. I can't even quote scripture." A Stephen Minister is a caring person who is willing to learn, grow, and serve. He or she must be willing to keep and maintain confidentiality, and to commit to training, ministry, and supervision. If you fit the qualifications, the Stephen Ministry Training will equip you with the rest of what you need.

"I don't know what to say or do in a ministry situation." Stephen Ministry training is thorough and practical. It includes listening skills, assertiveness, confidentiality, dealing with feelings, maintaining boundaries, and how to care for people during life's different crises. Stephen Ministry prepares you for success.

"I have problems in my own life. How can I help others?" Some problems are so big that you need to address your own needs and wait until later to be a Stephen Minister. After you have worked through your problems, however, your experience of finding God's help and care in your struggles is some of the best preparation you'll ever receive for caring for others during tough times. Stephen Ministers aren't problem solvers; they are problem bearers. A Stephen Minister's job is to walk beside another person as that person works through his or her struggles. The Stephen Minister brings stability, prayer, and Christ's love to the care receiver's situation.

"I don't have enough time to be a Stephen Minister." So true for so many. Time is so precious that it only makes sense to use it on activities that make a real difference – in other's lives as well as our own.

We are told in 1Peter 4:10, Each one should use whatever gift he or she has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms. If Stephen Ministry is a good fit for your gifts, you should consider joining the class of Stephen Ministers that will begin training in October. Caring Hearts-Faithful Servants

Our congregation's vision statement calls upon members of the congregation to "serve those in need, inspiring and equipping one another to respond to God's call; [to] support each individual's journey of faith through lifelong learning, Christian fellowship and prayer; and [to] share this spiritual home with all, . . . " ChristCare Small Group Ministry is being established as a way of translating that vision into reality in our congregation.

A ChristCare group consists of 5-12 people who covenant together to meet regularly and participate in four distinct activities: community building and care; Biblical Equipping; prayer and worship; and missional service. The groups are led by a trained leader and are organized around a common purpose, or a shared circumstance, or a simple desire to be a group. The groups are not a clique. Instead, they are meant to be open to anyone who wants to join – including individuals from outside the congregation – and are expected to grow and give birth to new groups.

Our ChristCare Equippers are searching for individuals to serve as ChristCare Group Leaders. If you would like to develop and use your gifts in the areas of leadership, encouragement, serving, and caring, read on! Your natural gifts may be one way God is calling you to be a ChristCare Group Leader. But you may wonder what else you will need to do this ministry effectively. We have what you need!

Are you hearing God's call to serve as a ChristCare Group leader? Are you wondering if you can be a successful group leader? Our congregation's ChristCare Group Leaders will receive thorough training – by the time you start leading a group, you'll know what to do and how to do it. Once you begin serving as a ChristCare Group Leader, you will meet regularly with other group leaders for Support, Encouragement, and Accountability.

We have an exciting dual program this year! There will be two program themes and a course offering EVERY Sunday, starting September 11, instead of just the customary lectures twice a month.

On the second and third Sundays of each month, in Fellowship Hall, we'll offer "Pathways to the Holy; Encountering the Reality of God." These lectures will look at the influence of Christianity on various art forms from stained glass, to relics, to sculpture, to architecture,

to music. Learn how many aspects of worship evolved to enrich our senses. Lecturers include Dr. David Stark, Mr. Bruce Tammen, Mr. Lucas Livingston, Dr. Rolf Achilles and Dr. Deborah Kapp.

On the first, third and fifth Sundays, in the Parlor, we'll offer "An Understanding of the New Testament." This is a video course which will focus on the earliest traditions about Jesus, the books of Mark, Matthew, Luke and John and the historical Jesus. A facilitator will guide you through the program, which was designed by Professor Bart D. Ehrman, Chair of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He received his Ph.D., which focused on early Christianity in its Greco-Roman environment, magna cum laude from Princeton Theological Seminary.

All classes run from 10:15 a.m. – 11:15 a.m.. Visit our website for specific dates and topics. Brochures are also located in pews or on the Adult Christian Education bulletin board with curriculum details. Mark your calendars and invite a friend to join us!

Our popular Holiday Book Sale will return for your early gift shopping, on October 23 and 26 and November 6.

On November 13, we will have a special three-hour program from 12:30 p.m. – 3:30 p.m. called "Crossing the Bar; End-of-Life-Issues." A panel of professionals will discuss the theological, medical and legal considerations of end of life issues such as living wills, durable and medical powers of attorney, and other important topics. Refreshments will be served; reservations will be required by November 6.

Monday Morning Lectionary Bible Study

Each Monday morning, starting at 9:30 a.m., a Lectionary Bible Study is held in our Parlor. Depending on who is preaching on the upcoming Sunday, either Dr. Baxter, Mr. Spike or Ms. Armstrong-Hansche will discuss and explain the readings for that particular Sunday to help make your worship experience more meaningful. Mission

One Great Hour of Sharing

Thank you, thank you, and thank you. Our congregation gave \$4,117.87 to One Great Hour of Sharing. Due to the generous giving this year, ten Chicago area self help programs received financial assistance. The grants ranged from \$1,642.50 to \$3,142.50 splitting \$25,425.00 among them. The local Self-Development of People Committee of the Presbytery of Chicago approved the grants.

Alpha Omega Christian School - Teaches marketing techniques and music studio production to ex-offenders to enable them to become gainfully employed.

Enough is Enough Campaign - Assists the families of persons who have been wrongfully convicted or imprisoned to gain their freedom.

Kyros Theatre, Kyros Studios and Rema Magazine - Provides a safe place to sing, produce plays and record Christian music.

Shut-Up Prison Ministry - Transitional assistance for ex-prisoners who are trying to re-enter society in a productive responsible way.

St. Pius Jovenes En Accion - Selects projects each year designed to develop spiritual lives, leadership skills, and confidence to make a better world. Projects for this year include: a Lenten series to highlight abuses to day laborers, a border trip to educate young adults about the challenges their parents faced coming to America.

Association of African Migrant Assistance in Chicago - Helps Ghanaians adjust to American culture by teaching survival skills and by making African style clothing to sell.

Metropolitan Area Group for Igniting Civilization, Inc. - Provides marketable technical skills for the future employment of 50 neighborhood youth.

Women Standing in the Gap – Promotes creative expression and entertaining activities by and for people with Multiple Sclerosis.

New Venture Cooperative – Creates a limited-equity affordable housing cooperative in the Woodlawn neighborhood of Chicago.

Woodlawn Town Home Cooperative – Addresses the effects of gentrification by providing housing options for limited income residents of the Woodlawn neighborhood of Chicago.

This is the first year our church has participated in this effort. Hopefully, there will be a solid response from those who care to those who need our care.

Notes From Joy

Recently, some parents have brought up the topic of having a children's choir here at PCB. I know that there has been a youth choir in the past, and some remain who continue to have fond memories of that experience. When I first accepted the position of Director of Music here, I listed having such a choir as one of my goals. It still is.



This Spring, the Worship Committee sent out a letter to parents having children of the qualifying ages to sing in the choir. They were informed of the minimum number of children needed, the practice times, and given space to reply with a written response, to be turned in to me. Some parents who were interested were hesitant to commit because they did not know what the sports schedules for their children would look like in the Fall.

With the cooperation of the Christian Education Department, an alternate time was suggested for Sunday afternoon. This information was communicated by means of several weekly announcements in the bulletin.

The total number of potential children that signed up is less than 15, with at least two being under the required age of 7. Our minimum requirement is for 20 children to be present at each rehearsal.

Apparently, this is not the year for us to start a children's choir. However, we will keep the idea alive and continue to invite parents and children to consider this as a serious but rewarding way to serve God and enhance our future worship services.
