We are here. We are in Advent. Has Advent come too fast for you this year? You had a warning you know!

Chicagoland Malls did us the favor of playing Christmas music beginning November 12. They did that so that you and I could get a head start on the season. They call this advance sales promotion, "season treason." They don't want us to get behind on the stuff we need to get and all the places we need to go before we fall into utter exhaustion on December 26. What a kind thing for our shopping Malls to do; an Advent alert about the utter exhaustion to come!

But, I'm here to tell you that there is only one alert you need in this season and that is this: familiarity breeds contempt. William Barclay said, "There are situations where human beings are at first filled with awe, and then as they grow more and more familiar with them they experience first indifference, and then contempt." The question is how can we approach the manger with utter surprise, NOT with familiarity? How can we approach EACH OTHER with utter surprise and wonder, NOT with familiarity?

Some people can't afford familiarity. Like the guy who works on high buildings; like the guy who works with high voltage electricity; like the guy at the nuclear plant; or a couple in a small boat on Lake Michigan. You just can't get too familiar with these things or else disaster strikes. It's the same with Advent. We can't afford familiarity with God or baby Jesus or each other. Advent is both wonderful and wonder-filled when we approach the manger not as if we own its content, but as ones desiring to have our wills owned by the wonder-babe in Bethlehem.

Session The 2006 Stewardship Campaign

Dear Friends in Christ:

During last year's campaign we asked you a fairly difficult question: "Why Are You Here?". This is a complex question requiring a great deal of reflection for most of you with potentially different answers for everyone. This year we are going to ask you to reflect upon another question:

"Does Your Stewardship Really Make A Difference?"

I believe this question will be much easier to answer. And my answer is ABSOLUTELY. In fact the "differences" our church can make are directly related to the amount of time, talent and treasure that we contribute. The more we sacrifice the more we can help others and perform God's work.

Wow, that seems like a rather obvious statement. Do we really need to have a stewardship campaign to spotlight something so obvious?

I think we do. Great things do not happen by accident. Serving God and performing his work does not happen without some sacrifice. But that sacrifice can have a tremendous impact on the world. I think it is very important to remind ourselves of that sometimes and to make it a priority.

The contributions of the members of the Presbyterian Church of Barrington are significant. And our accomplishments are significant. This year's stewardship campaign will remind us of some of our accomplishments. This year's campaign will remind us of how our sacrifice has perpetuated God's work. The campaign is not intended to make us feel like "good" people. Or to pat ourselves on the back. Rather it is intended to motivate us to continue on our path of faith as servants of God. To motivate us to not only continue our contribution of time, talent and treasure, but to continue increasing it as much as we can. Because you really do make a difference, and we intend to remind you of that this year.

You will hear about the tremendous changes to our Christian Education program and our significant contributions to Home of the Sparrow and other programs we support. On a less spiritual note you will hear about some of the repairs and improvements we have made to our church, not the least of which is the new parking lot. All of these things, whether spiritual or structural, were only possible because of you and your contributions. You certainly did make a difference.

How much of a difference will we make in the future? Remember the obvious statement: the more we sacrifice the more we can help others and perform God's work. We want to continue doing all of the great things you will hear about in this year's campaign and move forward to an even higher level. We are challenging everyone to increase their contribution this year at least 10%. And by contribution I mean time , talent and treasure. With each passing year I realize how blessed I am. God has given me many gifts and I intend to contribute more to the church this year than last. I know many of you feel very blessed too. As the Bible reminds us, our personal wealth is not a direct result of our own power and might but it is God that gives us the power to obtain our wealth.

The positive momentum of The Presbyterian Church of Barrington has become clear. Our members participate more than ever before giving more of their time and talents. Our members are giving more of their treasure than ever before as the average pledge again increased last year. How much of a difference will you make this year?

A Letter from a Care Receiver



With permission from the author, we offer this look at a Stephen Ministry caring relationship through the eyes of the Care Receiver at the Presbyterian Church of Barrington. In this season of gifts big and small, time from a trained and caring friend

can be the best gift of all! If you would like to talk to someone about having a Stephen Minister help you through a difficult time, call **Linda McGurer** or **Marge Slocum.**

So often in life, situations occur which leave one feeling dissatisfied and unfulfilled. And other times in life, circumstances are such that one feels something miraculous has taken place. I am about to comment on such a circumstance now.

Some time ago, I began having problems which I thought I could work through. After all, nobody's life is perfect, and all things considered, mine was really pretty good. Then I received some shocking news which let me know that these problems (which I did not create, but which affected all aspects of my life) were going to be of a long term nature. My life just fell apart at the seams, despite every effort on my part to keep it stable. It is not my nature to crumble under stress, but I was feeling a lot of hopelessness and despair. One day, a leader of the Stephen Ministers abruptly said to me, "Would you like to have a Stephen Minister?" The question shocked me, and I believe it shocked her, too. I am sure the question was given to her on the spot from a heavenly source, and because she is in the business of allowing herself to be used by God, she acted on it. In my surprise, I responded, "Why yes!" Thus began a delightful and long term relationship with a beautiful, Christian Stephen Minister Caregiver, which was inspiring, intimate, confidential, warm, but most of all, very loving.

I am a dedicated Christian believer myself, but God is constantly showing me new aspects of His character. One of the ways He reveals himself is through other people, and by knowing my caregiver, who was always patient in her attitude and generous with her time, I came to appreciate some sides of God that I had not often seen in others, even thought they professed deep Christianity.

Through that ministry, I have seen first-hand the quality care that the Stephen Ministry team is giving here at the Presbyterian Church of Barrington. Sometimes, when we are in trouble, be it spiritual, economical, emotional, or any other kind, pride keeps us from reaching out. Let me be the first to encourage you – the age of miracles is not past. Don't hide away. God is always near you. If you seek Him and ask for help, He will send someone to support you in your distress. Stephen Ministry is here, sent from God to you. Call them.

Caring Hearts-Faithful Servants

The first group of ChristCare Group Leaders is completing their training and will be commissioned on December 11th.



Each of these intrepid individuals – Bob Florio, Lukass Franklin and Gerry Nadig – made a significant commitment to our church and to the success of this ministry. Each spent 2 ½ hours every Tuesday evening between mid-September and the first week of December in training. Additionally, they spent 6 hours on each of two Saturdays for a total of 40 hours. Over and above class time, each participant devoted time to pre-class reading and assignments. We are blessed to have

a dedicated core of very promising group leaders!

The small groups that Bob, Lukass and Gerry will lead will consist of 4 to 12 people who share a common interest, or a common life situation, or just have a simple desire to meet as a group. Each of these groups will covenant together to meet on a regular basis and participate in mutual support and care, outward missional service, prayer and worship and biblical equipping. Each will be an open group, welcoming anyone who desires to join. Bob will be leading a group that is centered around outward missional service with a focus on the homeless and the hungry. Lukass will be leading a group that is centered around care and support of individuals with chronic health conditions. Gerry will be leading a group that is centered around community building, support and care with a focus on soon-to-be or newly retired individuals and their families.

Clearly, these groups help us realize our vision for this church – provide a sense of Christian community, help people connect at a deeper level, help individuals progress on their spiritual journeys, equip people to live their faith in daily life, and help individuals discover and use their God-given talents to serve others. Following the commissioning service on December 11th, the group leaders and the Equipper team (Karen, Dan and Chip) will be available to answer any questions.
