Adult International Mission Trip to Costa Rica, March 1 - 9, 2003

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n March 1 of this year, our congregation will take a giant step in the life our Church. Five members, Vicki Engfer, Eric Enskat, Chip Kyle, Dan Spike and Karen Tobin will leave on the first "Adult International Mission Trip" to Costa Rica. The purpose of the trip is to meet and learn about Christians in another cultural setting and to investigate the possibility of a long-term mission partnership with a congregation in Costa Rica.

The Barrington team will meet its trip leader, Stan deVoogd, in San Jose. Stan is a part of the PCUSA's Border Ministry in San Antonio, Texas. He was previously a mission worker in Costa Rica and has led three prior mission teams on trips there.

The team will visit and worship with various congregations and work on a mission project with a congregation in the town of Guapiles in the province of Limon. The churches the team will visit are members of the F.I.E.C. (Federacion de Iglesias Evangelistas Costariquenas) which is PCUSA's mission partner in Costa Rica.

The mission team is this congregation's hand stretched out in friendship to brothers and sisters in Christ. In a world made small by speed and technology we have an opportunity to become true neighbors with people beyond our borders.

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write this article, Lent is a little over 40 days away. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday with our Confirmation class leading worship and culminates in Holy Week. During this liturgical season, the church, in joy and sorrow proclaims, remembers and responds to the atoning death of Jesus Christ. As followers of Jesus Christ, we are called to a period of self-examination. Our self-examination is a difficult spiritual task because

self-examination supposes our living without prejudice and sin. Most of the time, we aren't even aware how deeply our prejudices and sins are within us. We think that we relate to people who are different from us, but in reality our spontaneous thoughts, words and actions with others reveal that our prejudices and sins are alive and well.

During Lent, Dan, Melissa, David and I invite you to join us in a period of self-examination on Wednesdays, March 12th, March 19th, and April 2nd, and April 9th. We will examine the themes of Forgiveness, Reconciliation, Grace and Salvation. Dan and Melissa will pursue these themes through an investigation using films and I will pursue these same themes through short stories. Our time of study will begin with prayer services based on the Taizé style of worship. In Taizé prayer services, people sing together, using phrases that are short but full of meaning and that are tirelessly repeated. Between the times of singing, there are reflections of the evening readings, and times for silent reflection. Worship will begin 7:00 p.m. and classes will begin at 7:30 p.m. and end at 9:00 p.m.

Dan, Melissa, David and I will be asking you to claim God's love fully in an unconditional way as you live with others. We will be asking you to discover that in the great variety of humanity is an expression of the immense richness of God's heart. In these opportunities for self-examination, we hope that we will be freed from the prejudices and sins that we all possess so that we may reach out to people through acts of compassion and justice.

Join Dan, Melissa, David and I in this exciting time of self-examination. Learn to live toward a nonjudgmental life. Accept the unconditional love of God. We look forward to seeing each of you at our Lenten programs as we journey toward Holy Week and Christ Jesus' victory over, prejudice, sin and death on Easter Day. Pax,

Financial Report: Kurt summarized the financial reports noting there was a decrease in both receipts and expenses from the previous year and both were less than budgeted. No major variances were noted.

Stewardship: Kurt reported that the 2003 campaign has wrapped up. There were 283 pledging units for a total of \$657,631 pledged

Bulletin Board The Membership and Outreach Committee has drawn up plans to build 10 bulletin boards and a cabinet for new member information to be placed in the hallway outside the parlor. The group plans to build the items themselves. The estimated cost is \$300 for the bulletin boards (\$30 each) and \$600 for the cabinet The Communications Committee would set guidelines for the use of the boards and the Session would be responsible for the updating and maintenance of the boards.

Van Rentals: All rentals of motorized vehicles for church related activities must be submitted to the board of trustees beforehand for approval.

Building Repair Campaign: There is between \$80,000 and \$100,000 in needed repairs for the upcoming year. The project to fix/replace the emergency exit doors will take place as soon as possible and is budgeted to cost up to \$10,000. The other items on the list of repairs will be researched and bids obtained by members of the trustees building committee.

A New Year for Stephen Ministry

We joyously begin the New Year with another class of Stephen Ministers Trainees! The 50 hours of training for our second class began on January 14th and will continue into the summer. We are so delighted with the compassionate hearts of our five new trainees: Kathy Martin, Pat Mitchell, Linda Neton, Dan Paxton and Susan Raaths.

When the Disciples were going forth trying to meet the needs of the injured, orphaned and widowed, they were overwhelmed by the number of those around them in need of help. Stephen was the first to step forward when the Disciples asked for caregivers. Our new trainees are willing to learn the skills to help them offer the comfort of Christ to those who worship here who are facing the challenges of life. We are so blessed to have so many passionate hearts among us in this new class, those currently working as Stephen Ministers and the many people who have told us they would like to become Stephen Ministers in the future.

Most people are much more open to giving care than to receiving it. When a person is giving care, he or she is in a position of strength and stability. When a person is receiving care, he or she is acknowledging vulnerability.

As a result, there are countless people today who, though they really could benefit from a Christian friend who would listen and care for them, instead tough it out on their own. They remain the strong silent type, or wear a smile across a face that is holding back a flood of tears. Society encourages this. To ask for help is to admit weakness.

But God did not create us to be independent. We were created to be interdependent. God's Word is clear on this all the way back to Genesis: "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper suitable for him" (Genesis 2:18). The New Testament underscores this theme with more than 50 verses that contain the words "one another." These verses include admonitions such as "love one another," "encourage on another," "build up one another," and "pray for one another."

These verses don't say only to love, encourage, build up, and pray for other people. The "one another"

> wording gives them a reciprocal meaning. It also tells us that we are to allow other people to love, encourage, build up, and pray for us!

It is most difficult for people to ask for help. Whether it is because of pride, guilt, shame, inadequacy, or fear of rejection, many would much prefer to suffer alone than ask for help.

But suffering alone is not God's intent for us. Jesus promises, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). We can receive this promised rest when we turn to one another for comfort and help.

Our Stephen Ministers know all about receiving care. Many of them have been on the receiving end of care at an earlier point in their lives-something that has motivated them to give care now. They know how difficult it is to ask for help, but they also know the great personal and spiritual growth and healing that follows. They know how to respond in a loving, caring, and nonjudgmental manner.

If you find yourself now or in the future facing difficulties in life, don't succumb to society's norm of suffering alone. Take the courageous step of seeking help. Open your heart to receiving God's love and grace through another person. Our Stephen Ministry offers the opportunity of a very confidential relationship with someone who will listen to you and provide you with the care and encouragement you need, while Christ works inside to bring rest to your weary, burdened heart.

Deacon's Corner

The Deacon's Corner is an article each month for the Deacons to help explain some of the ministry work that we do. We as Deacons are often so busy working on the tasks that we complete each month that we will sometimes miss the chance to consider exactly what our focus should be. It's a treat when Dr. Baxter has the opportunity at our meetings to help us understand more about our true mission as Deacons as well as information from scripture and how these things relate

to our churches vision. We had such an opportunity at the last meeting of the Board of Deacons and I would like to share with you some of this Information.

The job of Deacon was described to me before I was ordained as that of the workers, the ones who find ushers, coffee

hosts, and distribute flowers, etc. This description seemed accurate to me as I first started this job. It has since changed drastically. I thought that I would do this work and learn about helping people. I was correct about that, but had no idea what I would learn and what an impact it would have in my life and the lives of others. I would like to share with you some of these things.

We as Deacons are to minister to the congregation. Work on the cares and maintenance of the lives in the congregation. To Minister is described in the dictionary as "to give care or aid. To contribute, as to comfort or happiness." This is the "who and what" part of the question when it comes to our job as Deacons. Seems simple enough to get us started focusing. The "where and when" are questions we settle at our monthly meetings, such as which individual job we will handle visiting families of new babies, or being the representative at one of the committees we are to participate in. We also designate when these activities may take place and be careful to cover them. The "why and how" are the parts of the mission that seem to have lost focus for me over the most recent past and our meeting January 6th helped clear things up for me.

I thought that "Why" seemed easy to answer until I heard our pastor explain it. Curt said that there is one sentence that gives Christianity it's own unique quality apart from other aspects of our cultural life and that is that "Jesus Christ is Lord and he provides us with a

life saving message of love." I put that together with the message that I am here to do God's work and realized that it is our job to help spread that message by loving and helping people.

"How" to perform the job of a Deacon could be done several ways. The way the Board of Deacons is moving forward is clear and in big bold letters near the back of fellowship hall. By WELCOMING people we are to help them feel at ease. By SUPPORTING we are joining our staff and fellow members in mission.

By SERVING we are helping to facilitate the doing of God's work and by SHARING we are offering our time and our good fortune to the people of a broken world.

Thank you to all for helping teach me these things. I have learned what a Deacon is supposed to do and why, but now I find myself thinking "Isn't this how I should behave all of the time, weather I'm a Deacon or not?

Hospitality Changes in January

The second and third Sundays will be devoted to Adult Christian Education programs in Fellowship Hall. Coffee and refreshments will be served in the Parlor. Activities and refreshments for children are planned in the lower level in order to allow parents to attend the Christian Education programs.

Adult Christian Education DISCIPLE IS Coming

If you are reading about *DISCIPLE* for the first time, we want you to realize that it is an extensive thirty four-week Bible study program. It is new to our church, but a well-established program developed in Flower Mound, Texas in 1986. The Adult Christian Education Committee has chosen to introduce *DISCIPLE* to you as a means of fulfilling our congregation's vision. One of the outcomes from the 2002 Vision Quest was for the people of our church to support lifelong learning and to equip one another to respond to God's call..

Originally, a group of eighteen pastors, theologians, laypersons, Christian educators, Bible scholars, publishers and editors shaped the dream of fellowship through Bible study into the reality that is *DISCIPLE*. In the last ten years the program has trained over 28,000 people to facilitate these classes that represent over 10,000 churches. These numbers bear witness to God's work among us since scripture is key to Presbyterian life. The Adult Christian Education Committee wants to offer you this in your personal faith journey.

DISCIPLE will offer small groups of twelve classmates many challenges. Within your group you will read large volumes of scripture. You'll come to understand it from the different authors' point of view as human beings like us, but in their unique cultural settings inspired by God. You will hear God speaking to us. These studies invite classmates to bring their own struggles to scripture and discuss them. You will learn to apply scripture to your own life!

Each participant will have a study manual and should plan on devoting 3-4 hours each week to study and preparation. Videos with biblical scholars will be viewed to enhance your learning. Each group (we hope to start with three groups of twelve) should agree on time and place for classes as well as daily and weekly time commitments for preparation and attendance. There should be two scheduled breaks during the thirty-four weeks. The study groups will travel through the biblical story from Creation to the New Jerusalem chronologically. The Story of the Worship Service

Sunday worship is truly a miraculous time for our community of faith. Singing, praying together, and reading the Word of God are all examples of what we do in the worship service. Our fourfold service, which comes from Isaiah, includes the Gathering, the Proclaiming, the Thanksgiving and the Sending. In the first of this series of articles, we looked at the first part of the worship service, the **Gathering**, which is the drawing together of the people of God through praise and confession to prepare for the hearing of God's Word. In this article, we will read about the Service of the Word, the **Proclaiming**.

Chapter 2: The Proclaiming


The Proclaiming brings God's glorious Word to us, connecting the Scriptures with our daily lives. The components in this part of the worship service include the Prayer for Illumination, the reading of Scripture, Time with the Children, the Anthem, the Sermon, and an Affirmation of Faith. These components include the two key elements of any Worship Service, the Reading of the Word, and the Proclaiming of the Word.

The Prayer for Illumination, which has a unique place in Reformed Worship, occurs before the reading of Scripture. We pray that the light of God will shine upon our spirits and that the Holy Spirit will be in the reading and hearing of the Word; thus changing the reading from a simple reading of words to an act of revelation. This prayer is where we openly recognize that the words of Scripture only become the Word of God when received with prayer.

Following the Prayer for Illumination are the readings from Scripture. A brief introduction to the reading, spoken by the lector, prepares us for what we will hear in the verses that follow. The readings are typically chosen from the lectionary readings for the day, but may also vary to reflect specific concerns in the life of our church or community. We are encouraged to use the pew Bibles to follow along with the readings in order to better understand the message through the context from which the scripture is taken. We recognize the authority of Scripture by responding with thanks and praise to God at the end of the readings. The readings can be interspersed with hymns or anthems that help us to comprehend what we heard in the passages.

In our church, we choose to include a Time with the Children. This children's lesson is tied either to the Scripture lessons or to the work of the church. It provides an age-appropriate message from God's word. By including this time in our worship service, we acknowledge children as members of our church community.

The Anthem, which may occur at different points in the worship service, helps us worship God through the power of music and meditation. It may tie to the worship service by reflecting the church season or by proclaiming themes found in the Scripture readings.

After hearing the Word of God proclaimed, we sing a Hymn in response to what God has taught us, after which we make a public statement of what we believe, our Affirmation of Faith. This may be the Apostles' Creed or another affirmation which expresses the faith tradition of the church universal or of our Reformed heritage. Sometimes the Affirmation of Faith is drawn from Scripture. The Affirmation expresses the faith of the church which shapes our lives and expresses the hope and expectancy that are part of the Christian life.

We have now reverently proclaimed and acknowledged God's presence in our lives through the voice of the Scriptures, a shared lesson with our children (Time with the Children), a message that shows God's teaching for our lives (Sermon), a communal response in song as we praise God and sing to his glory (Hymn), and, finally, a declaration of the faith of the church (Affirmation of Faith).

The conclusion to our Worship Service is our response and commitment through the "Thanksgiving" and "Sending". These will be addressed in our next article in "The Story of our Worship Service."
