Lenten Taizé Services and Classes

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Lent is a time when we reflect on our lives and how we relate to God and Jesus. Our Taizé services and Lenten classes can help us all in our search.

We will begin our Lenten observance with a Taizé service and imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday, February 9 at 7:00 p.m.. Our 7th and 8th graders will lead the worship service.

Taizé services will be held on Wednesdays, February 16 and 23, and March 2, 9, and 16 at 7:00 p.m. Our junior and senior high youth will help lead the worship services. Taizé worship takes the form of meditative common prayer. Gathered in the presence of Christ, led by our Director of Music and Organist, Ms. Joy Hague, we sing uncomplicated, repetitive songs. These simple, uncluttered songs allow the mystery of God to become tangible through the beauty of simplicity. Between the times of singing, there are reflections on the evening's readings and times for personal meditation.

Lenten Classes will be held immediately following the Taizé services, starting at 7:45 p.m. and ending at 9:00 p.m. You may sign up after Sunday services.

Dr. Baxter will be using material from Dr. Armand M. Nicholi's book, The Question of God: C.S. Lewis and Sigmund Freud Debate God, Love, Sex, and the Meaning of Life. See Dr. Baxter's article on page 2 of this Carillon.

Rev. Spike and Ms. Armstrong-Hansche will be teaching "Leaven for Our Lives: Conversations about Bread, Companionship, and Faith." We will bake bread and make foods to be eaten with bread. As we cook, we will talk about bread as a symbol of the abundance of creation and the communion that grows out of sharing bread with others. The class will meet in the church kitchen.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Imagine that you are driving down Interstate 90 at high speed. As you drive, you feel a little jiggle that ends up as a large wobble in the front end of your car. When you take your car into your local mechanic, he says, "Your tires are out of alignment. We can fix that." Indeed he can fix the problem, but he also explains that your tires have begun to wear unevenly and they need to be replaced. Sounds like life, doesn't it?

The shaking of our foundations doesn't happen all at once but over a period of time. Usually, we coast merrily through life without noticing the early warning

jiggling that becomes a major wobbling if we neglect putting our life on the rack.

Lent is a time in life for your realignment. On five Wednesday evenings, beginning on February 16th, we will be having a Taizé prayer service at 7:00 p.m. followed by classes that will end at 9:00 p.m. I will be teaching from Dr. Armand M. Nicholi's book, The Question of God: C.S. Lewis and Sigmund Freud Debate God, Love, Sex, and the Meaning of Life. The book is elegantly written and gives an intellectually and spiritually compelling comparison of between Lewis' and Freud's views of God and the spiritual life.

Eugene Peterson, Presbyterian pastor and theologian, writes this:

Two things that are basic to the Christian life are unfortunately counter to most things American. First, Christian spirituality, the contemplative life, is not about us. It is about God. The great weakness of American spirituality is that it is all about us: fulfilling our potential, getting the blessings of God, expanding our influence, finding our gifts, getting a handle on principles by which we can get an edge over the competition. The more there is of us, the less there is of God.

Ways and means are the second basic in the Christian life that are also counter to most things American. Ways and means must be appropriate to ends. We cannot participate in God's work but then insist on doing it in our own way. We cannot participate in the building of God's kingdom but then use evil tools and nails.

Join me this Lent to contemplate the "way of God" in contrast to the way of our culture. You may order your copy of the book we will be studying by calling the church office or by signing up for the class beginning January 30th at 10:00 a.m. The cost of the book is \$15.00. I look forward to this time of realignment.

Church Administration

New Sexton

We are pleased to announce the hiring of Ward Huege as our sexton. He was referred to us by Ron Furst, a member and Trustee of our church, and started work effective January 3, 2005. Ward will be working for us as an outside contractor for 19 hours a week. His schedule will be 8:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., Monday through Thursday, and 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Sunday. Ward has an extensive background in building maintenance and owns his own cleaning service. Ward is married and has six children.

As you know, we hired an outside cleaning service last year while Peter Schmidt was doing his student teaching. This has worked out very well for us, and we have decided to take the same approach with the sexton's position. This will provide a dedicated person for cleaning and another for building maintenance, meeting set-ups, etc.

Since Ward's hours are limited, **we need everyone's help.** Those in leadership positions can help by providing set-up drawings for their meeting requirements, e-mailing Ward well in advance of special needs, and the most difficult request is for all of us to try to limit our demands on his time. His major responsibility is maintaining our beautiful building at a very high standard, so anything each of us can do to make that possible will be very much appreciated.

Trustees

Finances: The church is ending fiscal 2004 under budget, due to tight control on expenditures, administrative duties assumed by church volunteers, and savings realized in personnel costs by moving to a part-time accountant and part-time Sexton.

Bob Reilly and Joe Babos reviewed the 2003 financial records and found those books to be in good order.

In December, the Board of Trustees sent letters to those members of the congregation who had not completed their 2004 pledges to the church.

In almost all cases, pledges for the 2005 fiscal year which were received by December 31 were either the same in total as the pledging unit had given in 2004 or were increased, some by a significant amount. This is a

positive trend which will allow us to address some deferred attention to building and grounds as well as growth in program and mission.

Building and Grounds: Classroom doors have been painted and new doorknobs will be purchased and installed.

Meyer Sign Company was hired to repair the deteriorating spindles on the sign in front of the church building.

Estimates are being obtained for resurfacing the parking lots in the spring.

Dale Smith is working on adjusting and repairing the sound system in the Sanctuary, with much improvement already noted.

A high-speed wireless internet connection has been installed which will result in lower costs, improved ability to transmit Sunday worship services on our website, and greater efficiency for staff.

New shelving has been purchased to hold music storage boxes which will safely store the church's large collection of sheet music.

Thanks to Owen Heath, who has spent many hours working with the new Sexton to inspect the church facilities, define regular duties, and develop a project list.

Phone: We have contracted with SBC to provide both local and long distance phone service, beginning December 1, 2004, which will result in lower costs.

Wireless Antenna: U. S. Cellular is looking for a wireless site in Barrington Hills and has submitted a proposal to install an antenna in the church steeple, for which they would pay the church a monthly rental fee. They have done this in other churches and it is not visible from the outside. A committee of trustees and members of the session has been formed to consider this possibility. The first step is to authorize U.S. Cellular to test reception from the top of the current steeple and above. Further discussion and negotiation will be needed before a decision is reached, and any final proposal must be approved by the Session, the Congregation, and the Presbytery.

Stephen Ministry

A Match Made In Heaven

Stephen Ministry relationships begin with a careful matching of each Care Receiver with just the right Stephen Minister. In addition to following the basic principle of matching male Care Receivers with male Stephen Ministers and female Care Receivers with female Stephen Ministers, the Referrals Coordinators prayerfully consider each Care Receiver's specific needs, as well as the gifts, skills and life experiences of the available Stephen Ministers. This is exactly the thoughtful, careful and prayerful process our own Referrals Coordinators use when matching our Stephen Ministers and Care Receivers.



When Karen, a Stephen Minister in Texas, was matched with her first Care Receiver, she got an eyewitness look at how well this process works. "It was a 'God thing' from the moment we met," recalls Karen. "Ours truly was a match made in heaven."

Her Care Receiver, Jenny, was grieving the loss of her husband who had recently died after a four-year battle with a brain tumor. A few years earlier, Karen had grieved deeply the death of two children. Karen and Jenny's common grief experiences helped them to form a strong bond from the beginning.

"While one person's grief is never exactly like another person's, I know what it is like to lose someone close. Your life is turned upside down. You are overwhelmed with very painful and confusing feelings, like not knowing if you can make it from one day to the next or feeling sad about every little thing or being angry at God. During the worst part of my grief, I was lucky—having people around who really knew how to care—people who listened and prayed. They did not tell me how I should think or feel, didn't try and explain why things happened," said Karen.

"I wanted to be that kind of caring person for someone else, which is probably the big reason I became a Stephen Minister. So when I was matched with Jenny, I was very much in touch with her needs, and I can say that it was God who brought us together. It was my opportunity to give back some of what I had received."

Similar grief experiences shared the by two women brought them together, but as their relationship developed, they discovered they had much more in common, like a love of cooking and of gardening—each of them even had a dog with allergies! "We clicked on many different levels, and we developed an immediate rapport. The whole thing was amazing to both of us. God really worked through our shared experiences," said Karen.

Their commonalities paved the way for a Christ-centered relationship, allowing the process of Jenny's healing to begin. Karen is grateful for the way in which her Stephen Ministry training enabled her to help that process along. She remembers, "There were many times when I felt close to being in the role of a counselor, but I knew that was not my role. My role was to listen and to pray, and to hand over a box of tissues when Jenny needed it. Many times I prayed, 'God be with me. Work through me. Help me say the right words at the right time and remain quiet when I need to be quiet—and let me resist the temptation to fix things.' And the Lord filled me wisdom and helped me just to be there for her."

Karen and Jenny's Stephen Ministry relationship lasted for about a year. After bringing their relationship to a close, they remained good friends and still continue to see each other. The key to Jenny's recovery, Karen believes, was God working through their Christ-centered relationship, a healing relationship that developed quickly because of common bonds and a careful matching process, "Stephen Ministry is so much more than a 'program.' It's a life changing ministry," Karen said.

I'm a very lucky guy. Lucky to have been blessed with a wonderful family. Lucky to have overcome some bumps in the journey to get to this place. Lucky to be an accepted part of such a close, caring and faithful congregation as we continue the journey.

My family tree includes both Methodist and Quaker leaders, and I vaguely recall attending a few Quaker meetings with my grandmother when I was very young. Confession #1: I'm still seriously challenged at sitting still and remaining silent even after the benefit of four years of military school! Today my grandmother, a major influence, would be very pleased with my Presbyterian family, and that our girls are growing up in such a warm and engaged congregation which includes many of our closest friends.

I am lucky to have a chance to make a contribution of service to this special group. Confession #2: when I was asked to be a Deacon, I admittedly knew little about what the job required. I had participated in other church committees, but suspected a Deacon's duties might be more than I could handle in both time and talent. Like everyone, I struggle mightily to balance the daily priorities of life and occasionally blow it. But thankfully, there are no competitions, trophies, medals or parades for World's Greatest Deacon, and that's the subtle point.

Borrowing from and applying another great Dr. Baxter sermon, I think the Deacons are about "tending the embers" for the Church—the generally invisible hands that serve quietly, unselfishly to keep the fire going so others go undisturbed in faith and warmth. My Dad, another great influence, was one of the most unselfish people I've known; he would have been a great Deacon.

I hope my service as a Deacon helps others while we all learn and grow in becoming more selfless and less selfish. Confession #3: I still have a long way to go on the journey, but the trend is good and I predict more progress (with God's help) in 2005.




First Grade Communion Classes

Small Group Ministry

Our congregation has recently taken a major step in ministry: We have enrolled in the ChristCare Series. ChristCare is a system of small group ministry designed by the Stephen Ministries organization in St. Louis. Two representatives of our congregation will join Rev. Dan Spike in attending a one-week Equipper's Training Course to be trained as "Equippers," those who will direct ChristCare Group Ministry in our congregation. These Equippers will return to us with the knowledge and resources necessary to establish this new form of small group ministry in our congregation. Worship

Should We Applaud?

When the children sing in front of the congregation, when some other musician performs in a particularly skillful or moving manner, when a baby is presented to the congregation at the conclusion of the baptismal liturgy, worshipers wonder, should we applaud?

The worship committee and the church staff have spent a lot of time discussing the question of applause in church. What is the meaning of applause (or the lack of it)? What is the role of worshipers in the Reformed tradition? What is the purpose of music in worship? The conclusion of the worship committee and the staff is that applause is not the best way for the congregation to express themselves during worship services.

In Reformed worship, the people in the congregation are supposed to be active participants in the worship of God. Worship services in many churches allow congregants to be an audience viewing the pastor and musicians as actors, but in Presbyterian worship God, not the congregation, is the audience. Musicians and pastors are the prompters or stage managers. But the members of the congregation are the actors, and all our worship acts are directed to God.

Music in worship is an offering to God, and even when not making music, members of the congregation are co-participants with those who are making music. Applause in response to music places the music in the role of performance rather than ministry. A much better way to express appreciation for music that is especially inspiring is to share with choir members, the Director of Music, or other musicians after worship the joy you have experienced. How you express yourself helps shape the musicians' understanding of worship. "You sounded great!" puts the focus on the performer. "What a beautiful offering to God!" says "Thanks for giving God what I would love to give myself. You glorified God and helped me to glorify God in my heart."

From time to time the congregation has responded with applause when a baby has been presented to the congregation at the conclusion of the baptism liturgy. As a more appropriate way of welcoming children into the family of God, the pastors have started placing a spoken response or a hymn of blessing at the conclusion of the baptism liturgy.

Psalm 100 bids us to "Make a joyful noise to the Lord," but in worship, let's make those joyful noises with our voices and musical instruments rather than with applauding hands.
