Dear Friends in Christ,

As we enter 2003, we face great challenges at The Presbyterian Church of Barrington. In fact, after the conflicts and anxieties of the 2002 Christmas season, we may well appear to be a handful of Christians shuffling through worship and praising God with heavy hearts and whispering to ourselves: "Is there hope?" I would ask each of you to reflect upon this parable.

There was once a famous monastery, a place where monks lived together, which had fallen on hard times. Formerly, its magnificent buildings were filled with young priests and monks, and its big sanctuary resounded with the sound of singing and the organ. Now it was nearly deserted. A handful of monks shuffled through the cloisters and praised God with heavy hearts.

On the edge of the monastery's property, an old Jewish rabbi built a small hut in the woods. He would come there from time to time to fast and pray. No one ever spoke with him, but whenever he appeared, the word would be passed from monk to monk, "The Rabbi walks in the woods."

One day, the head of the community, the Abbott, decided to seek out the rabbi, open his heart about the bad conditions at the monastery, and seek advice. The old rabbi welcomed him, invited him into his hut, and motioned him to sit down on one of the two chairs that flanked the table in the middle of the room. The two men sat quietly for some time, looking at the open scriptures on the table. Finally, the rabbi lifted his eyes and said, "You have come to ask a teaching of me? I will give you a teaching, but you can only repeat it once. After that, no one must ever say it aloud again." The wise old rabbi looked straight at the Abbott and said, "The Messiah, the Christ is among you." For a while, all was silent, and then the rabbi said, "Now you must go." The Abbott left without a word and without looking back.

The next day, after Morning Prayer, the Abbott told the gathered monks about his visit to the rabbi. "But," he warned, "The teaching is only to be spoken once, never again." Then, after scanning the faces of each of the monks, he said, "The rabbi told me that the Messiah, the Christ is among us." The brothers were startled by this. "What can this mean?" they asked themselves. "Is it Brother John, or Father Matthew, Brother Thomas? Am I the Messiah? What can this mean?"

Although puzzled by the rabbi's teaching, as time went by the monks began to treat one another with a very special reverence. There was a gentle, caring quality about them which was hard to describe, but easy to notice. The big sanctuary began to be filled the sound of enthusiastic singing and grand organ music. People came from far and near to be nourished by prayer life of the monks. Visitors were deeply moved by what they saw, and felt, and heard. Quite a change came over the monks when they believed that Christ was present among them.

Isn't it amazing what happens when people discover that Christ is present among them? Christ is alive, and well, and living among us! Look around you! See Christ here and there! Worship him! Offer your gifts to him! Live your lives according to his love!

Church Administration

Session

Notes from Session Meetings on November 25, and December 16, 2002.

The **Amen(d) Ball** was held on Saturday, November 23, 2002. One hundred members attended; final profit was \$20,382 from ticket sales, donations, and events held that evening. The Trustees will use these donations to make visible repairs to the church facility

All Committee Planning Meeting: Saturday, January 11, 2003, at 9 a.m., for the purpose of coordinating schedules for ministers' time and room availability. A member from each committee must be in attendance.

Elder Retreat: January 4, 2003, from 8 a.m. – 12 noon at church.

Financial – Income was down \$29,583 on a year-to-date basis. Expenses are now at \$19,000 year-to-date.

Deacons - the Board of Deacons for 2003 to include a restructuring of the Board into "Parishes." These will be set up alphabetically with each Parish Leader being a Deacon in their third year of service. There will be training at each meeting for the Deacons.

Board of Trustees – Steve Fish gave a slide presentation regarding the Technical Assessment Report from Legat Architects. The five steps taken were: Create a road map for project management, Determine necessary funds, Anticipate future maintenance needs, Avoid out-of-sequence projects, Determine priorities. The Categories of Evaluation are: Life Safety, Prevention Maintenance, Maintenance/Repair, Facility/Program Improvement, Visual Improvements.

Building use requests must be run through the Trustees, who will report to Session.

Staff report - The Senior High Retreat was successful and a plan is underway for a junior high retreat in January. There will be a Synod-wide appeal for a high school junior/senior and college freshmen/sophomore retreat in the future

Personnel Committee: Session accepted with regret the resignations of Jeff Horvath and Brigid Cantagallo.

Communications – this committee is looking at near-term and long-term issues to be discussed.

Trustees

Notes from Trustees Meeting on November 11, 2002.

The December meeting will be held at the home of Steve Fish on December 9th at 7pm.

Financial -Kurt Andersen and Greg Dowell reviewed the business/bank procedures for the last year. Bank statements and transactions were reviewed – making sure entries tracked appropriately. Bank reconciliation using the computer was reviewed. Internal controls for the weekly mail was also addressed (i.e. separation of duties).

Stewardship: Status of the ongoing pledge drive was reported. Thus far, 237 pledging units have pledged (332 pledged last year) a total of \$596,728 - the target is \$750,000 (an increase of 10%). Of those cards in, 140 have increased their pledge, 67 kept it the same, and 22 have decreased their pledge.

Bids for snow removal. Two bids were received. The contract was awarded to Sheets, there was no increase in price from Sheets from the previous year. It was recommended that the request for bids be put out earlier in the year next year.

Computers: The final step to the replacement of the computers and software in the office was the need to update the computer usage policy, for the future. The Church will contract with Steve Unangst for the next 6 months, not to exceed \$1,200/month (approx. 15 hours per month) to handle the maintenance of the system to ensure the system is handled properly. Wendy Bower will write up a service policy contract.

New Business: Jack Swenson is developing a web site for the Church. A logo design was being worked on, communications funds to be used.

The Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church was initially conceived in 1888 as an opportunity to extend its ministry in the growing city of Lexington. Maxwell Street has long been an inner-city church which provides space for mission activities, work camps and shelter ministries. They house an early care center for children of low-income families, a workshop in which members make toys for underprivileged youth and transitional housing for families in need of temporary housing.

This mission opportunity may include work projects like preparing meals in the homeless shelter, working at the food bank, working with needy children and occasional light carpentry.

Cost is \$350.00 which includes most meals, transportation by bus, as well as housing in an air-conditioned 1850's antebellum mansion (bunk beds).

Adult Christian Education Welcomes DISCIPLE

If you make my word your home you will indeed be my disciples. - John 8:31

Over the next few months we hope to explain this exciting new scripture study program to you. DISCIPLE is an enhancement to our existing honorarium lecture program. We will launch our first three classes in the autumn of 2003.

DISCIPLE program is a 34-week bible study modeled after Jesus and the twelve. The classes are small with 12 students each lead by a trained facilitator. DISCIPLE assumes that people are hungry for the word of God, for fellowship in prayer and study, and for a sense of appropriate ministry as baptized, believing, committed Christians. Disciple making and Christian nurturing are its goals. Participants will become better Sunday school teachers, better parents, better choir members, better church officers, and will be inspired as well as informed by scripture.

DISCIPLE gives Old and New Testaments equal time, emphasizing the wholeness of the Bible as the revelation of God. The program aims at transformation, not just information. Participants submit themselves to examination by Scripture, to put themselves under the power of God's word. DISCIPLE invites persons to bring their experiences and struggles to Scripture. It draws upon the work of scholars to aid understanding of the Bible with video presentations to supplement the student study manuals. Participants need to commit to daily reading assignments along with Scripture readings. Commentary and questions are provided in the manuals for reflection.

In the very near future we will distribute red DISCIPLE information booklets to each member family for review. The history of the DISCIPLE program goes back to 1986 at its inception in Flower Mound, Texas. There have been the additions of advanced modules and translations of DISCIPLE from English into Korean, German, Chinese, Spanish and Swiss. Classes have been conducted from Canada to Australia. We look forward to the day when we can offer you at Barrington Presbyterian some of these other DISCIPLE courses: *Into the Word (Genesis-Exodus and Luke-Acts)*,

Remember Who You Are (The Prophets and Paul's letters), and Under the Tree of Life (Old Testament books not in the Torah or the Prophets, The Gospel of John, and Revelation).

Dr. Curt Baxter and Becky Bosarge will attend the three-day mandatory facilitator training classes this summer. Facilitators will guide students through sixteen sessions on the Old Testament, one session on the intertestamental period, and fifteen sessions on the New Testament. The final two sessions are reserved for identifying future leaders and for the celebration of Holy Communion. We are still looking for a third layperson facilitator. If you would like to make inquiries about teaching, please contact **Becky Bosarge**. We are planning registration for the first three classes to take place in May 2003. Keep your eyes and ears open for more details about times, places, and course fees.
