March 20, Passion/Palm Sunday service, 10:00 a.m. The service maintains a tension between the triumphal entry and the somberness of the passion (Jesus' arrest, trial and crucifixion). The children and the choir will process with palms to remind us of Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Later in the service we will read Matthew's account of Jesus' passion. The passion reading will be arranged for several participants, including the congregation as the crowd that demands Jesus' crucifixion.



March 23, Wednesday, 9:30 a.m., the BPW White Breakfast begins with music, meditation, and Holy Communion in the Sanctuary. A homily by Mr. Spike will reflect on "A New Family." Brunch will follow in Fellowship Hall.

March 24, Thursday, 7:00 p.m. Maundy Thursday service. In remembrance of the Last Supper, our first graders will participate in Communion for the first time. A homily by Dr. Baxter will discuss "Why Is this Night Different?"

March 25, Friday, 7:00 p.m. Good Friday service. We will commemorate Christ's death on the cross with a readers' theater presentation of *We Were There*, a drama reflecting the experiences of the people surrounding Jesus.

March 27, Easter Sunday, we celebrate the Risen Christ..

7:00 a.m. Informal Sunrise Service in the Sanctuary with Communion and Baptism




Valentine Care Packs

Stephen Ministry

Answering the Call to Stephen Ministry

We are told in the book of Acts that Stephen was a decent and well respected man in his community. When the apostles were busy building the early Christian church, they knew they had to spend the majority of their time studying the word of God and praying. But the people expected so much of them – more than it was possible for the apostles to do. The apostles were frustrated and the people felt neglected. To solve this problem the apostles called together the whole community and asked for seven men of good standing to come forward and care for the people, allowing the apostles to continue with their important studies.

Stephen was the first man to come forward to care for the widows and the orphans in those ancient days. He answered the call of the people in his community that were in need of help. Similarly in our faith community, seven members of our church came forward on February 20th to be commissioned as Stephen Ministers to bring caring and comfort to those among us facing life's sometimes overwhelming challenges.

We welcome Anna Armstrong, Julie Brown, Anne Garrette, Sandy Kane, Sandie Paxton, Gene Simpson and Joyce Simpson. These wonderful new Stephen Ministers join a strong team of people committed to serving. The active Stephen Ministers are: Kathy Martin, Linda Neton, Dan Paxton and Susan Raaths commissioned May 18, 2003 and Sherri Baxter, Ellen Gullikson, Bud Kilham, Sally Kilham, Sue Kosobud, Jean Marshall, Carol Nelson, Helen Pollock, Peter Shaeffer and Marge Slocum who were commissioned on September 29, 2002. How we have grown since the first Stephen Leaders, Nancy Dolan, Linda McGurer and Nancy Nadig, were commissioned on Sunday February 10, 2002 upon their return from a week of Stephen Ministry training in Texas!

Our most recently commissioned Stephen Ministers completed their training at a day long retreat held at church, Saturday, February 19th. The purpose of the 50 hours of skilled and specific training is to prepare

Stephen Ministers to provide high-quality Christian care in many different situations. However, there are also many side benefits to training – just ask any Stephen Minister. They will tell you how their training has deepened their faith, drawn them closer to God, and enhanced their communication skills and personal relationships.



All of the Stephen Ministers at the Presbyterian Church of Barrington are equipped to care for the members of our family of faith.

Stephen Ministers listen, accept, care and walk with a person through a difficult time. They provide support - prayer, Scripture, forgiveness, unconditional acceptance – in appropriate ways to meet the needs of the care receiver. The Stephen Minister's role is to care and to listen, standing by the person and ministering to his or her spiritual needs as God works through the relationship to bring hope and healing to the care receiver.

Because of the extreme confidential nature of Stephen Ministry, no one from Stephen Ministry can talk to you about his or her caring relationship, or even tell you if he or she has been assigned a care receiver, but it is important for you to know that our new Stephen Ministers are necessary to meet the needs of our congregation. We are truly blessed to have so many Stephen Ministers in devoted relationships bringing the grace and love of Jesus to those who suffer among us.

Please celebrate with us by congratulating the newly commissioned Stephen Ministers when you see them. They have worked hard in class and they have done lots of homework to get to this point, and they are ready and willing to go where ever God takes them.

From the Deacon Moderator - Lukass Franklin

My name is Lukass Franklin. I am starting my third year as a Deacon and my first year as Moderator of this wonderful group. As moderator I get approached from time to time with ideas about new things the Deacons could do. While our many Deacon responsibilities prevent us from adding many new responsibilities, we are sometimes called to add something new. This year we have answered a call to add a new ministry: hospital visits by Deacons.

I would like to explain the need for this new ministry, prepare you for receiving it, and ask for your feedback. Traditionally at our church, the pastors have been called on to do all formal hospital visits. Although some of us have unofficially visited hospitalized church members, there has never been a formal, organized effort to assist the pastors in this critical ministry. As many of us can attest, from personal experience as hospital patients or as their family members, a visit from one of the pastors can produce a big spiritual and psychological lift at a time of great distress.

Our new hospital visit ministry will not replace the wonderful work being done by our pastors. Instead, it is meant to supplement their work so that we can see more of our hospitalized members more quickly and more often. It will also allow the pastors to mobilize a pool of people to call on when circumstances prevent our pastors from visiting a patient. Our goal is to provide more Christian care to hospitalized members in a manner that supports our pastors.

In order to prepare for this new ministry, the group of Deacons who have volunteered to serve in this new capacity will receive special training from the pastors. We hope to incorporate some of the wonderful Stephen Ministry training materials into this effort and may in the future more actively involve the Stephen Ministry team in this ministry.

As a hospital patient, what can you expect from your Deacon visitor? We will come prepared to do whatever seems best for the situation: pray with you, share a short scripture reading, listen to you, hold your hand, or maybe change the TV channel or bring you a cup of cold water. We will share whatever Christian care is appropriate for your situation and that will provide you with some comfort.

As we complete the training process over the next few months and start to visit those of you who have the misfortune of being hospitalized, I hope that you will share your feelings about how effective this new ministry was for you. With the gift of your candor, the Deacons will prayerfully improve this ministry so that even when you are faced with the stress of a hospitalization, we might help you feel God's strong presence.

Deacon's Corner, Margarete Rice

Having just completed my second year as a Deacon, I'd like to share a few highlights with you. Early in the year, we implemented the parish system so we could get to know our church members on a more personal level. This was also our first full year of serving extended Communion. Later last year, we discussed providing rides to church for those who needed them, and visits by Deacons to hospitalized members of the church. Although, sadly, we lost four Deacons through death or illness, we pulled together, filling in as needed to get a lot accomplished in the pastoral care of our congregational family.

On a personal lever, there are two ministries that I have found to be especially rewarding. During the past year, I was liaison to the Stephen Ministry team. Meeting with the Stephen Leaders monthly, I truly enjoyed being the communication link between them and the Board of Deacons. It is wonderful to see how they have reached out and served and have grown the past two years. I look forward to a continuing relationship with them this year.

The other extremely rewarding and spiritually uplifting ministry for me was serving Extended Communion through out last year. It is a joyful and amazing experience to be always so welcomed and sharing joys, sorrows, concerns and wonderful conversations as well as the Lord's Supper. I am full of gratitude for the journey I've had, and for the opportunity to work with the Board of Deacons again this coming year.

Healthy Relationships Series

March 13, April 10, and May 15, from 4:30 p.m. – 7:00 p.m., “Ingredients of a Healthy Relationship”.

Dr. Clark Barshinger, who holds doctorates in psychotherapy and theology, will present a special series on healthy relationships. The cost of the seminar will be \$50 per person for the whole series (which began in February) and will include a light supper, dessert and coffee. Dr. Clark Barshinger returns to us once again and will lead participants through a scientific and spiritual analysis of relationships. The class is well suited for singles, married or unmarried couples. The goal is educational, not therapeutic. DISCIPLE II: Into The Work, Into The World, is a 32 week study for graduates of Disciple I. This study takes us back to Genesis, Exodus, Luke, and Acts so that we may learn Bible study skills that take the participants deeper into Scripture, connect our inner and outer life, and develop the practice of spiritual disciplines. The emphasis shifts from a broad view to a deeper view of Scripture and continues to relate Bible study to witness and service. Time commitments are similar to DISCIPLE I.

Both classes will be offered on Saturday mornings at 8:00 a.m. (or earlier). Cost for each: \$60.00 (plus a coffee and pastry fund!) DISCIPLE registration officially begins in May, but you don't have to wait until then! Look for a DISCIPLE display in Fellowship Hall and later this spring, watch for informational tables, bulletin inserts, and announcements before worship. 
DISCIPLE Classes For Fall, 2005

DISCIPLE I: Becoming Disciples Through Bible Study is a 34 week study giving equal time to both the Old and New Testaments. The emphasis will be on developing the habit of disciplined reading of Scripture, learning the Biblical story, and allowing that story to challenge and change us as disciples. Disciple is about transformation, not just information. Participants will be required to complete assigned reading during the week and to meet once a week with the group for 2 ½ hours. The group meeting includes a video segment with a scholarly presentation of that week's passage. This class is open to friends and neighbors in the community.

To quote from the Disciple Handbook, “Underlying the development of DISCIPLE is the assumption that people are hungry for the word of God, for fellowship in prayer and study, and for a sense of appropriate ministry a baptized, believing, committed Christians. Disciple making and Christian nurturing are its goals.” Please prayerfully consider whether or not now is your time to satisfy your hunger for God's word and to commit to this experience that will dramatically impact your spiritual growth.

The 7th/8th Grade Fellowship LLAMA PROJECT

This spring during Wednesday Night Live, our 7th/8th grade fellowship has begun THE LLAMA PROJECT. Our goal is to create 15 papier-mache llamas with varying themes (Cubs Llama? White Sox Llama? 2005 Youth Mission trip: West Virginia, June 18-26

This year, the youth and their advisors will travel to the flood plains of West Virginia to reach out to those in need. The area, southeast of Charleston, is still recovering from a 2004 flood and the after effects of Hurricane Ivan.

Since 2001, The West Virginia Ministry of Advocacy and Work Camps, Inc. has brought 40-45 volunteer groups each year to work in West Virginia. Their work has consisted of home reconstruction, deconstruction, playground restoration, parks cleanup, stream bank stabilization, and vacation Bible schools, among other things. WVMAW is supported by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and The Presbytery of West Virginia, as well as private donors.

WVMAW has two group housing locations, at Montgomery and Richwood, WV. They are both associated with local churches, and each has shower facilities and fully-equipped kitchens. There is a lot of interaction with the local congregations, including worship, Bible Schools, conversations, and cookouts. Our group will be working at a new, third site during the week.
