Dear Friends in Christ,

A few Saturday evenings ago, I was surfing TV channels and came across a two star, Sci-Fi movie I hadn't seen. The movie is entitled *Equilibrium* and this article is not a recommendation for you to watch it. But I continued to watch it because it posed an interesting question. Are emotions the cause of human violence and war?

Equilibrium takes places in a futuristic society where a third world war has destroyed much of the earth. In an

effort to avoid violence and war, a mysterious figure known as "Father" has made laws which make feeling any emotion illegal, since human emotion is apparently the root of all evil. A drug, called Prozium, is distributed to the populace and special ultra-violent enforcers, known as Clerics, are enlisted to maintain this emotionless society.

As I watched this movie I was reminded of Neil Postman work. In 1985, Postman wrote Amusing Ourselves to Deathr Public Discourse in the Age of Show Business. He begins by making a chilling comparison of the works of George Orwell and Aldous Huxley. Contrary to popular belief Orwell and Huxley did not hold the same views about what would destroy the human race.

Orwell warned we would be overcome by an externally imposed oppression.

Huxley warned that technology would undo our capacity to think.

Orwell feared those who would ban books. Huxley feared no one would want to read.

Orwell believed that people are controlled by inflicting pain.

Huxley believed that people are controlled by inflicting pleasure.

Orwell feared that what we hate will ruin us. Huxley feared that what we love will ruin us.

Although Orwell and Huxley don't agree about most things, they both seem to agree that emotions are ruinous to human life. In *Equilibrium*, the hero, Cleric John Preston, begins to explore his emotions after missing a dose of Prozium. As Preston explores the world of happiness, sorrow, rage, and fright, detainee heroine, Mary O'Brien says to him, "Feelings are what make us human." Research into the neurology of the brain demonstrates that managing our emotions is the most important aspect of our growth as human beings. Learning to manage our gladness, sadness, madness, and scared-ness is a requirement of life together as the children of God. I invite you to reflect on these thoughts as we approach the holidays which are so full of glad, sad, mad, and scared moments.

Session

Notes from September 27 meeting.

Stephen Ministry: A presentation was made by Marge Slocum on the upcoming Stephen Ministry Caring Workshop to be hosted at PCB on Saturday, November 6, from 9:00 a.m. to Noon. The workshop will consist of three segments: (1) Ministering to Those Experiencing Grief; (2) An Introduction to the Stephen Series; (3) How to Care in a Distinctively Christian Way.

Small Group Ministry: Nancy Dolan, Marge Slocum and Dan Spike explained and discussed what is meant by "Small Group," why we need Small Group Ministry, The Christ Care Series, and a possible timeline. The Planning Committee will move ahead with the concept of Christ Care and proceed with developing a timeline for the program.

2005 Presbyterian Church Of Barrington Ball: Bob Skopek requested permission for the committee to move forward with plans for this event. Jane Zimmer and Stephanie Skopek will serve as Co-Chairs for the Ball which will be held January 22, 2005 at the Hyatt Woodfield. The purpose is to "Celebrate Our Family of Faith in Fellowship" while raising funds for the church Session approved and authorized an initial financial commitment of approximately \$1,750 for deposits (hotel and band) and invitations.

San Marcos: Chip Kyle announced that the Interim San Marcos Board, of which Chip and Denny McGurer are members, will make a presentation on Sept 28th to the Presbytery Council, making recommendations in three areas: (1) Location (2) The Program (3) Financial. Key issues to be recommend: The location should be moved where it will be embedded in the Hispanic congregation at Vida Nueva on Kostner Avenue. Signature programs such as sports and music need to be expanded. Not-for-Profit status (501 C3) should be sought. The name should be changed from San Marcos to Nueva Esperanza. Session approved PCB's agreement to a formal Covenant (promise) relationship with Nueva Esperanza, including a financial commitment of \$12,000 for Administration and \$41,000 for Scholarship.

The October Session meeting will be held at The Garlands as Fellowship Hall will be used for church directory photographs.



Trustees

At their meeting on October 18 the Board of Trustees reviewed the Church financial reports through October 31 and are very pleased to report that we are on budget for both expenditures and revenue. We

thank all those members who have brought their pledges up to date!

In relation to the building and grounds, the Trustees are continuing to address a variety of needs:

Interior painting continues in rooms on the lower level. Many individual Trustees have contributed personal hours to this project.

Sound System: Efforts are underway to improve the sound system in the Sanctuary, including new and relocated microphones. We are aware that it is now difficult to hear when sitting at the back of the Sanctuary. We are going out for bids to repair and resurface the parking lots and

Driveways. This work will be done in fiscal 2005 and the extent will depend on funding availability.

A dead tree was removed from the north side of the property. This addressed a safety concern for children playing in the area from both our church and Countryside School.

Safety concerns regarding the choir loft have been addressed by lowering the floor and adding new railings. The loft now meets code.

The thermostat which controls the heat in the Sanctuary was replaced when it malfunctioned.

Joint Meeting: The Board of Trustees will meet jointly with Session on November 22.

When I was 6 and in grade 1, I stood at the fence during first break one day and watched the second graders board the bus – they were going on a field trip to the zoo. They looked so big and confident and in charge (of their own snack bags packed with chips and chocolates, at least), and I thought to myself: "When I am in grade 2 and boarding that bus, I will be BIG". The next year when it was my turn to visit the zoo, I noticed the fence as I got on the bus and, feeling very small, I learned my first important lesson of life: I AM STILL NOT "BIG". (Later that same day I learned something else: I DON'T HAVE ENOUGH SELF CONTROL TO SAVE MY SNACKS UNTIL I ARRIVE AT THE ZOO)

In my journey of faith Lesson #1 is reinforced constantly. I don't know about you, but I feel small and helpless every day. The challenge for me is to feel small and helpless without feeling scared on top of it. I found that as long as my life journey and my faith journey is one and the same thing I can feel small and helpless without feeling hopelessly scared. With God at my side I can be a comforted child. With my hand in God's I can skip along joyfully. I certainly don't always succeed in this, but fortunately Christian fellowship serves to remind me that I should have one faith-life journey. It drags my everyday life-path back to my faith-path when I most need it.

As far as lesson #2 is concerned, I still can't successfully brown bag it. My snacks will never arrive at the zoo intact.
