After a careful investigation of the old structure it was decided to build a new 40 foot steel bridge with atone or concrete abutments and the clerk was instructed to advertise for bids. The date of the letting of contract was fixed for 11 o'clock, Monday, Aug. Sth, at Murphy's hotel, Wauconda.

The approximate cost of the new bridge is 4,000 and one-half the cost is bonne by Lake county.
