Taking Grease From Wool. recent report from William J. Pike erican consul at Zittau, Germany will be received with great inter wool growers and wool me turers in this country. It relates will be received with great interest by wool growers and wool manufacturers in this country. It relates to the invention of a new machine for taking the grease from wool, technically known as "degressing." It is accomplished by a dry process, using in-law-index and in the process of the applied by a very swift current of air.

The wool fibers cleaned by it retain let natural qualities as to strength, elasticity and waviness, and the cleaning is done at a greatly reduced expense. The absorbent earth being carried with complete regularity to every part of the wool, the degressing is consequently accomplished with the greatest regularity.

The price of the machine is very low. It requires but little space and is so simple in construction that it can be handled by any one. All this would seem to make the invention an important one.

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
