Washington, Oct. 5.—After an Illness of less than one week Henry C. Parne, postmaster general of the United States, died at 6:10 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in his apartments at the Arlington hotel. The end was peaceful. Within ten minutes a bullettu was issued, signed by Dr. P. M. Rizey, Dr. O. Lloyd Magruder and Dr. C. T. Grayson. It read:

"The postmaster general died at 6:10 p. m. He died peacefully, with out a struggle. Cause of death, disease of mitral valve and dilatation of the heart."
