DISCOVERS A NEW BLOOD TEST

Physician Tells How to Detect Whether Stains Are Human.

Reidesport, Conn. dispatch. Dr. Justin he Labie of New York eity explained to the members of the Fairfield County Medical society the facts of a newly discovered test for determining whether or not blood stains upon garments or on other things are human or animal stains.
