Fruit juice may be advantageously used in both acute and chronic bowel disorders. Care must be taken, however, to avoid fruit juices which contain a large amount of case sugar, click or a mixture of sour and sweet fruit juices, or actif fruit juice may be sweetched with malt honey or meliose, a natural sweet produced from cereals. Raisins, figs, pruces, sweet apples and cears may be mixed with sour fruits.

Cook the peanuts exparately, drain from the juice, rub through a colander, and add to the peas. Beat well together, season with water pudding disk, smooth the top, and bake in a moderate oven until dry and mealy. If preferred, one-third tonsted bread crumbs may be used with the peas and a less proportion of nuts. Serve hot like mashed potato.
