AN ORDINANCE.

Amending Ordinance No. 7, New Series of the Village of Barrington, for the construction of sidewalks along the various streets in the Village of Barrington, Counties of Cook and Lake and State of Illinois.

It is ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington:

Section 1.

That Section 1 of said Ordinance No. 7, new series, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2.

That all sidewalks which shall be ordered by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Barrington, shall be constructed under the superintendence and to the satisfaction of the Committee on Sidewalks, and subject to their approval, and shall be built, except as hereinafter provided.

provided, of the width hereinabove specified and shall be constructed as follows:

One inside surface line of every sidewalk shall not be more than twelve inches from and in front of the line of the lot, along and in front of which the said sidewalk is to be constructed. That portion of the street upon which the said sidewalk is to be laid shall be brought to a grade twelve (12) inches below the established grade of such sidewalk and such space between the width of four inches more than the cement portion of such walk and shall incline upwards and evenly on both sides to the cement outer edges of the paved sidewalk. The lower eight inches of such sidewalk shall be filled with a layer of stones, clean gravel, thoroughly rammed and compacted, the tops of said gravel or stones to be four inches below the grade for said walk when completed. Upon said gravel or stones shall be laid a thin layer of sand, which shall be at its base of the cement portion of such walk, one inch in thickness; this layer of sand shall be made of one of the best Portland cements and three parts of clean sand to be thoroughly mixed dry and then moistened with water to form a mortar, which mortar shall be evenly spread over the surface so as to insure a smooth, even and level surface.

The sidewalk shall be so constructed that when completed the top surface shall be at the permanent grade. If such has been established and if not so established, then to the grade which the said President and Board of Trustees shall establish before such sidewalk is constructed. The said cement portion of said sidewalk shall be of a uniform width of five feet, except as is otherwise provided, and shall incline upwards, starting from the outer edge of the walk toward the line of the adjoining lots, at the rate of one inch to five feet throughout. At all street corners such sidewalk shall project seven feet beyond the lot line. Along the sides of the sidewalk shall be placed strips of sod at least six inches wide.

Section 3.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately on and after its publication and passage as provided by law.
