

In our newspapers, especially, we continuelly see such absurd statements as "W. X. killed a bird of the owl species," or "Y. Z. caught a strange animal of the raccoon species." However Indifferent ones may be to knowledge he cannot be so to speech. He must use correct worder all shores "None one claim to be educated who does not know the meaning of the three terms, "tannity," "gentus" and "appecles," For instance, there is a group or order of birds of prey—eagles hawks, falcons, butzards, kittes and owls—and these are families under the name given; but the eagles and owls—and these are families under the name given; but the eagles and the baid eagle; these are species. We have the sparrow hawk, percerine falcon and red-tailed butzard; each is a species of owl." This is good English. What he did say is nonsense.
