Demand for Free Delivery.

The demand for rural free delivery keeps up continually. Petitions for new service to the number of 4,708 were filed in the first week in June and new routes are being established at the rate of 500 a month. Thus far the service has reached about one-third of the rural population of the country at a cost of \$20,000,000 a year. When it reaches substantially every farm house, as it will before long, it will cost at least \$60,000,000 and the deficit will amount to unheard of figures unless the rules be changed. The re-organization of the service on business principles, permitting carriers to handle express matter regardiers of origin or destination, would probably make both ends meet. probably make both ends meet.
