
ARCTIC EXPLORERS SAVED BY RELIEF EXPEDITION

After having been cut off from the world in the Arctic since July, 1902, thirty-seven members of the Flaia-Elegier polar expedition have been rescued by the steamer Terra Nova, and landed at Hennigasay, Novray.

All the members of the crew of the ship America, which was crushed in the ice, early in the winter of 1903-4, have returned in good health in spite of their harrowing experience, with the exception of one Novregian sallor, who died from natural causes.

The members of the Flaia srctic expedition have arrived in Norway, and it is announced by the trustees of the Zlegier estate that no more expeditions will be sent out in the name of Ziegler.
