CONDITION OF THE CORN CROP

Excellent Reports From Principal Producing States, With Damage From Windstorms in Nebraska, Ar-kansas, Missouri and Ohio.

Washington dispatch: The weekly summary of crop conditions, issued by the weather bureau, is as follows:

by the weather bureau, is as follows: During the week ended Aug. 21, exe-tral and western Texas experienced unusual heat, while unseasonably cool weather prevailed in New England and the northern portion of the Middle Atlantic states; elsewhere the tem-perature was favorable. VOICE IN GOVERNMENT FOR PEOPLE OF RUSSIA

Emperor Nicholas Issues Imperiat Manifesto Calling Representative Body to Assemble in January.

Stody to Assemble in January.

St. Petersburg cable: The people of the Russian empire have come into their own—partly. In an imperial manifesto the Emperor Nicholas amounces the creation of a national assembly which, though consultative in character, will give the nation's militions a voice in the government under which they exist.

For this new institution, while it places the common people of the empire on a higher plane than they have ever known before in a political sease, does not provide for the making of laws by the representatives of the populace.

But it takes its place among the fundamental organisms of the government with the power to suggest, prepare, and repeal legislation. The manifestic comes as the culmination of decades of stress and striving for reform a constant of the furtion of the crar's plan soutilines by him in a rescript March 13 last.
