CASTLE ROCK, Wash., Aug. 25, 1905. Editor Review:

I have made a short visit to Mt. St. Helens since writing you last and will give readers of the Review a short description of my trip.

Mt. St. Helens is situnted about one hundred miles from Portland, Oregon, and on a clear day can be seen from that city. The most convenient way to get there from Portland is via Cactle Rock which is reached by the N. P. R. R., or by steamboat. By rail is best now because the water in Cowletz river is low. From Castle Rock it is 50 miles to St. Helens and the only way is by wagon road, some parts of it a poor excuse for a highway.
