Time Wisconsin State Dairy and Food Commission has as its working saff three cheese factory, dairy and food inspectors and four creamery, dairy and good inspectors in addition to its head and one assistant commissioner.

Special educational dairy trains will run through lowa and Nebraska this season. It will be called the 'Good Cow Train.'' It will seek to incuicate better practice among dairymen, and urue a study of the best experiment station reports.

It has been observed, apropos of the necessity for kind and gentle treat ment of dairy cattle, that a new-han ment of dairy cattle, that a new hand usually obtains less milk from a cow than she would yield to a milker, not necessarily more expert, to whom she was accustomed.
