TORTURED BY ROBBERS

Andrew and John Forn Residing on Algenquin Road the Victims.

Bandits Apply Fire to the Foot of the Two Farmers to Make Them Reseal Hiding Place of Money.

Biding Place of Resey.

Bound, gagged and tortured by three or more bandits, who sought to make them reveal the hiding place of a large amount of money they supposed was concealed in the house, was the fate meted out to Andrew and John Forn, two elderly farmers residing near Spring lake, on the Algonquin road between Barrington and that village.

Saturday night about 11 o'clock three men appeared at the house occupied by the two Forn brothers and demanded admittance, which was refused. They broke down the door, entered and overpowhere the old men and bound themswith pieces of rope. They then demanded the men reveal to them the hiding place of their treasure. This the brothers refused, and the robbers began a search of the

and the robbers began a search of the house, and found \$365 put away in sev eral places, they concluded that a lar ger sum was concealed somewhere they beat and choked their victims and finally applied lighted papers to the soles of their feet to make then tell where the supposed treasure wa

the soles of their feet to make them tell where the supposed trensure was hidden.

Andrew, after the robbers had scarched the house and faken \$200, managed to free himself from the thongs which bound him and started across the fleds to secure help. The soles of his feet were blistered, however, and before he had gone far he fainted and fell in adhe his way to the Spring Lake chees factory, where he gave the airan, but the banditis had gained a start of several hours and could not be found.

Join Forn was found unconsclous from the injuries inflicted, and his condition pronounced serious.

All possible clues to the deed have been diligently followed since last Sunday morning, but up to the present and could no sensens of opinion that the brutal deed was committed by parties familiar with the business affairs of the brothers.

The reputed wealth of the Forn's has been the topic of discussion for years, and probably based on the fact that they held some government bonds, and \$3,000 or more in bank. John Forn is recovering rapidly from injuries inflicted by the robbers.
