BIG WAR VESSEL IS DESTROYED

Admiral Togo's Flagship, the Mikasa, Blows Up in Harbor at Sasebo.

FIVE DEAD, WITH 251 MISSING

spances Grieve Over Loss of Battle-ship That Had Become Endeared to Them Through Success in Battle Under Togo.

London, Sept. 12.—The loss of To-go's flagship, the batticehip Milana, sunk Monday morning in the harbor of Sasebo, comes as a tragic anti-cli-max to the horrors of the war. According to the official report giv-en out by the Japanese navy depart-ment at Tokio Tuesday morning, 559 lives were lost when the Milana was destroyed.

Later reports seem to mitigate the horrors of the disaster. A dispatch to the Times says that the cassalties include five men killed, 323 wounded, and 251 missing.

These figures which total 599, indicate that at least 333 men were rescued from the battleship, wounded, but still alive; that five of the dead have been recovered and that 251 are missing.
