Line to Timbustoe.

Since July 1 the French have established a steamboat service from Kullkoro, in the Western Soudan, to Timbustoo, a distance of nearly 1,000 kilometers or Sil miles. Next year the service will be effected on the Niger passengers as well as goods. The present service has been organized by Lieut de Blence of the French navy, with four other officers, acting under M. Fonty, sovermor of Upper Senagal and the Niger, According to M. de Blence, who is in Paris, Timbustoo may now be considered as within the first of the service of the Seine. One day will be occupied in going from the capital to Bordesux by rail, eight days by steamer from the latter place to Dakar, one day by train from Dakar to St. Louis, three days by water to Kayes, two to Kullkoro by train, and thence on to Timbustoo by train, and thence on to Timbustoo by the new service in four days.—London, Telegraph.
