The Black Man to the Front.
On his recent rip through the south
the president advised the colored men
to stay at bome and take part in the
commercial development of the region.
The south wants laborers, and the
blacks are on the ground, inured to the
climate and the peculiar conditions.
Negroes are capable of a variety of
useful work when they set themselves
to it, as was shown in the days of
slavery. About all the work done on
the Panama canal so far has been performed by Jamalen negroes, and it is
estimated that 24,000 laborers will be
needed when the construction is in fail
swing.

On the new railroad along the upper Kongo 4,000 natives have been at work for nearly a year. Opportunities for the blacks in their native zone to gain proficiency in common labor and me chanical industries are opening every day. Even in Africa the negro is taught to make brick, build houses, grade roads and bridge rivers. No great en-terprise can get on without his aid, and if the black race fails to serve the needs of the age it will make a misnects of the age it will make a mis-take and lead to the displacement of the negro as a factor in civilized de-velopment.

Big Salaries Ought to Go.

A comparison of the salaries paid to the heads of large foreign corporations and those drawn by the presidents of our own companies should lead fogan awakening on the part of those out of whose peckets these salaries must come. For instance, the heads of the Bank of England and the Bank of Germany, which have aggregate assets of over \$1,000,000,000, together pay salaries to their chief officers of only \$17,500 annually. In this country single individuals at the head of financial comportations are paid several times that amount for supervising funds ranging from one half to one-fifth as large. The conditions in this country as compared with the old world, the sharp competition and the volume of transactions may excute salaries somewhat in excess of these paid abroad, but the difference should not be so great as to create an injustice to the great paying jubile, which is disposed to be generous. the heads of large foreign corporations
