

Makes Horizontal Cut of 20 Per Cent on Schedule Made in 1887.

Carriers Have Aiready Put Into Effect Tariffs in Some Instances Lower Than Those Promulgated by the Commission.

Springfield, III., Dec. 6.—The much heralded freight rate reduction in Illi-nois came Tuesday afternoon, when the Illinois railroad and warehouse commission announced a horizontal reduction of 30 per cent on the sched-ule made in 1887.
